Foster & Adoptive Parenting Class

Are you a foster or adoptive parent looking to sharpen your skills in relating to children who have experienced physical and emotional trauma? Then this class is for you!

The James Project is partnering with child welfare agency Baby Fold in Bloomington to host a class entitled *Trust Based Relational Intervention* (TBRI). Instructors who have been trained by Dr. Karyn

Purvis, Director of The Institute of Child Development at TCU, will teach very practical classes to shape your parenting techniques in order to help children overcome the effects of trauma, neglect, or abuse and to aid in a child's journey of healing.

The first one-day class will be held December 9, 2013 from 9am to 4pm at Noll Medical Pavilion in Springfield. To provide additional training, three more one-day classes will be offered during January, February and March with times to be announced. Registration and materials are free to all attendees. CALL 1:27 : A Year in Review

Because we are also committed to recruiting foster and adoptive parents, we established Call 1:27. This ministry holds classes in local churches to educate and answer questions about fostering and adopting. Experienced caseworkers and foster and adoptive parents explain the fostering and adoption process.

Local foster care and adop-

tion agencies are partnering with us to help the many people who have approached us with questions about whether they should or could open their hearts and homes to displaced children. We are happy to be able to direct these families to pertinent resources.

Within the last 2 months, there have been 3 new foster parent recruits. This brings the total for Call 1:27 to 11 recruits.

That trans-lates to countless children being affected, and we are grateful to the families who have said "Yes" to fostering!

Answering The Call

Words from Erin Fenelon, foster mom

As my husband Jeremy and I sat in a little classroom and heard the statistics of kids coming into foster care, our hearts were broken. Jeremy had tears streaming down his face, and I thought to myself, "We need to do this." Six months later we had easily completed the licensing process and were ready for the next step.

As we were eating dinner on Tuesday, October 30th, the phone rang. Jeremy answered and began to say "Okay" a lot and I frantically told him to put the phone on speaker so I could hear too, as I knew it was "The Call" from our foster agency. I remember asking a lot of questions, the biggest one being if we could call him back in 10 minutes.

Immediately, Jeremy and I went to our Father in prayer. We prayed for direction, guidance, and wisdom to know if this was going to be our first placement. Next, I called a friend who is a foster parent, as I promised myself I would call someone not emotionally involved before we said yes to a call. After completing these necessary steps, we said yes to our first foster child.

Our foster daughter is a vibrant, intelligent, and caring six-year-old who makes me smile, laugh and pray harder on a daily basis. While we have had challenges and will continue to face struggles, we are not guaranteed perfect children, nor are we ourselves perfect. We handle each issue with prayer

and love.

In our hearts, we would love to keep her as our own, but we know she needs to be back with her biological family once they complete the steps to mend their brokenness. While we would miss her terribly if/when she leaves our home, we know we have fulfilled the calling of the gospel of James 1:27: "...to look after orphans and widows in their distress and to keep oneself from being polluted by the world."

Foster parenting is not glamorous and you will be stretched further than you thought possible. But it is rewarding! Jeremy and I are excited to see what children God will bring into our lives to care for and love. Join us, will you?

We are grateful to the Community Foundation for the Land of Lincoln for supporting The James Project and the fostering community.




Family Movie Night
