My introduction into foster parenting began with a 3month-old little boy coming to my home with nothing, but the clothes on his body. He had not been given a bottle in about 6 hours and fortunately. my family and friends helped me gather his basic needs for several days. However, since it typically takes time for foster resources to be available. I paid for everything out-ofpocket including formula. I was happy to provide for him, but honestly the cost and volume of the formula was a shock to my budget.

The process of receiving state funded resources and help for foster children is limited and takes time—often weeks.

It is an incredible blessing that The James Project can help fill these gaps and allow foster families to flourish!

In March, after a more than

two year fostering journey, I was able to adopt my two foster sons. We celebrated God's provision with a superhero themed adoption party.

Kindergarten at Closet

Springfield Christian School has a community service day known as "Be the C Day" during both the Fall and Spring semesters. This April, the kindergarten classes at SCS learned about foster families and the work done by The James Project over the course of several weeks.

To make the project more

hands-on, the students collected items for Closet 1:27, such as diapers, baby wipes, clothing and gift cards.

On April 17, the students took a field trip to the Closet 1:27 warehouse to deliver their donations. Closet 1:27 volunteers gave the students a tour and described how newly placed foster

children receive a laundry basket filled with items they need when they arrive at a new foster home.

SCS room mother Melanie Rahmel said that "Visiting Closet 1:27 gave the children a real sense of what it means to care and serve others. And in caring for others, it is important to give items that are in good condition—things that we would want to receive if we were in a similar situation. But even more importantly, the children, learned what it means not to have a mom and a dad. It was very moving to see!"

The visit lasted only about an hour, but the lessons learned about giving to others will certainly last for a lifetime.
