A SACRIFICIAL HEART

When we look at Hannah's prayer as she brings Samuel to be raised up with the priest Eli, we don't see sadness, we see rejoicing, because she still knows that God's value is greater than what she was releasing at the alter. God continued to bless Hannah with the increase of more children as her first born (her tithe unto the Lord) became an instrument of God. What are you willing to release unto the Lord? What has caused you to fertilize the ground with your tears? Rejoice, because the Lord has heard your cry. You are not forgotten. Be forever willing.
