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Focus on a Service – Initial Consultation

Have you ever gone in to a surgical center to have a procedure done without having first talked to a doctor? Or how about a mechanics shop and having them work on the engine without being told what might be wrong first?

I bet not.... neither have I.

When I was first setting up the business, I took in to consideration a lot of factors when it came to how the business would run and what I would charge. The one thing that stuck in my mind was: what if what the potential client has just spent the past half hour describing what they need/want done, and it turns out that

I'm the wrong person for their needs? Do I still charge them for that half hour of time just to say "sorry, can't help you"? That just seemed wrong to me.

So I came up with the idea of setting aside one hour just to hear them out, figure out what they needed done, and if I can help them, begin the contract phase. Therein began the "Initial Consultation" with no fees attached.

In most cases, I am able to help the new client, but in at least two cases what they needed was an architect or a real estate agent.





The basic idea is for me to ask what is the overall need, and drill down to the tasks needed. Kind of like the reporters of old, the "who, what, where, when and why" type of interviews. This gives me a better picture of what's going on and what needs to be done.

In a couple cases, it turned out that while I knew what the potential client needed and that I could potentially help, all they really needed was an architect and a construction firm.

One might ask, "if you tell them what they need is someone else, won't you lose business?" Well, sure, I could. But on the flip side, if they remember that I was up front with them and didn't try to take their money for nothing, I could potentially earn a new clients down the road.

What IS the planning field anyway?

A good working definition of planning might be: the process by which local governments (typically) determine the intensity and geographical arrangements of various uses within the community. Another way to define planning might also include: the protection of the health, safety and welfare of those living in a defined area. Simply, it is the process by which society decides what gets built where.

This definition in a way is why one sees industrial functions lumped together, commercial functions lumped together, and residential functions lumped together. Deciding land use in this way came after years of everything just lumped together and issues arising from that that eventually needing to be addressed.

Even within that brief description provided, the concept of planning covers a lot of ground. In short, it's fair to say

that the planning process covers five interrelated activities: design (the layout), laws and regulations (shaping and application of state laws and local environmental regulations), (assessing the impact of any give plan or development), socioeconomic impact (assessing the impact of a plan on a neighborhood's social structure, on a communities fiscal health), and political approval (winning the support of the public and elected representatives).

Unlike the thinking of some people, planning is not just the "rubber stamping" of an application when it comes in. If done properly, depending on the subject matter, the process could take a few months to a few years to go through the system. Or it may "die on the vine" for any number of reasons.
