

ARTSY ART FAIR BENEFITING KIDS IN CARE



Creativity abounded across the gallery of the “Artsy” Art Fair at The Pharmacy in downtown Springfield on July 24th. The James Project (JP) team hosted its first annual Artsy Art Fair For Kids in Care as a way to raise funds and awareness for fostering families. All art pieces were created and donated either by children or local adult artisans. Artsy volunteers set up kids’ craft areas around the gallery and provided opportunities for the youngest gallery goers to color, have faces painted, or enjoy a light snack while parents shopped. Paintings, pottery, fabric art, wood-craft, greeting cards, and

metal work were all for sale and sell these pieces did! Over \$12,000 was given to the JP which will help support our JP foster homes and allow us to continue serving fostering families in Sangamon County. We were humbled by the number of people who came to support the JP. Co-chair Diane Schleyhahn was our go-to person at The Pharmacy and her expertise made Artsy a great success. MEND OUR HOUSES CAMPAIGN KICKS OFF

As the JP begins its 8th year of serving foster families, we look back at the many milestones achieved. One which stands out is all five of the JP homes do not have a mortgage! While we no longer worry about monthly house payments, we still have maintenance on each home and property. With this idea in mind, we are launching the Mend Our Houses Campaign to raise the necessary funds needed to repair two of our homes which have seen a lot of wear and tear over the last five years.

Keeping our foster homes in good shape is a special challenge as they house larger than average families with children who have seen trauma. For foster kids who come from abusive and neglectful homes, anger and destructive behaviors can ensue. Carpeted surfaces, in particular, see the most damage which is why we would like to replace the carpet in two of the homes very soon with easy-care hard surface flooring. This change will make cleaning and repair much easier for our families and our property manager. Please join us in prayer for the Mend Our Houses campaign—that the funds become available and for guidance as we chose the correct products for our homes.

I finally felt complete! I had parents that actually took care of me and loved me. Being adopted and having a good upbringing made me who I am today. I'm now married with two children of my own, working a great job, and totally feeling like a part of a wonderful family.

My mom and dad adopted eight children besides me and had four biological children of their own, so we're quite a big, happy bunch. When I think of what my life might've been without such great parents, I feel so grateful that God put us together and that my parents opened their hearts to an "older" child.

Foster children are in the system through no fault of their own. They are victims of atrocities like abuse and neglect. Each disruption of foster homes, or separation from siblings not only causes them to be retraumatized, but also to be revictimized.
