

A CHECKLIST FOR IDENTIFYING TORAH ALIGNED WALKING

This checklist helps you recognize when a teaching, community, or personal walk is aligned with covenant obedience to YAHUAH and the example of Yahushua HaMashiach.

SECTION 1 AUTHORITY & FOUNDATION

- Torah is treated as living instruction, not obsolete law
- Scripture interprets Scripture (not institutions)
- Teachings invite verification and personal study
- No human authority replaces accountability to YAHUAH
- Leaders point you back to the text, not to themselves

Scripture Anchor:

Deuteronomy 10:12–13

YAHUAH requires us to fear Him, walk in His ways, love Him, and keep His commandments for our good.

Joshua 1:8

Meditating on and obeying the Torah continually leads to true success and prosperity in YAHUAH's way.

SECTION 2 OBEDIENCE-BASED FAITH

- Faith is demonstrated through daily obedience
- Teachings emphasize doing the Word, not just hearing
- Repentance includes behavioral change
- Obedience is taught as love, not bondage
- Growth is measured by fruit, not feelings

Scripture Anchor:

John 14:15

If you truly love Him, you will show it by keeping His commandments.

James 1:22

Do not only hear the Word live it out through obedience.

SECTION 3 TORAH HONORED, NOT EXPLAINED AWAY

- Commandments are respected and studied carefully
- Torah is seen as protection and wisdom
- Difficult instructions are not dismissed for convenience
- Context is honored (who, when, why)
- Torah is lived privately, not just discussed publicly

Scripture Anchor:

Psalm 119:142

YAHUAH's righteousness is everlasting, and His Torah is truth.

Deuteronomy 30:11

The commandment YAHUAH gives is not too difficult or out of reach.

SECTION 4 DIRECT RELATIONSHIP WITH YAHUAH

- Prayer is direct, not mediated through hierarchy
- Personal responsibility is emphasized
- Accountability begins with self-examination
- No dependence on titles, ranks, or spiritual classes
- Relationship is defined by faithfulness, not attendance

Scripture Anchor:

Deuteronomy 6:4-9

Love YAHUAH with all your heart, teach His commandments continually, and keep them central in daily life.

Matthew 23:8-11

Do not seek titles or elevation over others, but serve one another in humility.

SECTION 5 THE NAME IS HONORED

- The Name YAHUAH is acknowledged and respected
- The Messiah is known as Yahushua HaMashiach
- Names are taught as meaningful, not symbolic
- Scripture about the Name is not ignored
- Identity is rooted in covenant, not labels

Scripture Anchor:

Exodus 3:15

YAHUAH declares His Name as His eternal memorial for all generations.

Proverbs 18:10

The Name of YAHUAH is a strong tower where the righteous find safety.

SECTION 6 WORSHIP AS A WAY OF LIFE

- Worship is seen as how one lives daily
- Obedience outweighs ritual
- Righteous conduct matters outside gatherings
- Integrity exists when no one is watching
- Faithfulness is consistent, not seasonal

Scripture Anchor:

1 Samuel 15:22

Obedience to YAHUAH is greater than sacrifice or outward ritual.

Micah 6:8

YAHUAH requires justice, mercy, and humble walking with Him.

SECTION 7 HUMILITY & SERVANT LEADERSHIP

- Leaders serve rather than rule
- Correction is welcomed when rooted in Scripture
- No fear-based control or manipulation
- Teaching produces maturity, not dependency
- Unity is built on truth, not pressure

Scripture Anchor:

Matthew 20:25–28

True greatness is found in serving others, not ruling over them.

Proverbs 9:8–9

A wise person accepts correction and grows wiser through instruction.

SECTION 8 FRUIT THAT MATCHES TORAH

- Character aligns with instruction
- Justice, mercy, and faithfulness are visible
- Speech reflects discipline and wisdom
- Growth is steady, not performative
- Life reflects separation from the world's patterns

Scripture Anchor:

Matthew 7:16–20

People are known by their fruit their actions reveal who they truly are.

Deuteronomy 28:1–2

If you diligently obey YAHUAH's commandments, blessings will follow and overtake you.

FINAL SELF-CHECK

Ask yourself honestly:

- Does this walk bring me closer to obedience?
- Does it sharpen my discipline and responsibility?
- Does it restore what was lost, not invent something new?
- Does it align my daily life with Torah?
- Does it make me less dependent on systems and more accountable to YAHUAH?

If the answers are consistently yes, you are seeing covenant green flags.
