The Whitney Plantation has been restored with a goal to open the plantation to the public as a museum that focuses entirely on the lives of enslaved people. It is well worth the visit.)

They were set to popular tunes, and fugitives on the Underground Railroad sang Simpson's song-poems in the 1850's."]

It is claimed he said, "If I had known to what use [the Southerners] were going to put my song, I will be damned if I'd have written it." Emmett also wrote the fife-and-drum manual for the Union Army.]

Lift Ev'ry Voice and Sing, poem by James Weldon Johnson; music by John Rosamond Johnson, 1900 [Research disclosed a discrepancy as to when the music was added to the poem. Some sources say the poem was written in 1900 and put to music in 1905. However, the NAACP web site states, "Lift Every Voice and Sing—often called 'The Black National Anthem' – was written as a poem by NAACP leader James Weldon Johnson (1871-1938) and then set to music by his brother John Rosamond Johnson (1873-1954) in 1899. It was first performed in public in the Johnsons' hometown of Jacksonville, Florida as part of a celebration of Lincoln's Birthday on February 12, 1900 by a choir of 500 schoolchildren at the segregated Stanton School, where James Weldon Johnson was principal." In addition, Mr. Johnson stated, "A group of young men in Jacksonville, Florida, arranged to celebrate Lincoln's birthday in 1900. My brother, J. Rosamond Johnson, and I decided to write a song to be sung at the exercises. I wrote the words and he wrote the music. Our New York publisher, Edward B. Marks, made mimeographed copies for us, and the song was taught to and sung by a chorus of five hundred colored school children." For the purposes of this book, I have used the date given by the NAACP and the author of the poem.]

Swing Low, Sweet Chariot, Negro Spiritual [There is some dispute whether this song existed before the Civil War; however, according to John Wesley Work, who wrote the seminal book on Negro folk songs in 1915, "[Swing Low, Sweet Chariot] grew by degrees as [it] passed from mouth to mouth, until [it] reached [its] present state," as he was told by the daughter of the slave mother who first sang it. Although perhaps not in written form, it is very likely it existed orally before the Civil War.]
