

Which hire route actually makes the most sense for the job?

A lot of people start by looking at the product first and the hire route second. That is often backwards. The smarter move is to work out what type of project you have, then choose the hire route that fits it properly. A quick DIY garden tidy-up, a multi-trade renovation, and a working-at-height commercial job should not all be hired the same way. The route matters because it affects cost, speed, convenience, support and whether the whole process feels efficient or like admin with a side order of regret.

In simple terms, the main hire routes in the UK are:

- **local depot or click-and-collect general hire**
- **national delivery-based online hire**
- **national branch-and-delivery general hire**
- **specialist hire provider**
- **trade-account or procurement-style hire route**

Each one has a proper place. The trick is matching the route to the project instead of assuming one model works for everything. HSS and Brandon both push nationwide branch and delivery models, National Tool Hire focuses on online booking and delivery without trade-account setup, Nationwide Platforms is clearly specialist for powered access, and HSS ProService is geared toward broader project procurement.

The Core Difference

This comparison is not about **which company is best overall**. It is about **which hire route is best for each type of project**.

The main routes look like this:

These routes are all live and visible in the current UK market. HSS promotes click and collect plus delivery, Brandon promotes flexible hire periods with nationwide delivery, National Tool Hire promotes online booking with delivery and no trade account, Nationwide Platforms is built around specialist powered access, and HSS ProService markets itself as a broad procurement-style marketplace for larger project needs.

Best Hire Route for Small DIY Jobs

For **small DIY jobs**, the best route is usually **local depot or click-and-collect general hire**. That is the cleanest option when the job is short, the equipment is mainstream, and the priority is getting in, getting the tool, and getting on with it. HSS is a good example here because it explicitly offers click and collect and delivery for mainstream hire items, including local branch access. Brandon also has local branch access, but HSS feels especially built for the quick, practical DIY journey.

This route works best for jobs like:

- floor sanding
- carpet cleaning
- hedge trimming
- breaking out a small section
- tower or ladder hire
- pressure washing
- one-room decorating prep

The reason it wins is simple: small projects do not need a procurement strategy. They need low friction. If the hire process becomes more complicated than the task, the process is failing the job.

Best hire route: Local depot / click and collect

Best Hire Route for Weekend or One-Off Domestic Projects

For **weekend projects** or **one-off domestic jobs**, the best route is often **national delivery-based online hire**. This works especially well if the user does not want a trade account, does not want to spend time ringing depots, and just wants to book online and get equipment delivered. National Tool Hire is the clearest example of this route, explicitly promoting online booking, delivery, no trade account and no credit checks.

This route suits projects such as:

- garden clearances
- short landscaping jobs
- domestic floor sanding
- access tower hire for a weekend
- mixer hire for a small external job
- one-off renovation tasks



Its strength is convenience. Its weakness is that it is less hands-on. If you already know what you need, brilliant. If you are unsure what machine, spec or size is right, a more branch-led or specialist route may be safer.

Best hire route: National delivery-based online hire

Best Hire Route for Renovation and Mixed Trade Jobs

For **renovation projects, extensions, and mixed trade jobs**, the best route is usually **national branch-and-delivery general hire**. This is where HSS and Brandon Hire Station come into their own.

Both offer wide product ranges, national reach, and delivery options, which makes them a much better fit for projects that need more than one type of equipment over several stages. Brandon explicitly promotes nationwide delivery and flexible hire periods, while HSS pushes thousands of hire products with click and collect and delivery.

This route is usually strongest for jobs involving:

- demolition plus cleanup
- decorating plus access
- floor preparation plus drying or cleaning kit
- garden and driveway work
- extension and refurbishment jobs
- repeated short hires over a few weeks

It wins because it gives you optionality. You can collect some things, get other things delivered, and keep the whole job under one broader general-hire model. It is the operational middle ground: more robust than casual online-only hire, but less specialist than a dedicated access or plant provider.

Best hire route: National branch-and-delivery general hire

Best Hire Route for Access Projects

For **working-at-height projects**, the best route depends on the type of access.

If the job is **basic low-level access** such as ladders, steps, podiums or towers, a **general access-hire route** through providers like HSS or Brandon is usually enough. Both carry mainstream access categories and broader general hire support.

If the job involves **true powered access** such as booms, scissor lifts, tracked access or significant working height, the best route is clearly a **specialist provider**. Nationwide Platforms is the cleanest example, positioning itself as the UK market-leading powered access provider with more than 12,000 machines and national depots, including boom lifts up to 58.5m and scissor lifts up to 33.5m. That split matters because access is one of the easiest places to hire the wrong way. A podium tower job does not need a full MEWP specialist. A serious powered-access job absolutely might.

Best fit

Best hire route: General hire for low-level access, specialist hire for powered access



Best Hire Route for Large Site or Commercial Projects

For **larger site jobs, commercial works, or ongoing multi-stage projects**, the best route is usually **trade-account or procurement-style hire**. HSS ProService is a good example of this model, presenting itself as a broader marketplace with over 50,000 products across access, plant, power, climate, materials and more, with local collection or UK-wide delivery.

This route makes most sense where:

- multiple categories are needed
- project spend needs centralising
- teams need repeated access to kit
- the project is ongoing rather than one-off
- admin efficiency matters
- the hire need may widen over time

This is not the sexy answer, but it is the scalable one. For bigger projects, the best hire route is often the one that reduces procurement chaos, not the one with the nicest single product page.

Corporate, yes. Useful, also yes.

Best fit

Best hire route: Trade-account / procurement-style hire

Best Hire Route for Specialist or Unusual Equipment Needs

For **specialist jobs**, the best route is usually a **specialist provider**, not a general one. That is especially true for powered access, unusual machine requirements, or jobs where technical support matters more than general convenience. Nationwide Platforms is the obvious example from the sources here, but the same logic applies across specialist hire categories more broadly: if the job is niche, the route should be niche too.

This route suits:

- specialist access
- unusual site constraints
- higher-risk work
- projects where machine choice matters
- jobs where advice and technical fit are critical

The mistake people make is trying to force a general-hire route into a specialist problem. That is usually how projects end up with the wrong machine, wasted time and some colourful language by 9:15am.

This ranking is based on the way current UK providers position their services: HSS for click and collect and general hire, Brandon for branch-and-delivery general hire, National Tool Hire for delivery-first online hire, Nationwide Platforms for specialist powered access, and HSS ProService for multi-category project procurement.

Common Mistakes People Make

1. Using the same hire route for every job

A one-day DIY task and a four-week refurbishment should not be approached the same way. The market is literally set up in different lanes for a reason.

2. Going specialist too early

For a simple domestic task, specialist hire can add unnecessary complexity. A general branch or click-and-collect route is often enough.

3. Going general when the project is clearly specialist

If the job needs powered access or unusual equipment, general hire can be the wrong lane entirely.

4. Ignoring logistics

Collection, delivery, account setup and product range all affect the real value of the hire route. Brandon, HSS, National Tool Hire and HSS ProService all foreground logistics in different ways, which is your clue that this stuff matters.

5. Choosing by headline price only

The cheapest route can become the most expensive if it wastes time, gives poor support or forces repeat hires. That is an inference, but a very grounded one based on how differently these routes are structured.



Final Verdict

For small DIY jobs, use local depot or click-and-collect hire. HSS is a good model for that route.

For one-off weekend jobs, use delivery-based online hire. National Tool Hire is the cleanest example of that route.

For renovations and mixed projects, use national branch-and-delivery general hire. HSS and Brandon are both strong here.

For access, split the route properly. Use general hire for towers and ladders, and specialist providers like Nationwide Platforms for true powered access.

For larger commercial jobs, use a procurement-style route. HSS ProService is the clearest example in the current set.

The smartest question is not “where can I hire this?” It is:

“What hire route best fits the shape of this project?”

That is the comparison that actually saves time, money and hassle.

If the project is small, go simple. If it is one-off, go delivery-first. If it is mixed-stage, go national general hire. If it is specialist, hire through a specialist. If it is large and ongoing, treat it like procurement, not a casual purchase.
