TEACHING

SYLLABLES

Good reading and spelling depend on an understanding or natural feeling for syllables, (likened these to beats in music). Follow the instructions, then find more examples and make extra cards.

	crocodile croc o dile	INSTRUCTIONS: Stick this sheet onto card. Cut out each card and write the number of syllables found in each word on the back of each card, e.g. on the reverse of both 'television' cards write '4', and on the reverse of both 'crocodile' cards write '3'. Place the picture cards face down, (blank-side uppermost) and also the word cards, so that the numbers on their backs are visible. One child then selects one blank card, looks at the picture and decides how many syllables are in the item shown, e.g. tel/e/vi/sion = 4. They then pick-up a card with 4 on it and compare the word. If the card selected matches, they keep the pair. If it is not correct, they replace the cards, trying to remember where they are (pelmonism). The game continues and the child with the most pairs at the end wins. This exercise can be extended by making and adding more sets of cards.
