

### **KEYNOTE SPEAKER LAURA DICKERSON** UAW REGION 1A DIRECTOR



Laura Dickerson was elected UAW Region 1A Director at a special convention on Aug. 27, 2021. She fills the remaining term of former Region 1A Director Chuck Browning, who was unanimously elected by the UAW International Executive Board to the position of Vice President and Director of the UAW Ford Department. Dickerson is the first African American woman in the history of the UAW to be elected as Regional Director and to be promoted to Assistant Director of a Regional UAW Office. She was appointed Assistant Director of Region 1A in 2020. Region 1A covers most of Wayne (including part of Detroit), Monroe and Washtenaw counties, and extends to the Ohio border. Dickerson joined the UAW in 1997 as a member of UAW Local 600. She was elected Chairperson of her unit for three terms (2002-2010) and to the Bargaining team in 1999. She was elected delegate to the 34th and 35th UAW Constitutional Conventions and was selected to serve on the 35th UAW Constitutional Convention Resolutions Committee, where she was elected and served as Chairperson. Dickerson has served as President of the UAW Local 600 Technical, Office and Professionals (TOP) Advisory Council

and held an elected position on the UAW National Community Action Program (CAP) Advisory Council in 2010. She served on the 2011 UAW Ford National Negotiations team and served as Project Manager for UAW Staff Voluntary Employees' Beneficiary Association (VEBA) transition in 2014. Dickerson served as UAW Staff Council Vice President, negotiating the Staff Council agreement in 2016 and 2020; and as the UAW-Ford Enhanced Care Program Pilot Lead in 2012.

As part of her many roles with Local 600, she has been a regular volunteer in the Detroit Central United Methodist Church's Feed the Homeless initiative, as well as the UAW-Ford's Feed the Homeless project for Labor Day. A breast cancer survivor herself, Laura has been an avid participant in the Susan G. Komen "Race for the Cure" for many years. Laura holds both a Bachelor's and Master's degree from Central Michigan University. Her Bachelor's degree is in Industrial Supervision and Management with a minor in Industrial Safety, while her Master's degree is in General Administration with a concentration in Health Services Administration. She was honored with the Women of Excellence Award from the Michigan Chronicle in April 2021.

### **KEYNOTE SPEAKER BYRON BROOKS** ACTIVIST—SOCIAL ENTREPRENEUR



A proud native Detroiter, statistics would say that by his age, Byron D. Brooks (He/Him/His) would either be dead or in jail. Born in prison, and formerly homeless. Brooks was raised by his great-grandparents, Roscoe and JoEsther Corner, and through faith and perseverance, he was able to show society that he is more than a statistic. As an activist, philanthropist, social entrepreneur and transformational Speaker, Brooks is passionate about youth, black economic and community development, fighting homelessness, and being an advocate of change! He currently holds degrees and certificates from Henry Ford College, Ferris State University, Harvard, and is currently pursuing two masters degrees from The University of Michigan, Ann Arbor of which he will receive in December of 2022. He is also a proud member of Phi Beta Sigma Fraternity, Inc.

Brooks is passionate about social justice, equity, and bridging the gap between race, faith, and justice. Known as "MoSoul The Hood Preacher" Brooks was licensed as a Minister of The Gospel at Dexter Avenue Baptist Church of Detroit on July 30, 2017 and is an advocate of Black Liberation Theology. He is a proud member of Hopewell Baptist Church in Detroit where KC Pierce II is his Pastor. He is particularly interested in exploring ways to dismantle systemic racism from marginalized communities, and the educational system, while living out the vision of the talented tenth to promote social equity. Currently Brooks serves as the Founder of 501c3 From The Hood For The Hood and is Chief Hood Officer of Hood Black & Educated Consulting Group. His hope is to be a living example, and spread the spirit of the African Proverb, Ubuntu: I am because We Are!





Marvin was raised on the Northwest side of Detroit. As a graduate of Cass Technical High and an All-City/All-State Track student-athlete, he learned the importance of work ethic and time management. Running track also provided a life blueprint exemplifying the notion that hard work is a common denominator of success.

Afterwards, he graduated from Kentucky State University with a degree in Education. There were offers all over the United States for an African-American Male

teacher, but he was inspired to give back to the city he knew could use his expertise and presence. He loved the connection to

the students while teaching, but was motivated to do more.

Marvin enrolled at Wayne State University and earned his Masters' of Arts degree in School Administration. Upon graduation, he immediately went into administration.

He spent 11 years as an administrator, 8 of those years as a principal. He merged schools and effectively improved the academic performance of a low performing school in just 2 years.

Over the last 25 years, Marvin has coached youth and high school basketball, taught youth chess, Sunday School and hosted a podcast, Say It Loud!







#### History of NAACP Western Wayne County NAACP

The branch was charted as the Inkster Branch of the NAACP on June 28, 1947.

Joseph Davis, who served as Mayor of the city of Inkster served as President. Mr. William Clark served as branch President in the 1950s. Mr. Clark was well loved in all the branches throughout the state, often attending events hosted by other branches. He always wanted people to know that the Inkster Branch was "in the house."

On June 11, 1959, the branch's name was changed to Inkster – Wayne Branch because they were following up on issues outside of the City of Inkster

From 1961 – 1970; Mr. Roy Wilson served as President. During his tenure the branch negotiated with NBD bank to hire black employees. The bank, which served a primarily black population, did not have any black employees at that time.


From 1971-1974, Edward Bivens, Jr., who was mayor of the city of Inkster was President. During this time, meetings were held at the Inkster Police Department's Auxiliary Office.

In 1993, Karen Williams was elected President. At this time, she was the youngest person, and only female to be elected branch president. During Ms. Williams presidency efforts were made to reestablish the youth council. Mr. Earl Truss served as youth adviser and was awarded the Adviser of the year award from the Michigan State Conference. Daisy Truss served as the youth council president.

From 1995 – 1996, Reverend George Williams who was a member of the Inkster School Board of Education was President.

In 1997, Attorney Leonard Mongo served as President. During his tenure the branch met at the Malcolm X complex in Inkster. During his presidency, the name of the branch was officially changed to Western Wayne County. This was part of an effort to grow the branch outside of the city of Inkster and stimulate membership throughout the other cities the branch served.

Attorney Mongo resigned from his position early and the branch's 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President Minister Earl Truss became President. Minister Truss was later elected President in 1999. During his presidency meetings were held at Smith Chapel AME Church in Inkster and Waynecorse Church of Christ in Romulus. During Mr. Truss's presidency Western Wayne County was the 2<sup>nd</sup> largest branch within the state.






Reestablishing the youth council was again seen as a high priority. It had been believed that the youth council had received its own charter in 1947. When it was learned that it never had a separate charter from the branch, it was reorganized. The youth branch finally became its own entity with its own unit number of 3911.

From 2003 to 2009 former branch treasurer Lucille Flint was elected President. Highlights of Ms. Flint's presidency include hosting civil rights activist Dick Gregory for a Freedom Fund Dinner and starting a Women in the NAACP (WIN) committee. Two highly successful ACT-SO competitions were also held with Attorney Raymond Mullins serving as the ACT-SO chair.

Aaron Sims, former 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President and youth adviser was elected President in 2009. He was the youngest person to serve in that capacity since Karen Williams. During Aaron's tenure some of the branch's meetings were



held at Middlebelt Baptist Church in Inkster. However, for the first time in years the branch also had its own office space, housed in the law office of Nabih Ayad & Associates at 2200 Canton Center Rd. #220 in the city of Canton. In 2010, the branch won 2<sup>nd</sup> Place in the Lucille Black Award in the Class 1-C Division at the 101<sup>st</sup> Annual NAACP National Convention. The award was presented to the branch that had the highest total membership production from January 1, 2009 – December 31, 2009.

In 2012, the branch fell out of compliance with the national office. It had to be completely reorganized. New officers were elected in April 2013 with the assistance of Michigan State Conference President Yvonne White and officially sworn into office by the Honorable Hilliard Hampton, mayor of the city of Inkster. The new officers were Bishop Walter Stargill, Jr. - President; Lucille Flint 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President; Daisy Truss 2<sup>nd</sup> Vice President; Gina Wilson Steward – Secretary, Rev. John Hearn – Treasurer. Executive Committee members included Lori Parks, Richard LeBlanc, Sherita Thomas, George Williams, Julie Claypool and Robert Wilson.

The Branch general membership meetings were held on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Mondays of every month at Christian Faith Ministries in Garden City while executive committee meetings are held the fourth Tuesdays of every month at Wayne Road Church of Christ in Romulus, MI. Currently efforts are being made to grow the membership and be more visual in the community.

A speaker from the community is invited to every general membership meeting to address various issues. The branch's goals was to have a presence throughout all the 18 cities that the branch serves. The branch designated that

once a quarter, the General Membership meetings will be held offsite in one of the four quadrants to help increase the awareness of the branch in other communities.

President Starghill and the branch hosted a Town Hall in Westland that consisted of the Police Chiefs from twelve of the cities that we serve. The branch also hosted the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter State meeting at Wayne County Community College in Van Buren Township.

In 2017, the new officers elected were Gina Wilson Steward



- President, Daisy Truss  $-1^{st}$  Vice President, Lisa Robinson Martin  $-2^{nd}$  Vice President, LaDarla Morris – Secretary, Shirley Hankerson – Assistant Secretary and Evelyn Clark Treasurer and Judy Neal-Assistant Treasurer. The branch won the LayDown from the State of Michigan for the most new members in 2017. The youth branch was reestablished.

In 2018 the branch hosted a Candidate Forum for the 13<sup>th</sup> Congressional District Candidates in the City of Inkster. The seat was vacant after the resignation of Congressman John Conyers, Jr. The GOTV efforts of the branch resulted in a 100% increase in voter turnout in the targeted areas. Michigan State Conference President named the Western Wayne County NAACP as the Branch of the Year. The Branch partnered with the Delta Sigma Theta Inkster Chapter and Alpha Kappa Alpha Sororities on the GOTV efforts.

In 2019 the new officers were; Gina Wilson Steward – President, Pastor Velma Overman – 1<sup>st</sup> Vice President, Vicki Dobbins – Secretary, Shirley Hankerson – Assistant Secretary, Evelyn Clark Treasurer and Judy Neal-Assistant Treasurer. They fulfilled the National MOUs with Delta Sigma Theta, Zeta Phi Beta and the NNPA. The membership doubled in size from 2018. The attendance at the monthly meetings reached a milestone of 72 members at the December meeting. It was also the Census Kick Off meeting- I Matter. Count Me In.

The Economic Sustainability Committee began hosting a Series of Financial Workshops in the community with various partners.

Other projects they worked on were an Expungement Fair with the Delta Sigma Theta Alumni Chapter and Voter Registration Drives with various school districts.

The branch paid for one delegate to attend the Regional Training in Indiana, the six delegates to attend the National NAACP Convention held in Detroit and three delegates to attend the State Convention in Saginaw.



The Freedom Fund Dinner was held at the Prestige Banquet Hall in Allen Park. Lt. Gov. Garlin Gilchrist was the keynote speaker. There were a record 30% of attendees who were Millennials

The Religious Affairs Committee created the first Champion of Faith competition. The winner was Christian Faith Ministries whose church had the most members in 2019. They received the trophy during the sold out crowd at the Freedom Fund Dinner. The branch hosted the 4<sup>th</sup> Quarter State meeting at Wayne County Community College at the Downriver location in Taylor. It was the most attended State meeting in 2019.

The branch kicked off their Street By Street Campaign to connect with more people for the election and the 2020 Census. They partnered with the State of Michigan to reach more people in the region.

Then comes the COVID-19 Pandemic in early 2020 and life as we knew it has changed. As we followed the guidelines of the National office of the NAACP and the Michigan department of health, we learned how to use ZOOM. Our general membership meetings, Executive Committee meeting and events were all held on ZOOM. We learned to always have a mask handy. The Health Committee and the Religious Affairs Committee held numerous events on living with Covid and dealing with Mental Illness. The branch partnered with Western Wayne Family Health Center to offer Covid –19 testing in the neighborhoods of Ecorse, River Rouge, Romulus and SW Detroit

The partnership with Conference of Western Wayne for the Partnership for Progress Listening Tour started in person, but had to move to virtual meetings. The relationships with the Police Chiefs and Mayors in 13 of the cities in our region helped to create more of a proactive approach to building community policing relationships.

The Freedom Fund Event in 2020 was a virtual event with actress Lonnie Love as our keynote speaker. This was exciting as the branch experienced a different way of still having an impactful evening and still honoring people from our communities.

The officers elected to lead the branch for the next two years were; President—Gina Wilson Steward, 1st Vice-President—Velma Overman, 2nd Vice President—John Hearn, Jr., Secretary—Vicki Dobbins, Asst. Secretary—Ruby Richards, Treasurer—Shirley Hankerson and Asst Treasurer—Ruby Richards.




