Rev. Ralph's Corner The second installment of the

discussion about stewardship will focus on the giving of financial support to the church. As a reminder, the definition of stewardship according to Merriam-Webster is having the duties and obligations of someone who is supervising or managing of something,

especially the careful and responsible management of something entrusted to our care. The writings of the bible and teachings of Jesus all mention the responsibility of giving tithes and offerings to the church to continue the management of the ministry of Jesus entrusted to our care to spread the good news of the grace and mercy of God. One way that we do this is by support Saint Joseph with our monetary contributions.

It takes a lot of money to run a church. The payment of the workers who make our worship experiences memorable and make sure our spaces are clean. The repair and maintenance of our historic buildings and grounds. The repair and maintenance of the historic organ. All these things take money, and we haven't even started to fund the spreading of the good news of God's love and mercy yet! All we have done is provided a place to meet and worship. When we add the funding of outreach ministry where we are actually beginning to be the church the costs can go up and up.

At the parish meeting, which will occur after church on 29 November this year, the vestry will provide the St. Joseph community with a budget for 2021. When each of us listen to this budget presentation, I am hopeful we will consider giving generously to the work of God being done at St. Joseph. Also, I am hopeful each of us will consider making a pledge to the church. Pledge income helps the vestry to manage the funds in effective ways. Maybe a parallel will be helpful to understand.

Imagine managing your home budget. The utilities need to be paid, groceries need to be bought, and other bulls need to be paid. Now imagine having to manage your home budget without know how much money is coming in each month. How do you know what bills can be paid and which need to wait? If you think managing your home budget without knowing how much money is coming in each month sounds stressful then you now know the importance of making a pledge to St. Joseph so the vestry knows how much money is coming in each month.

I look forward to seeing you all at the parish meeting after church on the 29th of this month!
