September has been a busy month for our chapter. We continue to grow as the news spreads about our project. Workshops are active, productive and fun as we work together to make our quilts. This month we cut 35 kits, signed out 23 kits, took in 16 finished quilts, 13 donated quilts and donated 14 quilts to the hospital, 10 to Gateway shelter and 3 pillowcases to Family Promise, and signed up 8 new volunteers.

Thanks to all that are participating and to those who continue to spread the news of our work. There is always a need for more volunteers, fabric, and 2 gallon plastic Zip-loc bags, so help as you can, when you can. It is very much appreciated!

This month we proudly introduce two of our volunteers to you. First is "Miss" Era Carlin, who attends the Hopewell UMC workshops.



Era began to quilt in 1975 after watching her husband's mother and aunts quilt for years. She was living in South DeKalb County off Flat Shoals Road in Southeast Atlanta. She has made quilts for her two children, her grandchildren, friends and numerous others. She really can't count how many she has made....all by hand.

On one of the workshop days, Miss Era brought this beautiful hand-stitched quilt to show us. It was made over 10 years ago. She has several quilts in her house including a cathedral window which required 23 yards of muslin and hundreds of small colored squares.

Miss Era now uses her sewing machine to make quilts for kids and has made several during the last year.

The second featured volunteer is Hermine Pasternack, a participant of the Georgia Sewing & Quilting Block of the Month program.

Hermine spent her childhood growing up in Miami, Florida. Quilts were not part of her life at all as it was always so hot. The most important thing growing up there was fitting into a new bathing suit each year and dealing with constant bad hair days due to the humidity.

She attended college at the University of Florida in Gainesville. It was even hotter there and she remembers her first dorm did not have air conditioning so she doesn't think she even slept with a top sheet on her bed as it was so hot.

When she moved to Atlanta to attend Emory Graduate School, she bought her first coat at Rich's. She finally found out there were 4 seasons. She got her first Math teaching job in Dekalb County in 1974 and taught for 35 years. She retired in 2008 and began to enjoy "crafting".

In 2008, Hermine made two memory quilts with tee shirts from trips that her "significant other" and she had gone on—Brazil three times, Australia twice, Cancun three times, Hawaii three times, Colorado, New Orleans, Chicago, etc. He was a big Ole Miss fan and was on the football team until he hurt his knee. She made the two quilts for his daughters when he passed away. Hermine's Math teacher friend and fellow quilter, Shirley, was her inspiration, and helped her complete them and get them quilted.



Since then, she has done many block of the month quilts, a round quilt (quilts without corners), a scalloped edge quilt, a one block wonder, etc. She enjoys doing Quilts for Kids for those children who are ill. "I hope that the quilts that I have made for them help to brighten their days in the hospital" says Hermine.

Hermine has also been very supportive of the Q4K Chapter by sewing quilts or donating fabric almost every month. She is also instrumental in connecting us with Hall County Quilt Guild.

Gateway Domestic Violence Shelter has 5 new families with a total of 10 kids ages 1 to 12 years. I delivered the quilts on Sept 13th.

September 27th delivery was to a 14 year old boy who was in surgery when we arrived. One of the nurses chose a fishing quilt for him to receive when he returns from recovery.

Also we delivered pillowcases to 3 teenagers (2 boys, 1 girl) whose family is graduating from Family Promise Program and moving into an apartment this weekend.

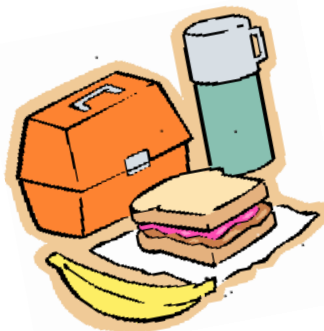
