Welcome from the CEO

Dear Friends and Supporters,

Time Out Group plc recently named The Liberties the 23rd "coolest neighbourhood" in the world, crediting the Liberties Festival as part of its vibrancy. Congratulations to Festival Director Michael McDermott, our volunteers, and partner organisations for this recognition of D8's creativity and energy.

Awards like this validate what we already know — The Liberties is special. But they also highlight the challenge: how do we keep it both cool and equitable? Rising demand drives up rents and property values, threatening vital community spaces like our 3 Usher Street premises, where rent increased 300% from November 2024. As costs rise, locally owned pubs, cafés and shops — the lifeblood of our neighbourhood — risk being displaced by higher-margin business. The community fabric thins, and those who built the area's reputation — working-class residents and young creatives—face exclusion.

What would be actually cool is meaningful investment in communities. Across areas of sports, leisure, parks, libraries, galleries Dublin City Council's 2022–2026 Capital Budget allocates 46.25% of funds to the North Inner City, but just 0.55% to the South West Inner City — a disparity of 8,500%. Fairer investment in parks, libraries, and sports would directly strengthen neighbourhood life.

Urgent regeneration of mid-century social housing is also critical. Trinity College Dublin / The Liberties Community Project research in 2024 showed a strong association between poor physical conditions and lower health outcomes with asthma prevalence 2.4 times higher among residents of Oliver Bond House than individuals attending the same medical practice with addresses elsewhere in Dublin 8.

Large scale developments such as The Land Development Agency's 'Pear Tree Crossing' and Ballymore's 'Guinness Quarter' provide significant opportunity for the delivery of social infrastructure at scale as does an appropriate and transparent allocation of Section 48 Development levies being raised from the area. Together, we will continue to work to ensure that The Liberties stays not just cool—but inclusive, thriving and fair.

The Liberties Festival

The Liberties Festival concluded a successful week of community events in July. With increased attendance numbers and amplification, the Festival embraced traditional aspects such as the Blue Rinse Ball while also new Dublin City Council grant-aided elements like Talking Shop. This saw local businesses open their doors to afterhours conversations. Holding Space unveiled a workshopped 'scent of the Liberties' in a horsebox in Bridgefoot Street Park and Diageo worked with locals to create the 'Liberties Brew' served in 14 local bars, with proceeds going towards future programming. Planning is already under way for further expansions and surprises in 2026

Community Employment

The Liberties Community Project manages a 20 place Community Employment scheme with funding from the Department of Social Protection and support through POBAL. Most positions are filled within our own growing organisation with a number of participants also seconded to support other local community organisations.

The aim of the scheme is simple: to help people build confidence, develop skills, and move closer to long-term employment, all while strengthening community services in The Liberties.
