







The Christmas we know today took shape in Victorian times, when the rowdier celebrations of earlier periods were toned down into a quieter familyfocused festival. Queen Victoria and her husband Albert, with their nine children, played a big part in these changes. The Christmas trees Albert popularised from his native home, Germany, in 1840 rapidly caught on, as did decking them with lights and presents, by now given on Christmas Day itself. Victorian children's presents were usually quite modest, such as sweets, nuts or oranges, although wealthier kids might hope for a gift echoing the latest technology, such as a toy

train. 'Christmas Box' tips to servants and tradesmen were left until 26 December, hence called 'Boxing Day'. Many other now-familiar elements of Christmas also originated in this period, including printed Christmas cards, Christmas crackers, and eating turkey (instead of the traditional goose) and Christmas pudding. Even 'Santa Claus' and his reindeer sleigh first came here from America in the 1870s. Most Victorian families went to church at Christmas, and the words (if not always the tunes) of many popular carols (including 'Good King Wenceslas', 'Once in Royal David's City' and 'O Come All Ye Faithful') are Victorian.

People also provided gifts or Christmas feasts for poorer neighbours (a tradition promoted by Charles Dickens' 1843 'Christmas Carol' Scrooge story), and parties for tenants children were an annual Christmas event at many different mansions. 






Pigs in Blankets



Pigs in blankets are too delicious to be reserved for a one-off Christmas side dish - try them as a party snack or with roast chicken. They take no time to make and will be just how you like them.

Preparation time less than 30 mins Cooking time 10 to 30 mins Serves 8

Ingredients

- 8 thin slices streaky bacon
- 16 chipolata sausages
- · cocktail sticks, to secure the bacon

Method

- 1. Preheat the oven to 200C/180C Fan/Gas 6.
- 2. Place the bacon on a chopping board, then using the side of the knife, stretch and flatten the bacon until about half as long again.

3. Cut each strip of bacon in half across, then wrap each piece around a chipolata, securing with cocktail sticks.

4. Place in a roasting tray and roast for 15 minutes until

Sense of purpose

Social inclusion can help people feel valued and useful, and can give a sense of purpose and direction.

Better mental health

Social interaction can help reduce the risk of depression and anxiety.

Reduced isolation

Social inclusion can help prevent feelings of isolation, which can be caused by many factors including retirement, loss of loved ones, and decreased mobility.

Intergenerational connections

Intergenerational connections can help people feel connected to the community and challenge ageist beliefs.

Lifelong learning

Lifelong learning can help older people stay engaged with the community and feel valued.

Offer companionship:

Spend time with loved ones and friends, or if you can't be together in person, call or video chat.

Listen:

Provide a safe space for people to talk about their feelings or reminisce.

· Help with practical tasks:

Offer to help with putting up decorations, shopping, or stocking the fridge.

• Respect peoples preferences:

Find out how they like to celebrate and respect their choices.

• Don't make assumptions:

Some people are happy to spend the holidays alone, and it's not fair to assume they're lonely just because they alone.

FORGET ME NOT GARDENING TIPS Garden Tips

What to do during December in your garden and home.

Flowers

- Protect terracotta pots from cracking in freezing weather by bringing them indoors or wrapping in bubble polythene
- ➤ Rake up accumulated fallen leaves in borders that could be harbouring slugs and other pests
- Plant bare-root roses and other deciduous shrubs, plus ornamental trees
- ➤ Hang bird feeders near roses to attract hungry birds that will also pick off any overwintering pests

- ➤ Cut stems of berried winter shrubs, seasonal flowers and evergreen leaves for festive decorations and wreaths
- ➤ Move plants in pots to a sheltered spot if conditions turn very cold, as their roots are more exposed to the elements
- ➤ Pile straw or bracken around the base of tender shrubs and climbers to protect them from falling temperatures
- > Prune climbing roses between now and February
- ➤ Hard prune overgrown shrubs and hedges while they're dormant.






FORGET ME NOT GARDENING TIPS

House plants

- Give houseplants extra humidity to combat the drying effects of central heating
- Repot moth orchids after flowering if they look like they're about to burst out of their pot
- Water house plants less frequently and move them off particularly cold windowsills at night.
- Repot any house plants that have become top heavy or pot bound into larger containers
- Move houseplants onto a sunny windowsill over the winter, to get as much light as possible during the

- shorter days, or choose indoor plants suited to low light
- > Some house plants, like snake plants, are particularly prone to collecting dust on their leaves. So be sure to give these a wipe regularly
- > Put large-leaved house plants into the bath or shower and hose them down to clean off accumulated dust

Garden maintenance

- Top up bird baths with fresh water every day during frosty weather
- > Bring all watering equipment indoors, including hoses and sprinklers, so they don't freeze and split
- Scoop fallen leaves and debris from ponds, leave on the side so pond life can escape, then add to the compost bin

- Stand your Christmas tree in a buck sheltered spot outdoors until it's tim indoors
