Greeting to all brothers and sisters in Christ! I pray your time of Thanksgiving with family and friends was up lifting filled with com- fort food and loads of reminiscing and laughter! We have so much for which to be thankful in a world where we unconsciously take so much for granted. Most of us have never really been hungry while millions of people do not know from day to day where their next meal will come. Most of us have never been homeless yet millions of people even children have no place to call home and are ex- posed to the elements on a daily basis. When I find myself asking God...why me Lord.... it is followed with a statement to myself... why not me. For I am no better than the least of God's children and no less than those who have everything. God's goodness and mercy is a mystery.

This past month St. Joseph's had a service of giving thanks. It was a quaint and humbling service. Our Presiding Bishop Curry will be making a Post Hurricane visit to East Carolina. On Saturday, December 8th he will be at St.

Anne's Episcopal Church at 4:00 (711 Henderson Drive Jacksonville NC 28540) and on Sunday December 9th he will be at St. James Parish at 2:00 (25 South 3rd Street in Wilmington NC 28401.) The public is invited to attend. Each of these gathering will provide an opportunity for those who have been doing the work of recovery and relief to share their stories and to allow the Bishop to respond pastorally. There will be a Q&A session and a reception. To God be the Glory that He has brought us full circle to the beginning of the church year as we celebrated the first Sunday of Ad- vent. On the last Sunday of November, we celebrated Christ the King Sunday! After Christ resurrection we are constantly in wait of His second coming... a time of which not even the Angels in Heaven know but yet we wait in hope of His promise. Now that we have entered into Advent... we wait with great expectancy to celebrate Christ birth. The colors on the altar can be purple or blue, the colors for winter. Our color at St. Joseph's is blue for this Ad-vent season. The word Advent means "coming" and during this season Christians prepare for Jesus coming. We look to Advent as a time for light and preparation. The four virtues recognized are hope, love, joy and peace. On the first Sunday we lit the candle of hope. It will be followed by followed by love, joy and peace. The third candle celebrates and honors the Virgin Mary and is represented by a rose colored candle. The fifth candle is white and is called the Christ candle... lit on Christmas day. For Jesus is the light of the world. We will have service on Christmas Eve at 6:00.

# Rev. Ralph's Corner

Happy New Year! Well, the church year at least. We are off again telling the story of our

relationship with God as we move through the year. We start with advent as we prepare for the coming of the Christ child who we celebrate during Christmas. Then we remember the revelation of Jesus to the gentiles with the Epiphany. After that, it is time to prepare yet again through the season of Lent and the activity of Holy Week. After these solemn memories we celebrate the

resurrection of our Lord during Easter and the gift of the Holy Spirit at Pentecost. Then we are in the season of doing the work of the church as we wait for the coming of the Lord again.

This month in the Way of Love defined by Bishop Curry I want to address worship. As a reminder the Way of Love is to turn, learn, pray, worship, bless, go, rest. Worship is a word that gets used a lot but defined infrequently. The Oxford English Dictionary defines worship as the feeling or expression of reverence and adoration. In the context of the church we think of worship as something we do on a Sunday morning, but I want to invite us to consider a broader definition. Worship is anything we do to nurture our relationship with God. This might include gathering with the community and celebrating our relationship with God but it could also include cleaning up litter to care for God's creation, working at the food bank to help persons who need food, caring for animals who are part of God creation too. All these things can be worshipful events as long as we do them to honor God and God's creation. How will we worship during this new year? However we chose to worship, I am hopeful this year we all rediscover our risen Christ again in a new way.
