## ***DID YOU KNOW MOBILE IS THE HOME OF - The Coast Guard Aviation Training Center (ATC) AND MORE!***

The Coast Guard Aviation Training Center (ATC) in Mobile, Alabama is a multi-mission unit, acting as the Coast Guard's aviation and capabilities development center, as well as an operational air station. Training is conducted to qualify Coast Guard pilots in the MH60 "Jayhawk", the MH-65 "Dolphin", the HC-130 Hercules, the HC-130J Hercules, and the HC-144 "Ocean Sentry." All pilots initially trained at ATC return once a year for a one-week proficiency course in their designated airframe. Serving within the Coast Guard's Force Readiness Command's Training Division (FC-T), the ATC Mobile evaluation center is responsible for ensuring that Coast Guard aviation forces are using the best equipment and tactics to successfully complete all required missions. The Operations Department, flying the HC-144A Ocean Sentry, is a segment within the ATC command that conducts traditional Coast Guard air station missions including Search and Rescue, Homeland Security, and Environmental Protection. The Operations Department operates under the tactical control of the Eighth Coast Guard District and has area of responsibility that extends from the Louisiana/Texas border to the eastern edge of the Florida panhandle.

### **Commanding Officer:**



**Captain Christopher J. Hulser**

Captain Hulser is the 21st Commanding Officer of Coast Guard Aviation Training Center (ATC) Mobile, AL. He is responsible for all aspects of Coast Guard pilot and aircrew training and standardization for 26 Air Stations and 43 flight deck equipped Coast Guard Cutters. Additionally, he commands the Coast Guard's Aviation Capabilities Development Center, provides 24/7 fixed-wing operational response, and directs helicopter disaster surge response for America's Gulf Coast. Captain Hulser is a 23-year veteran of the US Coast Guard, and a 1997 graduate of the U.S. Coast Guard Academy.



## **U.S. Coast Guard Sector Mobile**

### **Mission**

U.S. Coast Guard Sector Mobile supports a wide range of Coast Guard operations to include search and rescue, maritime law enforcement, marine environmental protection, aids to navigation, and ports, waterways, and coastal security.



## **Gulf Strike Team (GST)**

The GST is one of 3 Special Teams that make up the National Strike Force. It is a vital national asset comprised of a unique, highly trained cadre of Coast Guard professionals who maintain and rapidly deploy with specialized equipment and incident management skills any time to any place or hazard.

The GST is recognized worldwide as an expert authority in the preparation for and response to the effects resulting from oil discharges, hazardous substance releases, weapons of mass destruction events, and other emergencies on behalf of the American public.

Our area of responsibility covers all or portions of the 5<sup>th</sup>, 7<sup>th</sup>, and 8<sup>th</sup> Coast Guard Districts and Environmental Protection Agency Regions 4, and 6. In addition to these areas, we also have international responsibilities for South America, Central America, and the Caribbean.

## Alex Haley: Coast Guard's First Chief Journalist Became Pulitzer Prize-winning Author –

As influential as Alex Haley was to American culture, it's never been a Coast Guard tradition to name its cutters after literary figures; Haley is the only writer so honored.

It's literally one of a kind, the only Coast Guard cutter in the Alex Haley class of medium-endurance cutters: Affectionately called "The Bulldog of the Bering," ideal for patrolling rough seas, the 282-foot *Alex Haley* (WMEC 39) began its career in 1968 as the USS *Edenton*, a salvage and rescue ship with the U.S. Navy's Atlantic Fleet.

Before he wrote 'Roots,' author Alex Haley had a distinguished career in the U.S. Coast Guard. A cutter proudly carries his name today.

In 2021, a century after Alex Haley's birth, the USCGC *Alex Haley* marked its 53rd year of service as a naval or Coast Guard vessel.

He was the second Eagle Scout in NW Fla. and was presented a replacement Eagle Pin by local BSA troop and BSA Troop participated in celebration.





## WHAT ARE MILITARY BURN PITS?

[Burn pits](#) are well-known within the military community, but the reasons for using them and the dangers that accompany them are less familiar to the American public. With the topic gaining prominence in recent months, here's a look at the issues surrounding burn pits and the help veterans could receive in dealing with their effects.

[Until the mid-2010s](#), burn pits were commonly used in Iraq, Afghanistan and other overseas locations to dispose of waste collected on military bases. That included items that produced dangerous toxic smoke when burned, such as plastics, rubber, chemical mixtures and medical waste.

## Pentagon denies DC request for National Guard migrant help

WASHINGTON (AP) — The Pentagon rejected a request from the District of Columbia seeking National Guard assistance in what the mayor has called a “growing humanitarian crisis” prompted by thousands of migrants being bused to the city from two southern states.

Defense Secretary Lloyd Austin declined to provide Guard personnel and the use of the D.C. Armory to assist with the reception of migrants into the city, according to U.S. defense officials.

The mayor does not have the authority to personally order a National Guard deployment, an issue that has become emotionally charged in recent years as a symbol of the district's entrenched status as less than a state.

Asking for help when you don't have all the answers is a crazy concept, right? Almost like having a manual to tell you everything you need to know or do and when you need to do it. Speaking of which, I just happen to have a list of everything you need to know or do and when you need to do it: ***one-stop checklist and timeline filled with everything you need to know or do and when to do it.***

### **Two Years to 18 Months from ETS:**

- Find yourself a mentor who faced the same problems you will likely face.
- Choose your [civilian career](#) and make sure you'll be educated and trained with what you need to know by the time you leave the military.
- Did you use Tuition Assistance and are you on track to graduate before you leave the military? Make sure you leave the military with an education or a certified skill.
- What will you do with your G.I. Bill – will you need it to Top-up your TA benefits? Will you need it on the outside or should you transfer it to your dependents? Are you even eligible to transfer them?
- Make sure you'll have enough [money saved up](#) in case of a [tight job market](#) when you get out. Having all the skills and training in the world won't help when no one is hiring. If you have to wait or move to get that job, be sure you're financially prepared for that with a smart and realistic budget.
- Start meeting people in your desired career field or [college](#) – this is also known as [“networking.”](#) It's much easier to get in to that [dream school](#) or dream job when the school or business already knows you, likes you, and believes you can get the job done.

### **One Year:**

- Since I know you made that pre-separation budget six months ago, give that another pass and make sure you're on track. If your destination changed, you'll have to re-evaluate the budget entirely, to include both the cost of moving and the cost of living.
- If you're [going to school](#) after leaving, it's time to choose where you're going, what to study, and start the application process. Make sure you know which parts of the application are due and when.
- This might be a good time for you to learn about VA home loans as well as the process of buying house. If you're going to move to a new

area, you might be able to get house hunting orders.

- Begin the process of getting out of the military, which includes informing your unit and command while starting all the relevant paperwork and taking all the transition assistance classes offered or required. You may even be assigned a counselor.

### **Six Months to Go:**

- Make sure your budget projections are being filled and still make sense. Isn't it great to know you'll have all the money you'll need for all the small expenses that come up along the way?
  - Learn to [write a resume](#) and write up your own, preferably after meeting with a career counselor and having them look it over. Be sure to show this to your transition mentor and your civilian career mentor (if they aren't the same person). You can never have too many eyes on your resume.
    - Use this [resume](#) to start your job search if you haven't started looking already.

*Military service members and veterans have seen major changes to their pay and benefits over the past several years. For the most part, it's good news.*

Basic pay has been rising, and service members saw a 2.7% increase in 2022. [Basic Allowance for Housing increased](#), on average, by 5.1% in 2022, up from 2021's 2.9% increase. It was the largest BAH increase since before 2016.

The BAH increase reflects the skyrocketing costs of housing around the country. At the same time other increasing costs nationwide, including health care costs, have affected military families in other ways, with some increases in Tricare costs and pharmacy costs.


