HOA VS. GENERAL IMPROVEMENT DISTRICT (GID)

CP HOA: \$50 Annual Dues, Covenant Control, Board Meetings, Events and Social Activities, and Neighborhood Communications: The Cherry Pickins' Newsletter, Email Blasts, Website, Social Media, Temporary Signage & Neighborhood Fliers.

General Improvement District GID (Fund): Small % of your property taxes goes into a fund designated for our neighborhood's common areas, including installation & maintenance for the following: landscaping, tree trimming & removal, irrigation, entry signage, electrical, common fence maintenance, & water line leaks. The fund was established 40 years ago at the same tax rate you pay today & is managed by the City of Centennial. Each home pays approximately ~\$150-\$175 per year into the fund. The current balance of the GID fund, held by the City of Centennial, is ~\$170K.

John Castellano is a volunteer GID representative who serves as a liaison between the CP HOA and the City of Centennial. Every fall, the GID rep meets with the city & establishes a budget for the upcoming year, which includes fund allocation for the work necessary as listed above (landscaping, tree trimming, irrigation, etc.). All work conducted on the CP common areas requires an insured, licensed contractor with documents filed with the city. Neither the CP HOA nor the CP GID representative have contractors on retainer.

Common area GID fences: Residents with a common area fence need to take preventative maintenance for their portion of the fence use, which includes maintaining the fence to ensure its integrity and limit the need for costly repairs. Given our fences are roughly 40 years old, we realize all repairs will be a temporary fixes. The GID and your CP HOA are currently working together on replacing the common area fencing with a new Trex fence. A new fence cost will be distributed amongst all CP homeowners. We all benefit and your HOA and GID rep are diligently working on obtaining the best pricing we can for quality workmanship. Please come to the next HOA meeting for more info.

SPRING CLEANING: FRESHEN UP YOUR CURB APPEAL

Enhance the front door. Ramp up the curb appeal by painting it a rich hue, updating door hardware, or adding a new front door mat or knocker. For a seasonal touch, hang a spring wreath!

Add plantings. Remember, curb appeal starts at the curb — so add an extra layer of foliage and color to create a sense of depth, making your front yard appear larger. (Wait till mid-late May for planting outdoors!) **Make house numbers visible.** Large house numbers in a clear font are the easiest to read from a distance. Place them where they are not obstructed by trees or porch railings and them beneath a porch lamp or landscape light so they will be illuminated in the evening.

Group items on the porch. Cluster three pots or lanterns of various sizes on your front porch or stairs, and fill them with blooming spring flowers.

Prep your grass and mulch the flower beds. If you have a lawn, early spring is a good time to reseed or add sod if it looks like it's coming back patchy. Mulch flower beds with a natural mulch to help the soil retain moisture and give the beds a finished look.

How's the housing market doing? It's a simple question, but the answer is far from easy. Denver is a very stable market, having secured its position as the hottest housing market in the nation by US News and World Report. However, the challenge of affordable housing still persists. Over the last decade, the average Denver metro home sale increased from \$306,000 to \$678,000. The market surge has certainly redefined what is considered to be a luxury home. Listings priced at \$1 million or higher are categorized in the luxury market and are now playing a large role in keeping homes sale prices steady. Data from MLS Recolorado reveals a 44% year-over-year increase in listings priced at \$1 million plus. Unfortunately, properties priced at \$500,000 or less only grew by 8%. This can pose some unique challenges for homes that are almost in that luxury bracket from \$750K-\$1M. It is important to strike the right balance between attracting buyers and maximizing returns in a home

listing strategy. Cherry Park recently saw its first home listed for over a million, which received 35 showings and 6 offers within its first weekend on market. Now under contract, we expect this home sale on East Euclid Place to set a record high sale for our neighborhood. The first quarter's data shows that homes in 80111 (similar to both our lot and home sizes) are on average closing at a cost of \$292-312 per square foot finished.
