

Why Some Prayers Are Not Answered

This is a hard question for many people.

Sometimes people pray...
And nothing changes.

Torah doesn't ignore this reality.

But it explains it.

Gently.

Disobedience Can Block Blessing

(Isaiah 59:1–2)

Isaiah says:

YAHUAH's hand is not too short to save.
His ear is not too dull to hear.

But separation can occur because of iniquity.

This does not mean:
He cannot hear.

It means:
Covenant alignment matters.

If someone consistently walks outside instruction,
they may experience distance — not because YAHUAH is weak,
but because covenant has structure.

This is correction, not rejection.

Asking Outside Covenant

Prayer works within covenant.

If someone asks for:

- Prosperity in wrongdoing
- Success in disobedience
- Protection while ignoring instruction

That request contradicts Torah.

YAHUAH does not endorse what violates His Word.

This isn't punishment.
It's consistency.

Praying Without Repentance

If someone knows they are out of alignment
but refuses to correct course...

Prayer becomes incomplete.

Repentance is not humiliation.

It is realignment.

Many prayers are restored the moment humility enters.

Praying With Divided Loyalty

Divided loyalty means:

- Trusting YAHUAH... but also trusting idols.
- Praying... but also practicing what Torah warns against.
- Saying one thing... living another.

Covenant is relational.

It is built on loyalty.

When loyalty is divided, clarity becomes blurred.

Important Encouragement

This section is not about fear.

It is about maturity.

If a prayer feels unanswered, the question is not:

“Is YAHUAH ignoring me?”

The question becomes:

“Is there alignment I need to restore?”

That shift changes everything.

Prayer is not blocked by weakness.

It is corrected by covenant.

And restoration is always available when we return.
