Pastor's Message

Cindy Cain and I attended this year's Wisconsin Conference Annual Meeting at Green Lake. I attended the Thursday intensive workshop lead by Matt Miofsky based on his book, Let Go: Leaning into the Future Without Fear. He explained that change is either "threatening, dangerous, needs to be resisted" or is seen as "a chance to grow, an opportunity to be embraced." I found that to be a very profound statement. We do want to grow, but at the same time, it certainly can be a challenge to what feels familiar and right. In all I took 13 pages of notes. I will be sharing many of them with you at one time or another.

The Conference sent an e-mail summarizing five takeaways from the annual meeting. I hope you find them enlightening. Please share your thoughts with me. I'd love to hear them.

We're on a journey to becoming "the next expression of Christ in the world'. Conference Minister Franz Rigert drew on a metaphor from Stephanie Spellers' "The book Church Cracked Open: Disruption, Decline, and New

Although external forces like COVID-19 and racial and political tensions the Spirit of Pentecost continue "refashion and renew this Church...to transform us, to empower us to transcend all that limits us. We got WISEer. Delegates to the Annual Meeting on Saturday unanimously approved a resolution declaring the Wisconsin Conference Welcoming, Inclusive, Supportive and Engaged (WISE) for Mental Health. The resolution followed a year of discussion by a critical mass of Wisconsin UCC congregations. On Saturday evening, Vicki Harvey of the UCC Mental Health Network emailed Associate Conference Minister, Lisa Hart, with the news that Wisconsin is the fourth WISE conference the denomination.

"We can improvise our plans, excessively and abundantly, with courage and hope and not just the way we've always done it." Stephanie said. "We can plan, and God may laugh, but only in order to ask us to expand our imaginations toward the flourishing God intends for all of us."

Through our budgets, we build a beloved community. The way the church spends money is a statement about how we are responding to God's call in this time and place "to create a beloved community wherein lives get transformed," said the Rev. Andrew Warner, development director for the Wisconsin Conference. "Through budgets WISE is an official des- 'Making plans in faith but make decisions about how

we will embody God's love in the world." Examples include the Conference's investments in leadership development and congregational development. Support from congregations through Our Church's Wider Mission makes most of this work possible. Beyond gifts to OCWM Basic Support, individuals in the Conference over the past year have donated generously to refugee relief in Ukraine, earthquake recovery in Syria and Turkey, and tornado recovery in Mississippi and Alabama.

ST. PAUL'S WOMEN'S GUILD


June was a busy month for the Guild, beginning with a brat fry and plant sale at Fox Bros. Piggly Wiggly in Hubertus on June 10. The



Rhubarb Torte

CRUST:

18 single graham crackers, crumbled

½ c. melted butter

% c. sugar

4 c. rhubarb, cut up in small pieces

1 c. sugar

3 Tbs. cornstarch blended with water

10 oz. pkg. miniature marshmallows 1 pint whipping cream

3 oz. pkg. vanilla pudding

Mix crumbs, sugar and butter. Reserve ½ cup for top. Press into 9x13-inch pan. Over low heat, bring rhubarb to a boil-do not add water; add sugar. When rhubarb is cooked, add cornstarch. Remove from heat. Add marshmallows and stir until they melt. Spread over crust and refrigerate. When chilled, spread half pint of whipped cream over rhubarb. Chill. Prepare vanilla pudding as directed on package. Cool and spread over whipped cream. Sprinkle with reserved crumbs. Refrigerate.
