





Velvety white snow and silvery ice formations transform a pond and waterfall into a dreamy scene that nearly replicates the magic of Christmas. During the frosty winter months, you can either leave your pond running and enjoy its icy beauty, or you can choose to shut your water feature down until springtime.

SHUTTING YOUR POND DOWN FOR WINTER

Most people in Northern climes choose to turn off their pond and waterfalls for the winter. The first thing you'll want to do is remove your pump and store it in a frost-free location submersed in a bucket of water. The water around the pump housing helps prevent the seal on the pump from drying and cracking.









Next, remove the bags of biological media and filter mats from the **BioFalls** biological filter. Wash the media with water and store them in a garage or shed. Removing the filter media for winter makes your spring cleanout easier. «



WHAT ABOUT THE FISH?

In the Northern part of the country, you might see your pond starting to ice over as early as November. Your fish should survive the winter, provided your pond is at least two feet deep and you keep a hole in the ice for exchange of gasses.





Larger fish need supplemental oxygen in the winter. To accomplish this, and assist with keeping a hole in the ice, add a submersible pump such as the Aquascape AquaForce® Pump on a pond shelf close to the water's surface. The water should not bubble more than one inch above the surface. The agitation will prevent the surface of the water from freezing in temperatures above 10 degrees.





Once winter temps drop below 10 degrees, you'll need the assistance of the Aquascape 300-Watt Pond De-Icer to keep a hole open at the water's surface. Make sure the pump and de-icer are not placed right next to each other. The agitation from the pump will create warmer water and the de-icer won't function properly.

If ice has already formed across the entire surface of your pond, lay the de-icer on its side to melt a hole in the ice. Once the hole is large enough, rotate the de-icer so it's right side up, if it doesn't automatically right itself. «







KEEPING YOUR POND AND WATERFALLS RUNNING

The advantage to keeping your water feature running during the winter, is that you'll enjoy the beauty of amazing ice sculptures around the waterfall. However, be advised that your pond might lose water due to evaporation during the winter months. Keep an eye on the water level and be prepared to top off the pond with water, as needed.

You might also find that ice build-up can create dams and force water outside of the pond. If this occurs, you can pour hot water over the ice build-up to melt it so water can flow freely. Avoid banging on the ice as the sound is amplified underwater and can stress your fish.

Finally, the flow of your waterfalls might not be enough to keep a hole in the ice during extreme temperature drops. Follow the same instructions mentioned earlier to keep a hole open in the pond's surface.
