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



January 26, 2025

Call to Order: The Annual Meeting was called to order by President Dean Lindquist at 10:15 am.

Attendance: 61 members, Quorum met.

Opening Prayer: Led by Pastor Tim Routh.

*Tracy Tebben agreed to act as our Parliamentarian. Carla Miller – Secretary took Minutes.

Adoption of the Agenda as written:

*Shari Klaers made a motion to accept the Agenda as written. Tim Renner 2nd the motion. All approved and motion carried.

Approval of the Minutes from the 2024 Annual Meeting:

*Guy Christianson made a motion to accept the Minutes of the 2024 Annual Meeting as written. Ron Peterson 2nd the motion. All approved and motion carried.

Review of the 2024 Financial Summary:

Presented by Sonya Erickson – Treasurer. She presented a "summarized" version of the Financial Summary. The full Summary is in the Annual Report. Sonya stated that the current mortgage balance is \$442,000.00. The mortgage is up for renewal in April 2025. The interest rate of 4.25% will be increasing to 6.675-7%. The Council will be looking at starting up a Capital campaign to pay down the principal prior to renewal.

Presentation of the 2024 Mission Plan:

The members of the Mission Plan Team were President Dean Lindquist, Mike Klaers, Pastor Tim Routh and Pastor Katherine Rood.

Dean Lindquist stated that our church should not remain stagnant, we want to see growth, excitement, and enthusiasm but maintain a reasonable budget to work with.

Sonya Erickson, Treasurer explained to the members that the Mission Plan was developed by using past history, and adding 15% increase. Once again, inflation is a key factor, pay increases to staff, maintenance of our facility, and rising insurance costs.

Nominating Committee Report:

President Dean Lindquist presented the report. He highlighted the following openings:

- Faith Church Council – Jennifer Hanson volunteered to renew her term for 3 years.
- Nominate Sara Goebel for Council.
- Endowment Committee – Nominate Julie Wurm

There are a few openings in other Committees. Please speak with Council members if you are interested in volunteering. Dean Lindquist asked the floor 3 times for any more nominations. No additional names were given.

New Business:

Elections:

*Tim Renner made a motion to nominate Jennifer Hanson for a 2nd term on the Council and nominate Sara Goebel for 1st term on the Church council. Dave Mikelson 2nd the motion. All approved and motion carried.

*Doug Gronli made a motion to nominate Julie Wurm for a seat on the Endowment Committee. Mike Buboltz 2nd the motion. All approved and motion carried.

Approval of the Mission Plan:

*Tim Renner made a motion to approve the 2025 Mission Plan as presented. Jan Christianson 2nd the motion. All approved and motion carried.

Staff and Ministry Reports:

The reports can be found in the 2025 Annual Report Booklet. Any questions can be directed to the Pastors or Staff.

Pastor Tim Routh gave a brief recap of his 2025 goals including:

1. Create a Task Force for the development of the future of the Praise and Play wing.
2. Create a Capital Campaign Drive to pay down the Mortgage balance before renewing the loan in April.
3. Enhancing the Wednesday evening Contemporary service and look at the possibility of Summer Wednesday evening service outdoors.

Dean Lindquist wanted to give a special "Thank You" to Tina Magner for her hard work as Office Administrator. She did a wonderful job putting together a beautiful Annual Report Booklet. Also, Dean recognized Marti Carlson for her time on the Council and the Hospitality Committee. She helped in bringing back the "Committees", the Digital Membership Booklet, Magnetized Name tags to name a few. A "Big Thank you" to our wonderful staff and all the members of Faith.

As the world continues to turn, I want to be an advocate for the needy and uphold justice and peace in our broken world. This is part of affirming our baptism in Jesus' name.


Lastly, I thank all the council, the volunteers, and our staff for their prayers, work, and loving kindness in making Jesus' known to our community. You are the light of the world!

With the completion of Faith Commons, the Council is ready to explore Mission programming in 2026...opening our doors for you and our neighbors!



Some highlights from the worship and music program this year include:

1. Two new compositions were premiered at Faith Lutheran. At Easter we performed "He is Not Here" written by Ron Lunz, and arranged for choir and piano by local composer Carol Meier. Then, during advent we performed "Abide With Me, Evermore" which combines the hymns "Abide With Me" and "Of the Father's Love Begotten". The vocal parts were written by Katherine Ragan for her master's degree. Then piano, oboe and flute parts were written by Carol Meier. We were blessed to collaborate with flautist Lorie Skaro-Johnson for Advent, and featured Bob Whitney on oboe as well.
2. Faith Lutheran Hosted the Prairie Arts Chorale again in 2025.
3. Peace and Faith choirs collaborated for our 3rd annual combined Thanksgiving Eve Service, and the sound of the mass ensemble was powerful and beautiful. We hope to collaborate more often in the future!
4. The choir welcomed 7 new members this year! Before the snowbirds went south, we were quickly approaching 40 members. It is exciting to see our music program growing!

A note from Todd: At the Feast, we leaned into an intentional time to pause during our busy week. To eat, fellowship, learn, pray, and worship together. New songs alongside classic and familiar songs and hymns provided a space to connect with God and each other. Confirmation students helped with various parts of the service which is a great way to learn about serving our community. Thanks for joining us on this journey!

A note from Katherine: Thank you Faith Lutheran Church! Fine arts are thriving here at Faith, and it is only possible because of the continued encouragement and support for these programs from all of you. I am grateful for this support, but even more so for your active engagement with music during worship. Every time I go home to see my folks and attend worship with them, I am saddened by their diminished music program. They had a choir when I was in high school, which dwindled after the declining health of their organist and director. But the bigger grief I feel while attending there is due to the fact that their congregation does not participate in music making during worship. This makes service feel hollow to me and makes me self-conscious to sing lest the entire service becomes one long "Katherine solo". I have never experienced that here, and I hope I never shall. PROPERTY REPORT

Dear Members of Faith Lutheran,

Thank you for your continued support of our church during 2025. Your generosity of time, talent, and resources made it possible to complete several important projects and to continue caring for our campus and ministries.

A major undertaking this year was the renovation of the former Praise and Play Daycare area, now referred to as Faith Commons. A wall was removed to create one large gathering room, and a dedicated team of volunteers constructed and stained stadium-style seating and benches in an adjacent room, as well as installed smart TVs to support programming in a comfortable setting. All rooms were repainted and decorated according to specific themes, LVP flooring was installed in the entryway to replace worn carpet, and final touches included professional carpet cleaning and the stripping and waxing of vinyl floors; on Rally Sunday in September, an open house was held to share the results of this work with the congregation.

Another significant improvement was the installation of new lighting in the Fellowship gathering area. This project was funded through dedicated gifts from the Wenzel family and the Iverson family, and the enhanced lighting has greatly improved visibility and usability throughout this heavily used space. Because this area serves so many events and ministries, the upgraded lighting represents a particularly meaningful enhancement to our shared life together.



Work also progressed very well on the Wood-Fired Oven project, led by Dean Lindquist and a team of many volunteers. This highly visible addition to our campus is expected to support a vibrant new ministry once it becomes fully operational in the coming year. It represents both an investment in our facilities and a creative opportunity for hospitality and outreach.

Across Faith's large campus, there were no major unexpected repairs during 2025; however, many building components are now approximately 22–25 years old, and planning for future needs is prudent. In the coming years, attention will likely be required for parking lot resurfacing and striping, potential replacement of HVAC units as they fail, ongoing monitoring of the flat roof sections for leaks, and repainting of the sanctuary and other key interior areas.

Grateful recognition is extended to the lawn mowing and snow removal crews, including Eric Anderson, Matt Bisek, Don Johnson, Ed Fick, David Spears, Aaron Finstrom, Nate Grotelueschen, and others who assist in this work. Your consistent efforts to maintain the grounds help present a well-cared-for and welcoming appearance to all who come to Faith. Special appreciation is also expressed to Jan and Guy Christenson for their diligent care of the flowers around the church and for all that they contribute in visible and behind-the-scenes ways.

In closing, thank you, the members of Faith Lutheran, for supporting a beautiful and inviting campus of which we can all be proud of. Your continued support is deeply appreciated.

When I think back on 2025, what I feel most is gratitude.

This year marked a big shift for me as I stepped into youth ministry this fall. With that came new rhythms, new relationships, and plenty of learning along the way. I am incredibly thankful for the grace you have shown me during this transition, for the encouragement that has been offered so freely, and for the trust placed in me as I continue to grow into this role. Walking alongside our young people and their families in this way has already been such a gift.

The year was full even before fall arrived. Last summer was a really good one. As we look ahead, there is a lot to be excited about. We are already preparing for our High School Summer Trip to Winston-Salem, North Carolina, where we will serve and learn alongside Spark'Dwell. This trip will invite our students to slow down and dwell deeply in scripture, in community, and in hands on service. These experiences matter. They help young people connect faith to real life and begin to see how God is at work in the world and in them.

Youth ministry never happens alone. It is built on relationships and shared commitment. I am thankful for parents who trust us with their kids, volunteers who show up and say yes, leaders who listen well, and a congregation that truly sees young people as an important part of the church right now, not just someday.

If you have ever felt a small nudge that you might want to be involved, I would love to talk with you. That could look like mentoring, helping occasionally, or simply being another caring and consistent presence. There is space for you, and your willingness matters more than you might think.

Then the kids split into 2 groups of various ages and do a craft/art project based on the night's biblical theme. Then we all come back together to do a Bible lesson and discussion. We end the night with time playing a large group game or activity.

On the average night, we have about 12-22 kids total that are ages Preschool through 5th grade. The Seeds + Sprouts activities and themes are different each week.

Highlights from the year:

- Trying new crafts and using new art supplies
- Learning about Who I Am In Christ, Parables, Lent, Creation, Being Anti-Racist, and Advent
- Having an end of the school year Game Night and Family Bingo Night
- Completing 3 Service Projects
- Making cards and making homemade soup for the seniors that Faith volunteers visit
- Participating in the All Church Halloween, All Church Thanksgiving and All Church Christmas parties with games, snacks and games

- Seeing the older kids help the younger kids and lead by example
- Having amazing parent and teen volunteers coming weekly and having parents help extra with service project night

Faith's Children's Ministry continues to be an important asset to our church. Our program staff transitioned from Julie Knutson to Joy White this fall 2025. Currently there are 2 paid staff operating as Educational Coordinators, Libbie Anderson (Seeds & Sprouts and PK VBS Coordinator) and Joy White (Sunday School and Other Youth Education Duties). Welcome Center volunteers have gathered materials for the lessons each week. The teamwork of the Education Committee, the classroom teachers and parents reveals how Faith Lutheran continues to prioritize our children's spiritual growth and wellbeing.


Sunday School includes children who are 3 years old through 5th grade. Each Sunday the children meet in the multipurpose room for Kids Worship, led by Paul and Katherine Ragan. Then they proceed to their classrooms for a bible lesson and activity. We currently have 70 children enrolled. Sunday School funds help provide craft supplies and special art materials.

- Rally Sunday kick off with children receiving bibles, recognizing teachers, games and the bouncy house
- 15 excellent classroom teachers

- Sunday School children learning sign language as part of their weekly lesson
- PreK-5th Grade Christmas Program
- Blessing Bags made as service project to Lutheran Social Services and The Link

Faith WELCA has three active groups, **Rachel Circle**, **Faith Quilters**, and **School Bags for Lutheran World Relief**.

Rachel Circle:

The Rachel Circle met 11 times during 2025 at various members' homes. We had an average of 6 members present at each meeting. We use the Gather Magazine published by the Women of the ELCA. We hold business meetings following the Bible Study and close with prayer and table grace.

We take an offering at each meeting. During 2025 Rachel Circle made donations to LWR for the school bag project, Link, Tuesday Table, and Freezer Meals.

2025 Faith Quilters:

The Faith Quilters meet on the 2nd and 4th Mondays and Tuesdays of each month except for the months of June, July, August, and December from 9:00am-3:00 pm.

In the year of 2025 the quilters met for 29 days with an average just short of 8 people each day.

We made 138 quilts during those days and they have been distributed during the year. They included 21 quilts donated to the Faith High School Seniors, others went to Salvation Army, Red Cross, Lutheran World Relief, Family Promise, Willmar Community College Campus, Habitat for Humanity, and Hope Pregnancy Center.

This is a mission project and we function on monetary donations from the congregation, member's Thrivent donations, individual donations of material, yarn, thread, and individual volunteers (something to do for all talents or interests.)

Lutheran World Relief Backpack Program:

Lynda Manselle leads the school bag program. They sent off 121 completed school bags to LWR in September.

COLUMBARIUM REPORT

The Columbarium continues to be utilized, not only for inurnment of our members (2 in 2025) and neighbors but also for worship, solitude, and contemplation. It stands ready to continue those uses in 2026 and beyond. If you have not had an opportunity, we encourage each of you to take a walk down the sidewalk, stopping along the way to smell the fragrant flowers (in season, of course) read the inscriptions and consider purchasing a niche for your final resting place.

We wish to recognize and thank Tim Renner and his crew of lawn mowers and snow shoveling for keeping the entire Prayer Garden area looking neat and trim. There are always a lot of behind-the-scenes activities that must be undertaken to keep the area looking neat and inviting. We currently have **sold 49 of the 96 niches** with many of the purchasers having also paid their after-passing costs as well. To be fiscally prudent we have utilized these after-passing payments to acquire adequate urns to ensure that increasing costs do not have an adverse financial impact on the Columbarium account. The after-death funds are maintained in a special account to pay for the engraving and postage of the granite face plate at the time of passing. Moving forward into 2026 we are still planning to propose to the Council for continuance of Phase II. Once we begin that phase, we will be reaching out for volunteers to assist in the necessary labor. The units themselves will be installed as we see needs arise based upon sales of existing niches. Due to the increased cost of the future niche units themselves the individual niches will be marketed for a cost that will be higher than what the existing units are selling for so this is a good time to select and purchase a niche.



The cost of a niche in this unit remains at \$1600 which, together with the after-death costs (\$325 for each person) allows for the inurnment of 2 individuals. Answering our call to serve God out in the world, The Mission Committee assists Faith members in becoming involved in mission opportunities here at Faith and by following Christ to serve our neighbors beyond our doors, in the community, county, and world. A big THANK YOU to everyone who has supported their neighbors through missions this year! Our hope is that every member of Faith will answer this call to serve Christ's mission by helping others.

Please also consider being a member of the Mission Committee, to expand the individuals and perspectives on this committee.

With our member's generous gifts of time, work, and resources, Faith has supported the following organizations with our VOLUNTEER HOURS, MISSION OF THE MONTH OFFERINGS and NOISY OFFERINGS:

Safe Avenues – Provides advocacy, parenting time services, and emergency shelter for victims of domestic and sexual violence in a five (5) county area of West Central MN.

The Link – A partnership of Spicer and New London area congregations, providing programs to residents experiencing financial struggles. Our offering collections supported:

- **Food Pantry** – Providing groceries for families with food needs.
- **Wildcat Backpack food program** – Providing weekend food for NLS student families with food needs
- **Tuesday's Table** - A community meal for all on a weekly rotation of five (5) congregations. Meal is hosted at Faith by our volunteers on the 3rd Thursday of the Month.
- **Christmas Joy - (Faith's Mitten Tree)** Providing Christmas gifts for families in need.

Family Promise of Kandiyohi County – An interfaith ministry consisting of approximately twenty (20) congregations in the county serving families who are experiencing homelessness. FPKC opened a residential shelter in 2023. In addition to shelter bedrooms and kitchen, FPKC provides advocacy services to families seeking affordable housing. This is crucial to overcoming barriers in acquiring housing. Faith coordinates providing meals for FPKC guests five (5) weeks a year, with volunteers from Faith, Peace, and Universal Unitarian working together to provide meals and groceries on our scheduled weeks to Family Promise guests at their shelter in Willmar.

Community Garden – Fenced-in garden plots, on Faith's property, are available at a very affordable cost to anyone wishing to garden. Watering is included. A "Bounty Cart" offers excess vegetables to anyone.

Green Lake Lutheran Ministries (now Water's Edge Ministries) – A partnership of camps, communities, and congregations supporting Green Lake Bible Camp, Shores of St Andrew Bible Camp, and Camp House. These camps of the ELCA provide a wide variety of opportunities to campers and retreat participants of all ages. Faith is also blessed to provide summer worship services at Green Lake and a Noisy Offering collection goes to GLLM.

Vacation Bible School – Offering scholarships for a fun-filled Christian education experience to our youth. Partnering with Peace Lutheran Church and Green Lake Bible Camp.

Red Cross - Offering services in Central Minnesota for disaster relief and coordinating blood drives.

Freezer Meals - Here at Faith. Participants in the Freezer Meal Ministry pay for the groceries to make meals for their own families as well as cover the costs for additional meals that are frozen and stored at the church and later delivered to those who are grieving, experiencing illness, welcoming a baby or just in need of a meal. They get together in the afternoon and spend time together prepping, preparing, and dividing all the food so it is ready to be taken home for a quick and easy meal down the road.

Quilters – Making and providing warm quilts to Lutheran World Relief, Red Cross, Salvation Army, Faith's high school graduates, and various organizations in need. Traditionally, a quilt is also donated to the GLLM Auction.

Faith's annual plantings outside the church were boosted by Noisy Offering.

The Feast Meals received a Noisy Offering to help support this meal ministry to families on Wednesday evenings.

A new ministry at Faith is under the umbrella of our committee, the **Community Pizza Oven: Promoting Youth and Non-Profits**. Dozens of individuals and businesses have pitched in with donations and/or labor to get the wood-fired pizza oven to its current stage. Two grants through the Willmar Area Community Foundation have been applied for. To date, one grant has received funding through the New London-Spicer Area Fund to go towards the commercial freezer or refrigerator in a future outdoor kitchen.

STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT

Stewardship Committee engaged in story telling – highlighting events and activities across Faith through videos, we were able to share with the committee. Stewardship supported the mission and direction of the council in developing and communicating the Freed to Serve campaign – focused on reducing the principle on our mortgage. The Freed to Serve Campaign helped to decrease our mortgage by over \$155,000, with \$73,000 coming from our Capital Campaign dedicated fund and \$82,000 coming from gifts from our members.

In the coming year, we will continue to share the work of faith and invite gifts to support the mission of the church.


This year the endowment committee saw a rise in applications for grant dollars – success in spreading the word in the support for ministry that can come from our endowment grants! The endowment committee granted a total of \$9,510.71.

The grants were used to provide landscaping to the Habitat for Humanity house in Willmar, fund purchases by the parish arts team to create a warm and welcoming environment within our church, support the building of the outdoor pizza oven, and to contribute to updating the furniture in the previous youth room.

We also held a forum about the endowment to encourage giving this last year. In this upcoming year, we are excited to continue our granting cycle and will look for additional ways to invite gifts to the endowment.

The Parish Arts Team (PAT) is a group of people who plan and carry out activities and projects to make Faith Lutheran more welcoming and appealing visually by enhancing and celebrating the church seasons and festivals.

During the past year, PAT has taken care of the following for the church seasons: paraments, sanctuary streamers, displays, banners, outdoor planters, flowers for Easter and Christmas, outdoor flags, entry ways, table centerpieces and other areas as needed.


In addition, PAT has completed several special projects:

THE CIRCLE OF SUPPORT REPORT

Circle of Support Team



Mission Statement: To extend the love of Christ through a visitation ministry that seeks to grow and support relationships. Our focus group are those experiencing grief and loss.

Circle of Support is a group of Faith members who reach out to people who are experiencing grief and loss. This past year we have supported over 20 families through visits, card ministry and other contacts. Some of those families have been interested in a visitor following them. Faith had fewer deaths this year than in 2024! We continue to ask for help in identifying people in our congregation who are going through grief or loss. Our pastors have made visitation an important part of Faith's ministry.

Highlights:

- A spreadsheet is used to track people visited through Circle of Support to help pastors follow the needs for visitation or support. Members update the pastors on their contacts.
- We use the series of 4 Stephen Ministry grief booklets to share with people throughout the first year of their grief journey.
- New resources have been added to the Circle of Support Resource Library for members to access.
- New Prayer shawls/squares have been made by members to share with people.
- Through our card ministry, members who have had the death of a loved one are sent a note card included with resource information and phone numbers of the pastors for their use. A follow up is offered.
- A Blue Christmas was held at First Lutheran of Norway Lake together with Peace Lutheran and other churches on December 21st with Pastor Tim participating.
- A gift of money enabled Circle Support together with Faith Visitation to share 52 Amaryllis bulbs with people we have been following this year. Poinsettias and Easter flowers are also shared.
- In September, Evy Hatjistilianos gave a presentation Loneliness, Listening, and Love to Circle of Support and Faith Visitors to provide new information and suggestions to help us in our visitation ministry.
- Our group sponsored OWL Camp in May as a part of reaching out to offer more socialization for older wiser learners.
- For 2026 we are hoping to offer additional adult forums on death/funeral planning, meet quarterly to connect, offer more visitation training, and offer a grief support group when needed.

As we enter into our 16th year, we are pleased to report that Tuesday Table continues to feed many guests each month. Over the year **2025** we plated an average of **147 meals** per month or **1763 meals for the year**, a 6% increase from the year before. This could not happen without the 20 to 30 volunteers that donate milk, ice cream and most

importantly, provide helping hands and smiles all around. Thanks to Jennie-O Turkey Store for providing donations of various types of turkey at no cost. Our goal is to provide a tasteful, nutritious meal at a low enough price point that many can be served. While a nutritious meal is an important goal, a second and equally important goal is to provide a welcoming atmosphere where conversation and a feeling of community abound.



Going forward in 2026 the plans are to continue to provide volunteer opportunities and great meals on the 3rd Tuesday of each month. We are always looking for new volunteers to contribute time and expertise. Participation can include helping to set tables, food preparation and delivery, washing dishes, greeting guests or sometimes simply stopping for a meal on Tuesday evening. Youth are especially welcomed to help serve with age being no limitation. Meal prep

starts at 3pm, guests began to arrive by 5:15, the meal is served at 6 and all the work including clean up is usually done by 7:15 PM.

The Lutefisk Team

This year's Lutefisk Supper is one for the history books. Faith's Lutefisk team served a record breaking 700 plus dinners marking an increase of over 20%. The tradition of joyfully serving others and the Lord and watching the volunteers rise to every occasion is wonderful. Serving others out of sense of community is an experience learned through participation and support of the entire congregation. Serving others graciously is not a gift but rather something we learn by doing. It takes over 100 people to put this entire reunion together along with solid marketing and promotion. A lot of these team members had worked together in 2024 to prepare for and serve this large sized group which helps the entire event to go off with very few hitches. In fact, some had been helping with the Lutefisk for 25 years. We had people learn to bake bread together, to make lefse without antagonizing the Lefse Nisse, to organize the various teams and to support each other. Thanks to Pastor Dan Bowman who brought his Lefse Catechism and grill from Hawk Creek Lutheran to help make lefse. Everyone worked well together and experienced the fun and camaraderie of being part of a team. So here are the particulars.



Together we served just over 700 meals of lutefisk and meatballs. Even though we ordered an extra 25# of fish that week we only had about a couple of pounds of cooked fish and 7 pounds of fresh fish out of the 375# ordered along with several meatballs leftover which sold quickly along with the left over lefse and cookies. That amounts to about $\frac{1}{2}$ pound of fish per diner which means that many ate more




fish than that since some only had meatballs. Diners were especially impressed with all the youth that helped and how well everyone worked together with a smile. They also appreciated that even while working the volunteers made time to stop and visit with the meal goers.

Hopefully everyone got a chance to see the new Lutefisk shirts that adorned the volunteers. Very nice and well received by all. Overall, a very successful rendition of the Lutefisk Opener. It accomplished the goals of enhancing the feel of community, brought people into our church home, and provided an opportunity for our youth to volunteer and serve. It also provided an opportunity for the diners to renew old acquaintances and make new friends. Mange tusen takk to everyone that pitched in with food donations and with organizing and volunteering. Next year will be here before we know it.

We look forward to construction work beginning late this winter. We also look forward to welcoming everyone for an open house and dedication this summer!

Bringing Healing and Hope

"Then the angel showed me the river of the water of life..... On either side of the river is the tree of life with its twelve kinds of fruit, producing its fruit each month, and the leaves of the tree are for the healing of the nations." – Revelation 22:1-2

There is no doubt that our world, our nation, our communities, and our congregations need healing – the healing that only the way of Jesus can bring.

We know that life in the church will not return to the way things used to be. We understand that this new reality causes uncertainty and discouragement for congregations seeking a pastor. But the other reality that we see is the Holy Spirit raising up lay leaders who are sensing that their gifts can be used by God for leadership in their congregations. We are grateful to Wartburg Seminary and Lilly Endowment, Inc., for the grant of \$50,000 we received last year, and now \$27,600 for this coming year, for the development of a Mentor Program to support our lay leaders who will begin to serve as Synod-Authorized Ministers (SAMs). Our goal for this program is to equip people in our congregations to live out their baptismal calling in their daily lives, wherever and whatever that may be.

Your synod staff is dedicated to working with congregations and rostered ministers who find themselves in any point of transition. We are here to listen, provide guidance, and to support and encourage the work of the Spirit across the synod.

The Sr. High Youth Gathering is growing back year by year post-pandemic. The LYO Board provides ever-new and refreshing leadership for these events. And our gifted Synod Youth Band leads worship for the gatherings and for Synod Assembly.

We give thanks for the revitalization of the Companion Synod relationship over the past few years. Thank you for the leadership of our long-time and previous Co-Chairs of the Companion Synod Committee, Rev. Rebecca Sullivan and Peg Hatlestad, who have retired from their roles after 20 and 15 years of involvement with our Companion Synod. We are so grateful for their faithful leadership and continued interest in this important ministry.

From Dec. 7-22, four of us had the privilege of journeying to South Africa at the invitation of the ELCA and the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Southern Africa (ELCSA). Rev. Janel Kuester, Rev. Hollie Holt-Woehl, Randall Holt-Woehl, and I joined leaders from six other ELCA synods and our ELCSA companions to talk together about lay theological education and our companion relationships. These relationships are based on "accompaniment" values of mutuality, inclusivity, vulnerability, empowerment, and sustainability, to which this ministry remains committed. During our time in the South Eastern Diocese we were able to worship with over 650 young people, learn from some of the earliest congregations and mission stations in the SED, and celebrate the 50th Jubilee Anniversary of ELCSA. Standing out for all of these celebrations was the commitment to God's Word, and the music, joy, and dancing of worship.

As we live in this time of uncertainty and change, we give thanks for the gift of being Church Together in Jesus Christ. Thank you for your partnership. In Jesus Christ, we as the church know healing and this healing is truly a source of hope.



BETHESDA MEMBER CONGREGATION REPORT

Chery & Jeff Johnson



Jeff and I for the second year, attended Bethesda's annual meeting on October 23, 2025 as representatives of Faith as a supporting congregation. Bethesda is a locally led and managed nonprofit that provides housing and care for seniors including skilled nursing care, short-stay therapy, home health care, outpatient therapy, independent and assisted living, adult day services, and a wellness center. They have 3 campuses, the main campus in Willmar, North Pointe in New London, and an assisted living site in Olivia. There are about 23 member congregations of various denominations who help to support the mission of Bethesda. Representatives from the member churches are invited to attend the annual meeting to learn about the mission and accomplishments of the organization over the past year.

Some of the highlights from 2025 included:

- The organization has a \$53.1-million-dollar budget. Of that, \$25.4 million is invested into payroll for its approximately 600 employees.
- \$0.91 of every dollar generated goes back to resident care, programs & services provided.
- Bethesda provides excellent care. They received a 5 of 5 rating from the Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services and is the only facility in Kandiyohi County to receive such a rating for exceptional staffing and quality of care. The nursing staff hours per resident is 5 hours, 6 minutes compared to the state average of 4 hours, 13 minutes per resident per day.
- Just over \$171,920 was invested back into staff tuition, student scholarships and education to maintain quality care for its residents and ensure that staff are afforded opportunities to grow within the Bethesda family.
- Bethesda Foundation hosted their annual Sweetest Christmas Soiree with a bake sale and gala at Max on the Green at Spicer's Little Crow Golf Resort. The foundation supports needs at Bethesda that are not covered by other sources. They raise funds for Chaplaincy Services, Hospice, Resident life. Donations and bequeathments are always welcome.
- Other Bethesda services include Support groups for Parkinson's & Alzheimer's, Diseases, Hospice, Homecare, Adult Day Services, Outpatient Therapy, and Club Bethesda.

Bethesda continues to grow!

- 10 additional independent living units and a heated saltwater pool on the North Point Campus in New London opened in December of 2024. Included in the saltwater pool area is also a steam room. There are ongoing water aerobics classes both at North Point and at the Willmar campus as well as a fully functional fitness center open to individuals over 50 years of age at both sites.
- On November 4th the 118 unit Stone Ridge independent living housing project on Willmar Avenue welcomed the community with an Open House. It was a great opportunity for everyone to see the beautiful housing options that are now available in the Stone Ridge project. Shortly after new residents were able to move into their new apartments.

Bethesda provides many opportunities to participate in supporting the elderly and disabled. Those interested in participating can volunteer time and talents as well as provide financial support in conjunction with the Bethesda Foundation. Chery is also honored to serve on Bethesda's Board of Directors.

- **Strengthening Our Team:** Welcomed Per Nestingen as Program Director at Shores of St. Andrew and Dennis Carroll as Food Service Manager – both bringing fresh energy and deep commitment to Christ-centered hospitality and programming
- **Growing the Next Generation of Disciples:** Rejoiced in a 20% increase in summer youth campers, a clear sign that God is drawing more young people into life-changing faith experiences
- **Protected by God's Hand:** Gave thanks for narrowly escaping a potentially devastating wildfire near Camp House in May, while praying for God's comfort for those affected in the surrounding community.
- **Fueling Ministry Through Generosity:** Experienced a record increase in annual support, thanks in part to the enduring success of the Quilt Auction and Dinner Theater, which continue to foster joyful giving and deep community connection.

New Name, Same Mission

In February 2025, delegates at the Annual Meeting unanimously approved changing our name from Green Lake Lutheran Ministries to Water's Edge Ministries—a name that fully reflects the breadth and heart of our ministry today.

The name Water's Edge Ministries:

- Reflects the places where Jesus called, healed, and transformed lives—where people encountered God in profound ways.
- Speaks to the way we invite all people to experience renewal, connection, and faith formation.
- Embraces all our sites and programs from Green Lake Bible Camp to Day Camp, Shores of St. Andrew to Serve Boldy, Retreats to Camp House, and more.

What's not changing:

- Our mission remains steadfast.
- Our sites and programs continue strongly.

At the Water's Edge Capital Campaign

Building a remarkable success of Phase One, Phase Two began with great energy in 2025. Out of \$1.3 million goal, nearly \$350,000 has already been committed through gifts & pledges.

Phase Two has four components to enhance Water's Edge Ministries:

1. Site and Facility Updates that are crucial to supporting our mission's longevity.
2. Future Strategic Planning that lays the groundwork for the next decade.
3. Rebranding that will rejuvenate our identity and resonate with our community.
4. Retiring Debt that ensures our ability to embrace future opportunities for growth.

We ask passionate individuals and congregations to get involved and make an impact with generous gifts of support.

Treasurer's Report

Council Treasurer, Sonya Erickson

2025 Financial Summary – Faith Lutheran Church

2025 was a strong year of generosity and faithful stewardship at Faith Lutheran Church.

Mortgage & Major Projects

- \$155,973 was paid toward the mortgage principal beyond required payments
- Over \$82,000 came from the Freed to Serve fundraiser
- Mortgage balance reduced to \$236,292
- Interest rate increased from 4.25% to 7.125% in May
- Mortgage paydown will free up over \$2,300 per month for ministry

You also contributed \$5,723 toward the Faith Commons remodel, along with over \$3,900 in in-kind gifts.

Overall Giving

- Total giving (general + special fundraisers): \$651,463
- General finances and cashflow were strained during the year
- Internal borrowing peaked at nearly \$75,000 in September
- December giving allowed us to end the year borrowing only \$12,433

Due to cash-flow pressures, the part-time Youth Director position was eliminated and a Ministry Associate contract was not renewed.

Designated Funds

During 2025, designated funds were used to:

- Apply \$73,000 toward the mortgage
- Fund \$13,000 for Faith Commons
- Invest \$30,000 in building and equipment
- Release \$37,000 to support general operations

Looking Ahead

The Mission Plan Team and Council are proposing a **bare-bones 2026 budget**, which assumes a **2.8% increase in general giving** plus $\frac{2}{3}$ of the Freed to Serve receipts. Further reductions would impact staffing, programs, and missional support.
