Sure enough, THURSDAYS, Livermore Airport Terminal, 11:30-ish to 1:00-ish!








Safety — On Being Prepared By <u>Dennis Vied</u>

Most of us don't take check rides very often, and for some of us, it's been years. Every pilot, however, must bite the bullet at least every two years in order to continue to exercise his/her privileges to soar. When you go for a flight review, are you prepared? At the very least, you should go over, in your mind, what could occur during a flight review: a steep turn, a power-off landing approach, an obstacle takeoff. You should not rely on the preflight briefing for this preparation, since what is covered may not necessarily occur on the flight.

Flight reviews can be an occasion to learn something. A flight instructor giving a flight review is looking to spot any bad habits or potential safety issues in the pilot's operating procedures. The instructor may not necessarily offer instruction unless he/she sees a need for it, or unless a pilot asks, there are general issues which need to be brought out, or the instructor can offer a better or alternate way of doing a particular task.

I remember once agreeing to give a pilot an IPC (Instrument Proficiency Check). After a routine departure we proceeded to a practice area, and I asked to see a holding pattern, presented as a standard holding clearance. After proceeding down range for about ten miles or so, it was obvious that the pilot had not an inkling of how to proceed. He "hadn't thought about that in years." I was not able even to offer some instruction as the concepts were not even present in his mind. A little review and preparation would have saved the session from being a total loss.

Castle Air Museum — A General Electric J-31 <u>CENTRIFUGAL</u> Flow Gas Turbine Bruce Anderson



Yes, this **is** your grandfather's jet engine! The vast majority of contemporary gas turbines are <u>axial flow</u>. Under a dusty tarp within a storage hanger at Castle I found a <u>General</u> <u>Electric J-31 centrifugal flow</u> gas turbine. The engine has 25:28 hours on it and was last serviced in Alameda on October 10, 1946. 1946? Yep..., that's only about a year after World War II ended.

Hopefully someday we'll get to see it cleaned up and on display!




