# Safety Report by Ralph Huy Subject: "Check It Out"

In the last week I have heard about a gear-up landing and watched the landing of a Long-EZ with its nose gear retracted. In the first incident a pilot, who did not check NOTAMs, discovered on final to the Nut Tree airport that the runway was closed. He retracted the landing gear, flew a short pattern, and proceeded to land on the taxiway with the gear up. In the second case, while enjoying a cup of coffee in front of the terminal with the usual airport bums, someone said "oh-oh;" we all watched a Long-EZ slide to a stop on the runway. The pilot got the nose gear extended and proceeded to taxi over to Beeb's. Both of these events would have been prevented if the pilot had used his check list. Just a GUMPS check (Gas, Undercarriage, Mixture, Prop, Seat-belts & Switches) would have been enough. Early airplanes had little or nothing for check lists but as they got more complicated the need for items to be checked became apparent. The modern airliner has Preflight, Pre-Start, Start, Taxi, Take-Off, Climb, Top Of Climb, Cruise, Descent, Landing, and Shut Down Check Lists. The check list can be a simple one page list or in the case of a new complex aircraft a manual including several hundreds pages. In either case the important thing is to "USE THE CHECK LIST."

Remember the superior pilot uses their superior judgment and knowledge to prevent having to show their superior skills.



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


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## Another Swansboro Story — Bruce Anderson

The thrill of our takeoff, climb out, leveling off and viewing Reno, Lake Tahoe and then all the familiar airports along the way. Most of all gorgeous Mt. Diablo on the horizon as we make our gradual descent to Livermore, to a celebration from our members, Mark Duguid at the fuel pumps and Robert Flagg at our hangar with

champagne.

What an adventure — #1 on our Bucket List!

Oshkosh and back! Almost 4,000 miles! 40+ flying hours and 16 days!

We are glad to be home at last.
