The James Project's Closet 1:27 has efficiently served foster families in Sangamon County for five years, bringing necessary items to newly placed foster children. How are we able to deliver things to families so quickly? Read on!

When a child is placed into foster care, or transferred from one home to another, they usually have nothing with them but what they are wearing. Our goal is to get them settled with their own things ASAP. To get the ball rolling, their caseworker requests a delivery of items through our Web site. This request is answered by Mary Cumming, our Closet Coordinator, and she sends out a message to our volunteer deliverers to see who is able to fulfill the request and deliver items that particular day. The volunteer contacts the foster parent directly to find out about the new child. They ask questions such as age, sizes, if a school uniform is needed, favorite color, diaper size, or if a bed, bedding or pillow is needed.

The volunteer then "shops" in Closet 1:27 filling laundry baskets with the needed items, delivering them to the foster family, usually within 24 hours. Providing such a service enables the foster parents to focus on the newly placed foster child, rather than scrambling to find essential items to get through the first few days. Closet 1:27 is a lifeline to foster families and we appreciate the dedication of our volunteers to help make foster family transitions a little easier. •

My wife Kasey and I have been foster parents for 18 months and part of a loving and supportive church for 12 years. As foster parents, we have learned there are some "do's and don'ts" when supporting foster families in your life/church.

DO: Buy our foster kids clothes, toys, and other gifts if you feel the need to welcome them or for special occasions like birthdays. Ask us sizes and needs, just as you would for a grandchild or your best friend's child.

DON'T: Give us a bag of Goodwill clothes that you are excited about because you got 5 outfits for \$10.

DO: Have us over for supper, or offer to bring us our favorite meal and take time to visit with our new family.

DON'T: Give us leftover coupons or gift cards to restaurants that we don't go to either. Our family dynamic changes with each placement, but we still like to be social and included in things.

DO: Get to KNOW and INVEST your TIME/LOVE into our foster children. Every child is dearly loved by our Heavenly Father. I know it can be hard to pour your love into someone that might not be around tomorrow, but PLEASE DO!

DON'T: Think or say... "I guess they got another foster child." "I hope this one is more well behaved than the last." "I wonder what their parents did to lose them."

If you are reading this, I know that you have a desire to help foster families. I encourage you to take every opportunity to make your support as loving and personal as you can. Thank You!
