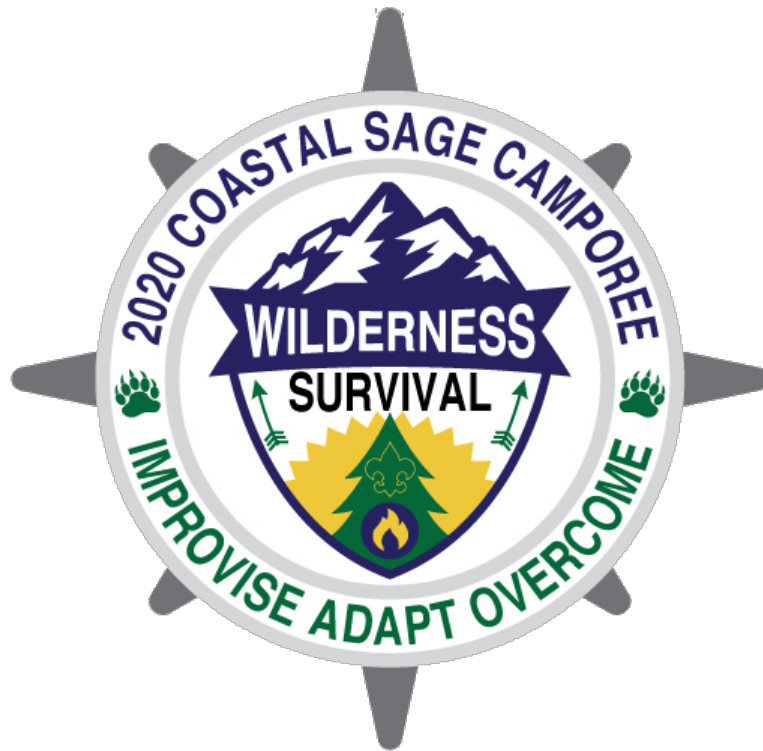

Please make sure your units provide a representative to this meeting that can make choices for your unit. We highly recommend units bring their SPL's to this meeting. Note– Units will not be given the option to choose the same game they lead last year so be prepared with 3 options so we can fairly assign activities.

Registration and Fees

Unit Registration must be completed through Doubleknot (site coming soon). Please register in advance of the event.

A \$5 per person discount will be given to those units that register before March 1st, 2020.

Registration and Payment	(on or before March 1, 2020)	\$15 each
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Registration and Payment	(after March 1 st , 2020)	\$20 each
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All Scouts and Scouters in attendance are required to pay the registration fee. The registration fee includes the cost of the site and facilities, permits, materials for event, awards, patches, ribbons, and supplies for field events.

To register after March 1st, please contact one of the staff listed above and they will guide you through the late registration process. Please do not show up to the event without confirmation that you are registered.

Extra Camporee patches will be available for purchase only while supplies last at the Camporee Trading Post at Silva Lodge.

Check-in Procedures **WILL YOU SURVIVE?**

Check-in starts at 5:00PM on Friday, April 3rd, 2020 at Silva Lodge at Mataguay Scout Ranch.

Upon arrival, Senior Patrol Leaders and Scoutmasters please check-in with all completed NECESSARY forms:

- ◆ Patrol Roster for Events Form for each Patrol
- ◆ BSA Medical Form - Part A & B for each Scout and Adult. We will not be handing back part A of the medical forms so please be prepared with a copy as needed.
- ◆ Check (for any unpaid registration fees)

Please plan to arrive together as a unit, as the camporee staff does not have the ability to watch “lone” scouts.

In compliance with YPT guidelines at least two registered adult leaders 21 or older with current YPT must be in attendance with each unit.

Be prepared to provide an exact count of Scouts, adults (including later arrivals), and number of Patrols. Please note anyone who comes must be counted, even if they are not camping.

Scouts and/or units that are missing any of the required forms or fees will be sent home to retrieve them. *Be Prepared!*

Parking Passes will be handed out at our first check-in station at the A-frame. Please fill them out completely and put them face up on the dash of each vehicle. You will find out your unit's campsite at this station and will then be able to drive to your campsite to drop off gear before parking and checking at Silva Lodge. When loading and unloading at the campsites please park on the RIGHT SIDE OF THE ROAD leaving the left side for traffic flow.

NOTE: Please notify the Camporee Co-Chairs in advance if you have personnel with special needs.

Check-out Procedures

YOU SURVIVED!

Checkout is from 8:30 AM to 10 AM on Sunday, April 5th, 2020.

Early checkout is available after Saturday campfire. Please notify the Camporee Co-chairs at or before check-in if you need an early exit.

Each unit will be assigned a check out time at the Saturday night Cracker Barrel. Please adhere to these times to allow everyone a smooth exit.

A member of the Camporee staff **MUST** inspect your campsite before you can check out and leave. Prior to inspection, please complete the following:

- ◆ Ensure the campsite is litter free and restore the campsite to its original (or better) condition.
- ◆ Pack all gear and be ready to depart.
- ◆ Carry out all garbage to be disposed of in dumpsters located at Parker Dining Hall.
- ◆ Complete & turn in Camporee Survey to staff.
- ◆ Request a site inspection by a Camporee Staff member.

A member of the Camporee Staff will sign off your Check-Out Sheet upon completion of inspection.

Patches, Participation Ribbons and Part B of the medical forms are presented to the unit when signed Check-out sheets are submitted.

Patrol Game Support

Each unit is offered the opportunity to host one or more patrol games. A minimum of 2 deep adult leaders are needed to supervise the games, but units are encouraged to enlist senior Scouts BSA and Venture Scouts to staff the games.

Games and activities that do not receive support may be struck from the lineup.

A preliminary list and description of camporee games is included in this guidebook. In the Camporee SPL and Adult Leader Meeting (See page 2 for details) we will go over key information, answer any questions and ask for unit volunteers to lead games and activities.

Please make sure your unit provides a representative to this meeting that can make choices for your unit. We highly recommend units bring their SPL's to this meeting.

Note – Units will not be given the option to choose the same game they lead last year so be prepared with 3 options so we can fairly as-sign activities.

Your unit may wish to submit an additional game or activity for consideration.

All games must be designed to meet the following objectives:

- ◆ Test basic Scout craft skills or teach new skills
- ◆ Challenge physical fitness, creativity, teamwork, or problem solving
- ◆ Incorporate the Camporee theme (background, story and props)
- ◆ Establish clear rules and requirements
- ◆ Establish objective scoring criteria
- ◆ Encourage the use of the Patrol Method
- ◆ Be in accordance with the Guide to Safe Scouting

GUIDELINES / RULES & REGULATIONS

Unit Transport, Traffic and Parking

- ◆ Car-pooling is strongly recommended.
- ◆ The camp speed limit is 15 mph. Please drive at this speed for the safety of all campers on the ranch.
- ◆ Vehicles are not allowed on camp service roads except in the case of an emergency.
- ◆ All drivers of vehicles on the ranch must abide by all state laws concerning vehicle operations. This includes the law that prohibits individuals riding in the beds of trucks.
- ◆ Remember the road from white gate to the camp master's cabin is strictly a one-way road.
- ◆ Parking is allowed only in the Dan Henry Parking Lot with overflow in Indian Rock if needed. Trailers may park in the marked trailer parking lot only.
- ◆ Vehicles must be backed into parking spaces to allow quick removal in case of camp emergency.
- ◆ Parking passes will be handed out at our first station at the A-frame.
 - Please fill them out completely and put them face up on the dash of each vehicle. You will find out your units' campsite at this station and will then be able to drive to your campsite to drop ff gear before parking and checking in at Silva Lodge.
- ◆ Loading /Unloading is available on the road near each campsite (no driving onto campsites please).
 - Please park to the right side of the road leaving the left side open for traffic flow. Please unload your gear quickly and then park your vehicle in the Parking area as listed above.
- ◆ Please be considerate when parking, loading and unloading vehicles.
- ◆ No RV or camper parking will be allowed.
- ◆ Sleeping in any vehicle in the parking lot or camping area is prohibited.

Campsite and Gateway Design: Campsite Set-up

- ◆ Campsites are assigned by camporee staff.
- ◆ Tents should be neatly arranged and grouped by patrols.
- ◆ The U.S. flag, and unit flag should be posted at the site gateway (entrance).
- ◆ An entry gateway with unit identification signs or banners are strongly encouraged.
- ◆ Themed props and decorations are strongly encouraged.

Make sure that your campsite and gateway are ready for the staff inspection and theme contest judging. See CAMPSITE INSPECTION FORM and GATEWAY SCORECARD in this packet for details.

Patrol Games & Activity Setup

- ◆ Space assignments for games will be given upon check-in at Silva Lodge on Friday.
- ◆ Units may begin set-up Friday evening; however please rope off or otherwise flag any items that might pose a hazard to walking at night.
- ◆ Game sponsors must provide adequate staffing and allow sufficient time to have games fully prepared and ready to play by 9:00am on Saturday morning. This should include time to try out and adjust game as necessary.

Patrols

The Patrol is the basic unit of Scouting and Camporee is a great place to reinforce the Patrol Method as the means of Patrol leadership and governance. The Camporee will:

- ◆ Provide an opportunity for youth leadership.
- ◆ Test basic Scouting skills.
- ◆ Promote teamwork and team building.
- ◆ Create an environment to demonstrate Scout Spirit and FUN!

Uniforms

The preferred uniform for this year's Camporee is Wilderness Survival themed costume of attire. This attire is preferred during the entire event. I

If not in costume – all Scouts and Scouters are required to be in Field Uniform (Class A) for;

- ◆ check-in
- ◆ checkout
- ◆ campfire
- ◆ flag ceremonies

Patrol or troop Uniforms (Class B) may be worn at all other activities.

Camporee Staff

Staff members are Scouts and Scouters from the Naabaahii chapter of the OA and Coastal Sage District who have volunteered to help run the programs and events at the Camporee. Please respect our staff members and allow them to perform their duties and functions. If you have a problem that isn't handled to your satisfaction, please see the Camporee Chair(s) at Silva Lodge for assistance.

Lost and Found

Please turn in found items to Silva lodge. If you are missing something, this is the place to look. Unclaimed items will be available after the event at the Scout Office at 1207 Upas Street, San Diego, CA 92103 beginning April 6th.

Outdoor Ethics

Except for communication devices used by Camporee staff, electronic devices may not be used outside of your campsite area. This includes but are not limited to tablets, walkie-talkies, and mobile phones. Scouts mobile phones may be carried by adult leaders in case of emergency.

Do not climb on trees and/or cut or break pine needles or branches off trees. California law protects these trees.

All groups are encouraged to follow outdoor ethics. This includes staying on established trails, respecting the native wildlife and plant life, and to refrain from trenching or digging.

If a group member finds any Native American artifacts, they should leave the item(s) in place and immediately report this to the ranger or camp master. The disturbance of any artifacts, archeological sites, or historical building is a federal crime.

General Policies

- ◆ The group leader is responsible for familiarizing his/her entire group of camp policies and to make sure that they are enforced.
- ◆ The group leader is responsible for the actions of all members in his/her group.
- ◆ There must be at least 2 adults in supervision at all times. Both of these adults must be over the age of 21 and be current with their YPT certification. Youth campers cannot be left at any time without adult supervision.

Wilderness Survival

Safety

- ◆ Please report all accidents, injuries, or other emergencies immediately to a member of the Camporee Staff at the First Aid station located in Silva Lodge.
- ◆ Scouts and Scouter's may not enter other units' campsites without permission except in case of a safety violation.
- ◆ Scouts must remain in their campsite after 10:00pm.
- ◆ Patrol Leaders are encouraged to implement the Buddy (or Truddy) System during the Camporee.
- ◆ No Scout may leave the Camporee site unless pre-arranged and approved by your Unit Leader. Any Scout leaving the Camporee site must checkout at the Silva Lodge Headquarters before leaving area.
- ◆ Unit Leaders, if appropriate, please advise our Camporee Staff of Scouts' special needs.
- ◆ In accordance with BSA's Guide to Safe Scouting and Mataguay regulations, the prohibition of illegal drugs, marijuana, alcohol, fireworks, firearms, and other weapons will be strictly enforced.
- ◆ No glass containers, and no animals of any kinds (except Service Animals) are allowed.
- ◆ Guns, daggers, bows, and all other weapons are prohibited outside of the designated areas – do not include them in your costume.

Wilderness Survival

Campsite Guidelines

- ◆ **Water is provided. Please bring your own water containers.**
- ◆ **DO NOT WASH DISHES at the water faucets. Fill a pan, bucket, or container with water, take the water back to your campsite, and wash dishes there. Washing dishes at spigots is unsanitary and prohibited. Please do not run water onto the ground at the spigots. It quickly turns into a mud hole and costs your Patrol campsite points! Remember A SCOUT IS CLEAN.**
- ◆ **No dish washing or dumping of dishwater is allowed at latrines.**
- ◆ **Trash and leftover food must be placed into trash bags and disposed of in the dumpsters provided at Parker Dining Hall. Gray water (dirt or soapy water) must be poured into filtering buckets placed throughout the camp. Please return filtering buckets to Camporee Headquarters at check out.**
- ◆ **Refer to your Scout Handbook for proper Patrol campsite set up.**
- ◆ **Wood tools must be properly stored and may be used only in the axe yard within each campsite. Improper use of wood tools is prohibited and will result in inspection point deductions.**
- ◆ **Ground fires are permitted in designated rings and only with permission from the Ranger. Fires should not be more than 12 inches above the fire pit and only permitted when conditions allow. No Fires are to be completely extinguished before leaving the site or sleeping and are never to be unattended.**
- ◆ **All campfire rings/pits must be cleaned before the group leaves. Campfire ashes are to be deposited in an "ASH CAN" located at Silva Lodge, Camp Master Building, A-Frame, or Blackfoot Headquarters. There is no dispersing of ashes on the ground. Groups are free to use any down wood for fires but are NOT allowed to take any wood off the ranch.**
- ◆ **All cooking must be done on propane stoves or on barbecue grills. Leaving your campsite while a fire is anything but COLD to the touch will terminate your fire privileges, without exceptions.**

Wilderness Survival

Campsite Guidelines (cont.)

- ◆ **Fire pits must be clean of litter at the time of checkout. Neatly stack unused firewood three (3) feet away from your fire pit. Do not write or mark on the Fire Pits with anything, including charcoal. Doing so could result in cleaning fees (\$\$).**
- ◆ **Only clean wood maybe burned. Any wood with nails, paint, or chemicals (this includes pallets) is not permitted.**
- ◆ **There will be no posting of signs on trees or on existing signs in camp. Groups should bring their own stakes and signs for posting. All signs must be removed prior to departure or deposit will not be returned.**
- ◆ **No group members should cross barbed wire fences and enter the property of our neighbors. Any individual found cutting a fence will be billed for repairs.**
- ◆ **All campsites, buildings, and equipment are expected to be left as clean, or cleaner, than they were when your group arrived. Under no circumstance should camp equipment be moved with-out permission (i.e. moving fire rings or picnic tables). Any damage caused, or cleaning required by the ranger, will result in the loss of the security deposit.**
- ◆ **Please camp only in assigned campsites. Do not camp off trails or other open areas. Please respect the camping arrangements of others.**
- ◆ **If your group uses camp supplied pioneering poles (rope not included), they must be returned at the end of your visit. Groups are not allowed to cut pioneering poles for any reason.**

ACTIVITES

Refer to the CAMPOREE SCHEDULE on page 19 for planned activity times and locations. A final schedule will be available at the Silva Lodge Headquarters. Check the onsite bulletin board periodically for last-minute updates.

Friday Night

Cracker Barrel and Camporee Brief

- ◆ Get essential news, updates and tips.
- ◆ Hear the latest Wild gossip.
- ◆ Saturday's schedule and activities will be discussed.
- ◆ Campfire Act Sheets will be collected.

All units need to be represented by an SPL AND Unit leader. All Game Masters and Staff should attend as well. If not already turned in, bring your completed Patrol Games Roster on page 20 so your patrols can participate in Saturday's competitions. All patrols must be enrolled and tabulated in order to participate in the games. This is also a great opportunity to turn in your campfire act sheets.

Saturday Morning

Opening Ceremony & Flags

All Scouts and units gather by the flagpoles at Parked Pool for an official welcome, raise the flags, and informational bulletins. Attendance and theme clothing or Class A uniforms are required. Bring your unit flag and patrol flags to the ceremony. Give a little patrol yell! Look sharp and be on time!

Wilderness Survival Patrol Games

The patrol games are posed Wilderness Survival scenarios with instructions and related objectives. The games emphasize basic Scout skills and teamwork.

The games provide an opportunity for leadership, problem solving, and learning. Expect the games to be fun and challenging.

Expect to demonstrate skills you already possess and to learn new skills.

See the Patrol Games Manifest in this guide for a description of the games planned for Camporee.

The opening activity and shooting sports times are assigned but otherwise games may be completed in any order.

Patrols must manage their own time to complete as many games as possible in the time allotted.

Some games may have longer queues than others. Moving on to faster-moving or less populated games is a good strategy for conserving time and maximizing points.

- ◆ Patrols must line up for games together.
- ◆ Each patrol should carry a patrol flag.
- ◆ Be sure to bring pens and notepaper. A Scout book might come in handy too....
- ◆ The Ten Essentials may be required to accomplish some of the games. Be Prepared! Patrols may not repeat activities.
- ◆ If there are too many patrols at a game, look for another game option.
- ◆ If a patrol is already engaged in a patrol game when lunchtime arrives, then, complete the game before going to lunch.
- ◆ There will be no activities or games open during the lunch break.

Saturday Afternoon

Camp Inspection and Gateway Judging

Staff will conduct campsite, gateway, gadget, and patrol flag inspections and judging's during the patrol games. Theme contest descriptions can be found under Awards and Recognition pages in the guidebook.

Wilderness Meal Competition

Scouts will be presented with three brown paper bags containing mystery ingredients. They will choose one of the three bags (without first checking the contents), prepare using a Dutch oven, and serve the best possible meal using anything that is edible that you find in the wild and any ingredients/spices you have in your Patrol box. Charcoal for the cooking fire will be provided.

Your goal is to create a meal that will keep you alive. Extra points will be given for taste.

SPL Survival Challenge

The SPL (or his representative) will compete with the SPL's from other units in a round robin of events. SPL's brush up on your skills in knot tying, pioneering, archery, shooting sports, fire building and more. This is an exciting event and we encourage everyone to come out and cheer for and encourage your unit's competitor!

Survivalist Costume Contest

Proudly display your Wilderness Survival costumes. All Scouts and leaders are encouraged to wear Survivalist inspired outfits and attire for the entire event. Judging occurs informally throughout the event and awards will be announced at the Saturday night campfire. Contestants please sign in at Silva Lodge to enter the costumer contest.

Saturday Evening

Flag Retreat

All units are required to gather by the Parker Pool flagpoles for the retirement of colors and announcements. Survivalist costumes or Field uniforms (class A) are required. Volunteers for flags are welcome.

Awards Campfire

Everyone is expected to attend the Saturday night Campfire at the Baden Powell Arena. Top awards from the Camporee Challenges will be awarded to the participants.

Campfire Skit and Song Sign-up

- ◆ Acts are limited to one per patrol.

- ◆ All acts must be submitted at the Friday night cracker barrel or by Saturday at noon to Silva Lodge for approval using the Campfire Act Sign-up sheet.

- ◆ Skits, songs, stories, showmanship, run-ons, gestures and language must confirm to principles of good Scouting.

- ◆ Some acts may not be selected due to duplication or time constraints.

Order of the Arrow Call-out:

The Order of the Arrow will conduct a “Call-Out” ceremony immediately following Saturday Night Campfire at the Baden Powell Arena. Each unit that has recently elected Scouts to the OA please ensure that those Scouts attend the Camporee and are present for the “Call Out” ceremony.

Cracker Barrel and Camporee Debrief

Senior Patrol Leaders, Unit Leaders, Game Leaders, and Staff please gather at Silva Lodge for a Camporee Debrief. We will review the day's activities and events, discuss ideas for next year's camporee, assign check out times, explain exit procedures and answer any questions we can.

Sunday Morning

Scout's Own

To be held at the Baden Powell arena.

Wilderness Survival Camporee Complete:

Please refer to and follow all checkout procedures explained at the Saturday Night Cracker Barrel and the procedures mentioned at beginning of this Guidebook. All departures to commence immediately upon completion of site inspection, completed and submitted check-out sheets and once patches & ribbons are presented.

Wilderness Survival

Wilderness Survival Patrol Games Manifest

This is a working list. Games may be added, dropped, or modified before the Camporee. The final game selection depends upon the availability of game-leaders, materials, and resources. All units are asked to host or assist with at least one game or activity. Game leaders may be adults, senior Scouts, or Ventures. Contact the Camporee Chair if you have questions about game responsibilities or requirements.

Opening Activity: 10 essentials and Daypack review

Skills: Making sure all scouts understand and have the Scout 10 essentials.

Mission: Each patrol will be scored on how complete the 10 essentials for each scout.

Note: Having more items will result in deduction of points in competition.

Knot Tying Competition

Skills: Knot Tying

Mission: Tie the 6 basic knots in the scout handbook. Fastest average patrol time wins.

Note: Team work and individual skill will win this event.

Clothes Drying Tripods

Skills: Pioneering

Mission: Try your hand at building a structure with poles and lashing skills. Fastest time wins.

Notes: Put your building skills into action.

Signal Your Rescue

Skills: Map and compass skills

Mission: Using compass and whatever shiny objects are around, signal your rescuer using morse code. (Morse code cheat sheets will be supplied)

Notes: Practice compass course activities.

Bear Bag Hanging

Skills: Teamwork and good communication,

Mission: This is a timed event that will require you to separate a group of provided items into “smellables” and “non-smellables” and place the smellables in a bear bag (provided) and hoist it using the Philmont method. This is a timed event.

Notes: Teamwork and good communication are key for these obstacles. HINT: check out YouTube for proper Philmont method.

Wilderness Survival Patrol Games Manifest (cont.)

Big Five Archery

Skills: Aiming and Target skills

Mission: Highest score after 6 ends plus bonus targets.

Note: It's not all about speed.

Primitive Rescue Skills (First Aid)

Skills: First Aid

Mission: Setting a leg break and tending an arm wound. Transporting the victim to safety

Notes: Fastest time wins.

Hunting for Survival (Shooting Sports)

Skills: Aiming and Target skills

Mission: You will learn gun safety and then shoot for score.

Notes: Best Patrol Average will win. The firearm each Scout uses will be determined by their age. Webelos will shoot BB guns, Scouts under 14 will shoot .22 and Scouts 14 and over will shoot shotgun. Scouts must have a signed shooting sports permissionslip to compete in this event.

Fire Building

Skills: Flint and steel skills, fire building and teamwork

Mission: Build a fire to set burn a string above the fire pit.

Notes: Fastest string burning will prevail. Practice flint and steel fire building.

Pack the Mule

Skills: Teamwork, organization, and speed.

Mission: You are days from civilization and have a random assortment of items. Securely pack a mule with the correct items, fastest patrol wins.

Notes: Organizational skills are a must.

SPL Survival Challenge

Skills: Organization, Speed and much more.

Mission: Complete all the challenges put forward in an accurate and expedient manner

Notes: Accuracy and timing are a must. The challenge will include knots, pioneering, shooting sports, and fire building.

Wilderness Survival

Wilderness Meal Competition

WHY: Your patrol has driven far into the forest and suddenly becomes stuck. You have called for help, but it won't come for another 24 hours and it is getting cold and dark and all your scouts are getting hungry.

Your patrol box has a few items but nothing that will work for a meal. As you survey your surroundings you come across a bag with cans of food but there are no labels.

WHAT: Your challenge is to use those found items, along with what is in your patrol box and whatever edible forest items are available to create a meal that will keep everyone alive.

You must use a Dutch Oven and the mystery ingredients to create the meal.

WHEN: Each unit will send 1-3 representatives to Silva Lodge at 2:00pm on Saturday to pick up the mystery items and charcoal.

Cooking begins after provided supplies are picked up.

Judging will begin promptly at 6:00pm at Silva Lodge.

Extra points will be given for taste!

Wilderness Survival

Awards and Recognition

Those patrols and units who are willing to work hard together to the highest degree and to demonstrate the most Scout Spirit will be the ones rewarded with awards and honors for the games and competitions.

Participant Recognition

All units in attendance at the camporee receive a participation ribbon for their unit flag. All registered participants receive a Camporee event patch.

Survivalist Unit Spirit Award

Coastal Sage Spirit Award is awarded to a single unit, based on the following criteria

- ◆ 100% Unit participation in Camporee activities.
- ◆ Unit that best exemplifies Scout Spirit throughout the Camporee.
- ◆ Unit participation in the campfire and campfire audience.

Wilderness Survival Patrol Games Award

These are patrol awards. Special awards are presented to the first, second, and third ranked patrol in each patrol game. Each Scout game is scored on time, skills, problem solving, and teamwork. Exceptional Scout spirit is also considered. Judges follow objective point criteria specified by the scorecard for each game.

Best Land Camp

This is a unit award. Unit campsites will be evaluated on theme presentation, including layout, organization, cleanliness, safety, security of personal possessions, use of Scoutcraft, attention to detail, attention to Boy Scout Handbook and Guide to Safe Scouting guidelines, observance of the Patrol Method, observance of Outdoor Ethics principles, and more. Refer to CAMPSITE INSPECTION SHEET for specific criteria.

Wilderness Survival

Best Gateway

This is a unit award. Judging is based upon the originality and construction of a campsite gateway or welcome sign. Judging occurs during campsite inspections. Each Unit is encouraged to make a Gateway of their own design, with extra points awarded for theme-inspired design. The Gateway must be safe and conform to Scouting ideals (i.e., quality of rope lashing, use of Scout knots, no nails, etc.). Units must provide their own materials. Mataguay does have lodge poles available but they cannot be cut and must be returned to where they are taken from before checkout.

Best Gadget or Prop

This is a unit award. Judging is based upon thematic content, creativity, and craftsmanship. Judging occurs during campsite inspections. Create one or more theme-related prop or camp gadgets to decorate your campsite and provide you with familiar sights and comforts of your encampment.

Best Ensign

This is a patrol award. Think of your patrol flag with a Wilderness Survival theme. Judging is based on how well you represent your patrol within the theme.

Best Wilderness Survival Attire

These are individual and group awards. All Scouts and leaders are encouraged to wear Wilderness Survival costumes, masks, and accouterments throughout the event. Judging occurs informally (and stealthily) throughout Friday and Saturday. Individual awards are presented separately for youth and adults. A group award may be presented to a patrol or in it for the best dressed team. Anyone in costumer please come by Silva Lodge and sign in before noon on Saturday, preferable in costume.

Wilderness Meal Competition

This is a unit award. Judging is based upon creativity, taste, presentation, and theme.
