

# Covenant Structure of Prayer

Prayer in Torah follows a pattern.

Not a script.

Not a chant.

But a covenant flow.

Here is the simple structure:

## **Acknowledge YAHUAH**

Start by recognizing:

- Who He is
- His authority
- His righteousness
- His covenant Name

This sets position.

Example:

“Abba YAHUAH, You are righteous and faithful.”

Prayer begins with reverence not requests.

## **Remember the Covenant**

Recall:

- His promises
- His instructions
- His faithfulness to Israel
- His mercy toward those who return

This keeps prayer grounded.

Example:

“You are the One who keeps covenant with those who love You and keep Your commandments.”

Now you’re aligned.

## **Confess (If Necessary)**

If there has been drift, acknowledge it.

Not shame.

Not self-condemnation.

Just agreement.

Example:

“I have not walked fully in Your instruction. Correct me.”

Confession clears alignment.

## **Request Within Torah Boundaries**

Now you ask.

But you ask in agreement with covenant.

Not:

“Bless my disobedience.”

But:

“Strengthen me to walk upright.”

Requests should:

- Honor Torah
- Not contradict instruction
- Seek righteousness over comfort

## **Commit to Obedience**

This is the part most people skip.

End with commitment.

Example:

“I will walk in Your ways. Guard my steps.”

Prayer without obedience is incomplete.

Covenant prayer ends with action.

## Why This Framework Is Powerful

It:

- Removes emotional chaos
- Protects against manipulation
- Keeps prayer aligned
- Trains spiritual maturity

This is not performance.

This is covenant order.

## Simple Visual Version

Israel is a **covenant name given through transformation**, not merely by birthright. In the Torah, the name Israel is given after struggle, growth, and change, showing that Israel represents discipline, perseverance, and a commitment to walk in instruction. Those called Israel are entrusted with responsibility, not superiority called to live as an example of order, obedience, and covenant faithfulness, preserving Torah instruction through disciplined and righteous living.

### **Genesis 32:28**

Israel is named after transformation, showing identity is formed through struggle and growth.

### **Exodus 19:5–6**

Israel is called into covenant responsibility to model obedience and priestly service, not superiority.

What the Sun Governs

- It determines the changing of seasons.
- It signals the arrival of **spring**, which is necessary for identifying the first month of the year (Exodus 12:2; Deuteronomy 16:1).

Ancient Hebrew is a **pictographic language**, meaning the original letters were pictures rather than abstract symbols, and each letter carried both a **concept and an action**.

Words were designed to **tell stories**, not just represent sounds.

example, **Aleph** (א) symbolizes strength or a leader, and **Bet** (ב) represents a house or dwelling; together they form **Ab (Father)** the strong leader of the house. The beginner takeaway is that Hebrew communicates **identity, role, and function**, not merely spoken language.

Language in Scripture is directly tied to **identity restoration**, because Hebrew names describe **character, purpose, and assignment**, not random labels.

In the Hebrew mindset, names carried meaning and power, and when names were changed, understanding and direction were often altered as well.

This is why restoring names like **YAHUAH** and **Yahushua HaMashiach** matters translation replaces meaning, while transliteration preserves it.
