

Heartstrings: Foster Children with Special Needs

In my experience with fostering children with special needs, it is a challenging job but rewarding. Children with special needs require foster parents that are willing to rearrange and adjust their lives in some way to accommodate them. The children not only have unique challenges they live with each day due to their disability but they also have the challenge of being in a foster situation where they are separated from biological parents, siblings and loved ones. These hardships can create a lot of emotional turmoil in the lives of these children.

To address these challenges, I have found that engaging with the

child and showing interest in the things they really love helps the most. When you take the time to learn what a child enjoys to do, then you can develop a plan for engaging them in their favorite activity. This leads the child to feel special and valued by foster parents. They are already different from other children due to special needs and being separated from their biological families, but a caring foster parent can fill this gap and help children find their way in the world. I also look for opportunities to praise my foster children and give them credit for the good deeds and efforts they demonstrate. Giving them this "high five" is

paramount to encouraging them when they have said or done something praiseworthy. This also gives the foster child a desire to continue striving to make positive choices and helps them find out how they can excel. I have seen positive results by loving my foster children with special needs in these ways. Any foster parent who is considering bringing a foster child with special needs into their home can help their child best by investing time and interest in him or her. When you do, it makes foster parenting worth the effort.
