Understanding Hebrew Language Structure

Hebrew is structured very differently from most modern languages. It was designed to communicate **function, action, and purpose**, not just abstract labels. Instead of only naming things, Hebrew words describe what something **does** or how it operates.

Because Hebrew is built around patterns and roots, meaning stays connected and consistent. When beginners understand this structure, Torah instruction becomes clearer and more practical.

Hebrew reads right to left
