

Overview of Key Terms

Book of Discipline

A fundamental book outlining the law, doctrine, administration, organizational work and procedures of The United Methodist Church.

Book of Resolutions

The denomination's stance on moral, social, public policy, and economic issues. The resolutions are considered instructive and persuasive, but not binding.

Social Principles

Although not considered Church law, the Social Principles are legislative statements approved by the General Conference and included in the Book of Discipline and the Book of Resolutions.

Overview of Key Terms

General Conference

The highest legislative body of The United Methodist Church. General Conference holds the power to revise The Book of Discipline and The Book of Resolutions while also initiating amendments to the denomination's constitution. General Conference normally meets once every four years.

Judicial Council

As the denomination's highest judicial body or "court," the Judicial Council's nine members, made up of laity and clergy, are elected by the General Conference and normally meet twice a year to consider whether actions of the various church bodies adhere to the constitution and follow the rules outlined in the Book of Discipline.

Regionalization approved

USA, Africa, Europe, and the Philippines can each adapt Book of Discipline

Removed Disaffiliation

Removed Paragraph 2553 from the Book of Discipline South Carolina was allowed to use Paragraph 2549 for <u>Separation</u>

Redefined marriage

"Within the church, we affirm marriage as a sacred lifelong covenant that brings two people of faith, an adult man and woman of consenting age, or two adult persons of consenting age into union with one another."

Removed restrictions on LGBTQ clergy

Removal of the ban on the ordination and appointment of "self-avowed practicing homosexual" clergy.

Removed language prohibiting same-sex marriages in UMC sanctuaries Local churches can set policies forbidding same-sex weddings.

Removed mandatory minimum penalties for clergy holding same-sex weddings.

Language related to adultery removed from clergy chargeable offenses

Revised list of offenses to remove "immorality including but not limited to, not being celibate in singleness or not faithful in a heterosexual marriage;"

Revised stance on abortion

General Conference approved a petition affirming a right to abortion and pledging "solidarity with those who seek reproductive health care." The petition, "upholds a person's right to an abortion after informed consideration with their family, medical practitioners, pastor, and other pertinent counsel."

Support to end military aid for Israel

Approved petition 20554-CC-R6111-G, which calls on the U.S. government to end military aid to Israel.

Apportionment percentage decreased

From 3.29% to 2.6% for 2025 and 2026

Allow UMC funds to support causes that promote LGBTQ

May 2, 2024 – Announced new Center for LGBTQ+ United Methodist Heritage

Going Forward

Review membership rolls – ensure all eligible voters are informed

Communication with the congregation

Awareness of changes by the UMC

Ensure factual understanding of issues prior to vote

Separation costs – approximately \$220,000......subject to change

<u>Discernment – minimum 30 days</u>

Proper decision-making guided by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit

<u>Church Conference for separation vote</u> – after January 1, 2025

Unknowns

New Bishop – effective September 1, 2024

Bishop Holston – moved to North Alabama and Alabama-West Florida Conferences

Bishop Fairley – assigned to SC from Kentucky and Central Appalachian Missionary Conferences

<u>Conference Trustees – determine process for separation</u>

Request to Judicial Council to determine validity of separation

Kentucky Conference requested a ruling on using Paragraph 2549 in Book of Discipline as an allowable exit strategy for separation
