
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The 2024-2025 Inaugural Meeting

A BRIEF HISTORY OF THE FEDERALIST SOCIETY

THE HISTORY OF THE FEDERALIST SOCIETY: A CONSERVATIVE LEGAL REVOLUTION

The Federalist Society for Law and Public Policy Studies, commonly known simply as the Federalist Society, has become one of the most influential legal organizations in the United States. Founded in 1982 by a group of conservative and libertarian law students, the Society has played a pivotal role in reshaping American jurisprudence, nurturing a generation of judges, lawyers, and policymakers who emphasize principles of textualism and originalism. Its history reflects a journey from a small student group pushing back against the liberal orthodoxy of legal education to a nationally prominent organization with significant sway over judicial nominations and constitutional interpretation.

FOUNDING AND EARLY YEARS: A CHALLENGE TO THE LEGAL ESTABLISHMENT

The Federalist Society was established in 1982 by law students at Yale Law School, Harvard Law School, and the University of Chicago Law School, including Steven Calabresi, David McIntosh, and Lee Liberman Otis. At the time, the founders perceived the American legal academy as being dominated by liberal ideologies and views that often favored an expansive interpretation of the Constitution and supported the growth of the administrative state. They sought to create an organization that would provide a forum for conservative and libertarian legal thought, focusing on the principles of limited government, the separation of powers, and the primacy of individual liberty.

The group was named in homage to *The Federalist Papers*, the series of essays written by Alexander Hamilton, James Madison, and John Jay to support the ratification of the U.S. Constitution. This name was chosen to reflect the Society's commitment to a legal philosophy rooted in the Constitution's original meaning and the principles of federalism.

The Society's first national conference, held in April 1982 at Yale, was a pivotal moment in its early history. The conference attracted over 200 attendees, including legal scholars, practitioners, and judges. Future U.S. Attorney General Edwin Meese and Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia (then a law professor) were featured speakers, lending the organization early credibility and setting the stage for its rapid growth.

GROWTH AND INFLUENCE IN THE REAGAN ERA

The timing of the Federalist Society's founding coincided with the rise of the Reagan administration, which shared many of the group's ideological tenets. President Ronald Reagan appointed a number of conservative judges and embraced the judicial philosophy of originalism, which was championed by many Federalist Society members and scholars. This alignment allowed the Society to become a crucial pipeline for identifying and promoting conservative legal talent, further bolstering its standing.

During the 1980s, the Society expanded rapidly, establishing chapters at law schools across the country. By the end of the decade, it had become a fixture on most major law school campuses, where it served as a counterweight to the predominantly liberal viewpoints in legal academia. The Society's presence also grew outside of law schools, with the creation of practice groups and networks for lawyers, judges, and policymakers.

By the 1990s and early 2000s, the Federalist Society had solidified its status as a major force within the legal profession. Its annual National Lawyers Convention in Washington, D.C. became a high-profile gathering for leading conservative thinkers, judges, and policymakers. The Society's practice groups began influencing key policy debates, including topics such as administrative law, federalism, and constitutional interpretation.

The Society's influence in judicial nominations also became a hallmark of its institutional power. By the George W. Bush administration, the Federalist Society was a prominent source of potential judicial nominees. Bush's appointments, including Chief Justice John Roberts and Justice Samuel Alito, reflected the Society's commitment to originalism and textualism. Many of Bush's other lower court appointments were also Society members or adherents to its principles.

THE TRUMP ADMINISTRATION AND THE RISE OF ORIGINALISM

The Federalist Society's influence peaked during the Trump administration, which made reshaping the federal judiciary a top priority. Leonard Leo, a long-time Federalist Society executive, played a pivotal role in advising the White House on judicial nominations, leading to the appointment of three Supreme Court Justices: Neil Gorsuch, Brett Kavanaugh, and Amy Coney Barrett. Each of these justices was seen as committed to the Society's principles of constitutional originalism and judicial restraint, marking a significant shift in the Court's ideological balance.

President Trump's appointment of over 200 federal judges — many of whom were Federalist Society members or affiliates — marked one of the most significant transformations of the judiciary in modern history. This influence extended to lower federal courts, where Trump appointees are likely to shape American jurisprudence for decades.

PHILOSOPHICAL UNDERPINNINGS: TEXTUALISM AND ORIGINALISM

The Federalist Society's success is rooted in its distinct legal philosophy, which emphasizes textualism and originalism. Textualism, popularized by figures like the late Justice Antonin Scalia, argues that statutory interpretation should focus on the text of the law itself, rather than broader legislative intent. Originalism, championed by figures like Justice Clarence Thomas, holds that constitutional interpretation should be grounded in the meaning of the text at the time it was enacted.

These approaches serve as counterpoints to more liberal interpretative theories such as the "living Constitution" model, which views the Constitution as an evolving document that should be interpreted in light of contemporary social values. The Federalist Society's emphasis on these principles reflects its broader commitment to limiting judicial discretion, promoting judicial restraint, and adhering to a fixed understanding of constitutional governance.

CONCLUSION: A LASTING LEGACY

The Federalist Society's history is a testament to the power of ideas in shaping the legal landscape. What began as a small group of disaffected law students has grown into a formidable institution that has changed the trajectory of American jurisprudence. Through its promotion of textualism and originalism, the Society has not only influenced legal thinking but has also played a direct role in shaping the composition of the judiciary. As debates over the role of the courts and constitutional interpretation continue, the Federalist Society will undoubtedly remain a key player in the evolution of American law.

On October 8, 2024, the highly anticipated Future of Law in an AI World Symposium will take place at the prestigious Mayflower Hotel in Washington, D.C. This event will bring together thought leaders, academics, and policymakers to explore the evolving intersection of artificial intelligence and legal frameworks. With the rise of generative AI, which can autonomously produce vast volumes of creative works without human input, the relevance of these historical frameworks is being put to the test.

Rosen's paper contends that the past may offer significant clues for navigating this new terrain. By examining how the copyright system adapted to technological disruptions in the past—such as the advent of photography, cinema, and digital media—Rosen argues that the evolution of copyright registration offers a potential blueprint for addressing generative AI's complexities.




