There is no chapter called Gratitude in the Big Book, but if an alcoholic wants to live a happy sober life it's essential. And if you've ever been in a meeting with enough old timers present, you're guaranteed to have heard the phrase "grateful alcoholic." This sentiment could have multiple meanings, in that the alcoholic

practices gratitude in their daily life, but also could mean that they are thankful that they have this disease. For many alcoholic individuals, discovering they were an alcoholic is the first time they've ever felt understood. It's hard to understand why someone would want to have a disease. But that very dependence is the ticket to finding a family in AA. Alcoholism is more than

just the need for a beverage - it's a way of thinking and a feeling of being utterly alone. The slow (or rapid, for the disease is a malleable one) decline from a passingly 'normal' human into an empty shell awaiting a sip is a lonely road. Nights that start out social lead to nights of loneliness, and the alcoholic

drinker feels they have no one. Many become so broken and twisted by the drink that no one will have them as they are - until they find their people in AA. AA is the group that welcomes the alcoholic, understands the nonsensical ways of thinking, and offers a pathway back to happiness.

Intergroups started in AA long before the General Service structure. The first forerunner to today's Intergroup/Central Offices, the Central

Committee, was established in Cleveland Ohio in October 1939, four years after AA's co-founders Bill W. and Dr. Bob met. At that time a committee of seven – five men and two women – began meeting in Cleveland once a month. In addition to being the first Central Committee, this is said to be the first example of rotation in AA since one man and one woman dropped off each month to be replaced by the next in line according to seniority.


