HAPPY NEW YEAR to all brothers and sisters in Christ as well as to all who have yet to hear the Good News and Glad tidings that unto us a child was born and His name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace! There is indeed a special joy that is in the air that cannot be wrapped in paper or adorned with bows and tinsel. It cannot be put on layaway nor charged to your Visa, MasterCard, Discover nor American Express! It is FREE... ours for the hearing, accepting and believing in God's promises. The Highest and honorable position... A Prince of Peace, not born in a Temple or palace to a Queen or King but in a stable in the presence of sheep and donkeys to a young village girl of 14 or 16 who was betrothed but not married to a carpenter. God in the flesh laid on a bed of hay in a trough that held grains and feed for animals ,no fine linens or silk material for comfort but strips of cloth in which he was swaddled for warmth. In this season of Advent we lit a candle every Sunday. Each candle represents the virtues of the Christ child. Hope, peace, joy and love. The final candle represents Christ Himself. For the church family that has moved away and for those who are not able to attend services... the church is beautifully decorated. Along the walls from the organ to the door of the Sacristy is garland lit with clear lights with red and gold balls. There is a gold bow at the center of each set of windows. At the top of each window is a bow fashioned out of grapevine also with red and gold balls. In the first alcove that is in the at the far end of the front doors is a nativity set with a Moravian star hanging above it. On the Gospel side of the church in the 2nd alcove is a Christmas tree with multicolored lights and ornaments. This year instead of purple, we used the

alternate color blue at the altar. The grill facing the people and near the organ are 3 gold candle sticks to represent the Trinity. The linen on the altar reads... "Prepare Ye the Way". On Friday, the 21st... we had our annual social. It was well attended. This year we had a traditional Christmas dinner under the direction of Chandra Francis. We had turkey, roast beef and ham, dressing, cranberry sauce, macaroni and cheese and a green salad and rolls. For dessert there was an assortment of cakes and pies. The meal was delicious ... the atmosphere was filled with love and laughter. Members of the church joined forces with their crafting skills and used this opportunity to raise a wee bit of money for the church while giving others an opportunity to do some last minute shopping. Our Crafters were Vikki Clark who fashioned cross stitched ornaments in frames. The pictures were religious symbols and symbols of Christmas. Mary Mac Shields, who is on loan to us as a diaconate candidate through the end of this month, decorated a miniature tree of beaded earrings and Celtic knotted necklaces. She also donated knitted Comfort dolls some of which were made to send to the children of Rwanda. She also teamed up with Jan Mumford and together they made house guest baskets filled with all the things overnight guest tend to forget to pack, Cloth organizing bags, fans in a carrying bag to protect it from damage in a ladies purse, and traveling shoe bags. A shawl and a stole was also crocheted by Jan. Carol Graham made an assortment of beautiful scarfs and matching head bands. Last but certainly not least ... Bernice Motley and her apprentice, Jan Mumford made Baby blankets while Bernice made matching booties and toboggans. All baby blankets, hats and booties not sold will be blessed and donated to the NIC Unit at Cape Fear Hospital which is an on-going project of the Daughters of the King. under the direction of Sharon McNair. This year's theme was Hallelujah, Jesus is Born! This year there were two performances. The first was at Haymount Presbyterian Church on Rosehill Road. On Sunday afternoon the final performance was at St. Joseph's and as always.... there was a packed house! The music and singing raised the roof and filled everyone with the spirit of Christmas. On Monday, Christmas Eve we had service at 6:00pm. Though there were a faithful few in attendance....as always, the service was beautiful. On Monday December the 17th members of the city under the leadership of Mr. Daws of the Historical society came with a group of 25 to tour our Sanctuary and Parish Hall. 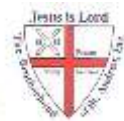
"Hallelujah Jesus is Born!"

Rev. Ralph's Corner

Blessed Epiphany! This feast of the church always falls on the 6th of January and marks the arrival of the gentiles from the east, often called the three wisemen. It just so happens that this feast falls on a Sunday this year, so we can celebrate the revelation of the Christ child on the actual day! Epiphany is a Greek word that means manifestation because this is the first time the infant Jesus was revealed, or manifested, as the Christ to Gentiles like you and me.

This is the first celebration this year but there will be others like the homecoming festive the last weekend of March. This weekend will be full of celebrating. We will celebrate the returning of families and friend of St. Joseph, we will remember our patron namesake, Saint Joseph, whose feast we are transferring from 19 March. Finally, we will be celebrating the gift of the presence of our bishop, The Right Reverend Robert Skirving who will be joining us during the weekend. It is a great time to be part of St. Joseph parish!

This month in the Way of Love defined by Bishop Curry I want to address bless. As a reminder the Way of Love is to turn, learn, pray, worship, bless, go, rest. The word bless is defined by the Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church as an authoritative pronouncement of God's favor. We bless food and items of importance to us. When I was a chaplain in the Army, I blessed a whole lot of crosses, crucifixes, and saint medallions for persons who wanted some tangible item that would remind them of God's presence and blessing them made the item even more special for the person.

Another way to consider blessing is the blessing we give to each other. When we help each other out, we are being a blessing for the other. Stated another way, when we help each other out we are pronouncing God's favor on the other person. This is how we are to function in community, to pronounce the favor of God on one another. The Christian community is to be a reminder to each other of the relationship with God that God desires with each of us. Finally, when we reach out to someone who is not a member of the Christian community, we are showing that person they too are favored by God. This is what we are to do as a Christian community, to demonstrate that each of us are blessed by God and also are a blessing from God. How are you going to be a blessing this year?
