All of our rural schools make it a priority to ensure students, staff, and families have equal opportunities to all educational opportunities. We strive to foster a welcoming school atmosphere and work hard to communicate with all families regardless of race, ethnicity, national origin, immigration status, documentation status, socioeconomic status or other traditionally marginalized groups. We make inclusiveness for all students a top priority and want all students to be included in every possible educational and school opportunity. With small and usually stable student populations it makes equity fairly straight forward. We strive to foster a welcoming school atmosphere where every student feels secure and confident to show their individual strengths and passions.

All of the component districts in Harney County are rural, one-room schoolhouses with a very small student enrollment. Several of the schools consist of one or two families and most of the students attending continue at the school for the full nine years before heading to Crane Union High School. Most of the students who attend are third or fourth generation families so connections and relationships are strong. For a school of 5-10 kids you will see a packed gymnasium for any events that take place; several events happen at each school every year and attendance from the community is strong. Community support of schools, students and staff is historically high.

Because our schools are small it affords ample opportunity for creative and student-initiated learning. Students are often engaged in projects that connect their interests to curriculum standards. Through the Student Investment Account funds all schools are offered extended learning opportunities together. Students explore career interests, local business interests and exploration beyond Harney County.

Families are deeply rooted in the school culture and engage with staff on a frequent, if not daily, basis. In the event that mental health services or support are needed, staff are poised to assist. Harney Education Service District Support Services works closely with teachers in all districts and have hired a behavior interventionist and a rural teacher support person who can assist when, and if, needed.

	hours, school staff and custodians will make sure that the space is thoroughly cleaned and disinfected.

² Cohorting refers to establishing a consistent group of students that stay together for a significant portion of the school day. Examples include stable mealtime cohorts, classrooms, table groups, lunch bunches, and other group situations. Cohorts should be as small as feasible to minimize exposure.

	Each school will, under the guidance of the LPHA and Harney Education Service District, communicate to families that at some point during the school year the school may need to require masking, based on federal, state, or local laws and policies, or to ensure that students with immunocompromising conditions or other conditions that increase their risk for getting very sick with COVID-19 can access in-person learning. The communication will reiterate that students with immunocompromising conditions or other conditions or disabilities that increase risk for getting very sick with COVID-19 will not be placed into separate classrooms or otherwise segregated from other students.
Isolation	 Per OAR 581-022-2220 schools must maintain supervised space to isolate the sick that is separate from the space where other health care tasks take place. Isolation spaces are required and have been established in every school. Protocols are established in each district building for an isolation area for illness to separate people who have or may have a contagious disease from people who are not sick as required by OAR 581-022-2220. Policies and procedures are in place for identifying, monitoring, and mitigating outbreaks of communicable diseases including COVID-19. On behalf of all component school districts Harney Education Service District works closely with LPHA. For each school there is a designated isolation room for students or staff exhibiting COVID-19 or any other communicable disease while parents are contacted. Face coverings and other PPE are available at each location. Staff members who are assigned to this room will wear appropriate PPE, including face coverings. Sick individuals will remain in the room until a parent or guardian arrives to pick them up. School staff was trained at the Rural School Teacher Inservice on August 11 and 12, 2022, in isolation protocols for sick students and staff identified at the time of arrival or during the school day according to the CDMP. Individuals with COVID-19 symptoms will be isolated, offered a test, and sent home.
Symptom Screening	In communication with families each school will include information to watch their student for symptoms of communicable disease, including COVID-19, influenza, respiratory syncytial virus (RSV),
