GOD'S OVERFLOWING KINDNESS

The superabundance of God's kindness ties all of today's readings together. Especially when life overwhelms us, the Lord provides all we need, and then some. In the Acts of the Apostles, Peter takes the lead when facing the Sanhedrin. We might expect the man who denied Jesus to crumble under the imposing glare of the high priest. Instead, the Holy Spirit helps him testify to his faith in Jesus Christ. What Peter had lacked before, courage and conviction, God provides in abundance. Similarly, today's Gospel shows Jesus providing a surplus of fish for the disciples. They have no luck fishing until the Lord intercedes. Jesus supplies an almost ridiculous number of fish, and he cooks it for them, too. As our reading from Revelation affirms, the overflowing riches of God require constant praise. 

DID YOU KNOW? How long is the Easter Season?

Much like Christmas, Easter is no "one-day" feast

The Church knows that one day of rejoicing just isn't enough. Easter is the "Solemnity of Solemnities"—the biggest feast day of the year. It's so big, in fact, that the Church celebrates it for not one, but *eight full days!*

For her most important feast days, the Church assigns "octaves": eight days of rejoicing in which we celebrate each day as though it were the feast day itself. We have celebrated the Easter octave all through this past week.

But does our Easter celebration end there? Is it all over once the octave concludes? The resounding answer is: **No!** Within these fifty days we celebrate some important feasts: Divine Mercy Sunday (that's this Sunday), the Feast of the Ascension (in most places, the Sunday before Pentecost), and finally, Pentecost itself, the birthday of the Church! After the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity (6/12) and then Corpus Christi (June 19th) we resume the designation of "Ordinary Time". You will note that at that time the priest's vestments return to green.

FROM BISHOP WEISENBURGER

At this time [February 26, 2022] the protocol recommendations that follow below are largely at the discretion of the Pastor or Parish Administrator. In turn, those in leadership are strongly recommended to check with their local county health department for current COVID-19 recommendations.

The use of facemasks, especially by vulnerable persons or to protect vulnerable persons, is encouraged.

Properly ventilate public spaces.

Social distancing between individuals at Mass and gatherings whenever possible. Washing hands to reduce chances of passing on contagion.

- Parishes are encouraged to offer at least one Mass per weekend following full protocols. (This is the 5:00 Saturday Anticipatory Mass at Our Lady of Lourdes)
- People who are not vaccinated but wish to volunteer in public ministries are strongly encouraged to use facemasks. (Those in ministry with minors should be vaccinated.)
- Fully vaccinated as well as unvaccinated individuals who are immune compromised, including those undergoing transplant or cancer treatment, should seek the guidance of their clinical care team before discontinuing mask use.

People who are vaccinated and develop symptoms of COVID-19 should get tested for COVID-19. Volunteers who develop symptoms of COVID-19 should withdraw from service until they obtain a negative COVID-19 test and are symptom-free.

Be a Witness to Your Student!

Young people today are really watching adults in how they live out their faith. They are not likely to follow you as a teacher until they experience you as a witness.

We should we willing to share personal testimony with your student, to pray with them daily, and to live a life that invites them into the fullness of Church tradition. A life that is centered around both the deeds of God and the Word of God.

Six easy ways to be a witness:

1. Read the bible daily. Scripture tells the story of human salvation and helps us to "be transformed by the renewal of our minds" (Rom 12:2).

2. Learn about the lives of the Saints together. The saints help us to understand how God brings us to perfect union with Him, and they, as our heavenly friends, intercede for us who are still on the way and trying to do His will.

3. Volunteer together. Study and reflection cannot stand alone in growing in faith. The foundation learned from the scriptures, prayers and Church teaching must be put into action.

4. Go to confession. In the Sacrament of penance Jesus responds personally to our desire to be in relationship with Him and opens our lives to the power of God's healing grace.

5. Spend time with Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament. During this Eucharistic adoration you can help your student be still and listen to Jesus tell them how much He loves them.

6. When they go to college, Connect them with the Newman Society on their campus.
