15th February 1971, known as Decimal Day.

To prepare the nation for the changeover in currency systems, the Decimal Currency Board (DCB) was set up, running a public information campaign in the two years prior to the switchover on Monday 15 February 1971, also known as Decimal Day. Three years before changeover, new 5p and 10p coins were introduced; these were the same size and worth the same amount as the one and two shilling coins. In 1969 a new 50p coin was introduced to replace the old 10 bob (shilling) note.

The banks were closed for four days before changeover to prepare. Currency converters were available for everyone, and prices in the shops were shown in both currencies. This went some way to alleviate the feeling many people had, that shopkeepers might use the conversion from old money to new to increase prices!

'Decimal Day' ran without a hitch. Although the elderly generation found it more difficult to adapt to decimalisation, in general the population readily embraced the new currency and the oft-used phrase of the 1970's "How much is that in old money?" is now more commonly used in reference to metrication.

For a short time, the old and new currencies operated in unison, whereby people could pay in pounds, shillings and pence and receive new money as change. Originally it was planned that old money would be phased out of circulation

over eighteen months, but as it turned out, the old penny, halfpenny and three penny coins were officially taken out of circulation as early as August 1971.

It was originally intended that the new unit of currency would be referred to as 'new pence' to distinguish it from the old money, but this was quickly adapted to the abbreviation 'pee', which we still use today.

DECIMAL DAY MONDAY 15th FEBRUARY 1971

- On this day—D Day—the United Kingdom
- will officially change to decimal currency.

 The pound sterling (£) will be divided into 100 new pennies (100p). There will be a new halfpenny (½p).
- The three bronze coins will not become legal tender until D Day. But the other coinage changes will be made gradually from 1968 onwards.
- The 5p and 10p coins have the same size, weight, and metal content as shillings and florins and are interchangeable with them; they will come into circulation from 1968.
- The sixth decimal coin will be the 50p. It will replace the 10s. note well before D Day.
- The halfpenny will cease to be legal tender on 1st August 1969, the half-crown on 1st January 1970, and the penny, threepenny bit and sixpence after the changeover period.
- The changeover period will last for several months after D Day; except on cheques, both currencies will be in use and £p will gradually replace £sd in shops and offices as cash registers, office machines, and slot machines are converted or replaced. 
Be My Valentine



The part of a plant that is often brightly colored, that usually lasts a short time, and from which the seed or fruit develops.



Easy toad-in-the-hole recipe



The Classic and easy toad-in-the-hole. A fluffy Yorkshire pudding batter paired with hearty pork sausages, alongside a generous serving of rich onion gravy – all you need to add is your favorite vegetables on the side.

This Recipe Serves 4 and takes 10 minutes to prepare and 55 minutes to cook.

Ingredients

For the batter

- 100g plain flour
- 2 eggs
- 150ml semi-skimmed milk

For the toad

- 8 pork sausages
- 1 onion, finely sliced
- 1 tbsp vegetable oil

For the gravy

- 1 onion, finely sliced
- 1 tbsp vegetable oil





- 2 tsp plain flour
- 2 tsp English mustard
- 2 tsp Worcestershire sauce
- 1 vegetable stock cube, made up to 300ml

Method

- 1. Preheat oven to gas 7, 220°C, fan 200°C.
- 2. First make the batter. Put the flour in a bowl, add the eggs and slowly mix in the milk then beat until smooth.
- 3. Put the sausages in an ovenproof baking dish, scatter over the sliced onion and drizzle over the oil. Roast for 15 mins.
- 4. Remove the dish from the oven, pour the batter over and around the sausages then return to the oven and cook for a further 35 mins or until the sausages are cooked through and the batter is golden on top.
- 5. To make the gravy, heat a deep-frying pan or saucepan and fry the remaining onion in the oil for 5 mins until golden. Sprinkle over the flour and cook, stirring until thickened. Add the mustard, Worcestershire sauce and, gradually, the stock, stirring until smooth and thickened to your liking.
- 6. Serve the toad in the hole with the gravy to pour over.

Tip: You can easily adapt the sausages in this recipe to suit your family needs; try flavored pork sausages, lower fat alternatives or vegetarian sausages as you like

Health and Wellbeing

Your Life, Your Style...



At any age it is important to maintain and enhance our own health and wellness; ensuring our minds and bodies are healthy and balanced, focusing on physical well-being, happiness, fulfillment, and mental strength.

This month we will focus on the importance and benefits of *Skin Hydration*

Skin hydration is important because aging skin can become dry and itchy. This condition is called xerosis. The Causes of xerosis are:

- Water loss: As skin ages, it loses water more easily.
- Bathing habits: Frequent bathing with hot water and alkaline soaps can strip the skin of its natural protective oils.
- Environmental factors: Exposure to UV light from the sun can make skin less elastic.

Treatments

- Moisturizers: Apply a fragrance-free moisturizer within minutes of bathing and throughout the day. For very dry skin, use an ointment.
- Skin cleansers: Use cleansers with a low alkaline rating and moisturizing qualities.





- Humidifiers: Use a humidifier to add moisture to the air.
- Face masks: Use a face mask to hydrate your skin.

Here are some tips to help keep your skin moisturised.

- · Stay hydrated and eat a healthy diet.
- · Manage stress.
- Don't smoke.
- Wear sunscreen, protective clothing, and sunglasses when you're outside.
- Check your skin regularly for changes.

Forget Me Not Team News



This month's training focused on SSKIN/ Pressure Sore training; we also completed a cream application competency. SSKIN care and pressure sore training is important because the training helps Forget Me Not Home Care Team prevent pressure ulcers/bedsores. Pressure ulcers can be painful and even life threatening if left



untreated.

What is SSKIN care?

SSKIN is a five-step model for preventing pressure ulcers. It's a care bundle that helps Forget Me Not Home Care Staff monitor skin health and reduce the risk of pressure ulcers.

The five steps of SSKIN

- 1. Surface: Ensure patients have adequate support
- 2. **Skin inspection**: Regularly inspect skin for discoloration or sores
- 3. **Keep moving:** Encourage patients to change positions frequently
- 4. Incontinence/moisture: Keep patients clean and dry
- 5. **Nutrition/hydration**: Ensure patients have a healthy diet and drink plenty of fluids







The benefits of SSKIN help prevent pressure ulcers visible to all. It helps healthcare Forget Me Not Staff monitor skin health and reduces the risk of pressure ulcers.

We have also been completing an online course called: The Oliver McGowan Training, on Learning Disability and Autism. This a mandatory course. Learning about learning disabilities and



autism allows Forget Me Not staff to understand and support people with these conditions, to ensure we are inclusive and learn how to adapt, as well as promoting positive and healthier interactions in everyday life.
