Homeless Veteran Stand Down, 2019 - Ed Sends - The Seminole County Homeless Veteran Stand Down for 2019 was held on Saturday October 26<sup>th</sup> at the Florida Health Department in Seminole County on Airport Boulevard. It was a very successful event serving 71 Veterans who were homeless or precariously housed, almost a third more than last year. Three of the most desperate were successfully sheltered that day and VA referrals were given to others. Numerous teeth were pulled that day, including 13 from one Veteran. Eighteen haircuts and showers were provided. Everyone enjoyed a delicious Bar B Que from Chef Sennet. Α full array of services was provided by the VA, the Health Department and other community service providers including legal services VA service officers, suicide prevention, PTSD counselors, Women Veteran counselors, medical evaluation and treatment, flu shots and more. The exact number of truly homeless and those precariously housed will not be known until the Orlando VA can fully evaluate the registrations. A big thank you to all involved, from the providers to the Battle Buddies. It would not have been successful without you.

5. Seminole County Veteran of the Month, October 2019, On October 8<sup>th</sup>, 2019, Specialist 4 Adonis A. Murillo, was name the Seminole County Veteran of the Month for October 2019. He entered the U.S. Army in August, 1988 and was Honorably discharged in August, 1996, he served eight years as a 57E20, Laundry and Bath Specialist, providing preventive maintenance of laundry, shower, delousing equipment, and personnel and clothing decontamination. He served throughout the United States and the world including Fort Totten, New York, Fort Lee, Virginia, Turkey and over six months in Saudi Arabia supporting Operation Desert Shield and Operation Desert Storm. Specialist 4 Adonis A. Murillo awards and decorations include the National Defense Service Medal, the Southwest Asia Service Medal, the Kuwait Liberation Medal from Saudi Arabia, the Kuwait Liberation Medal from Kuwait, and the Good Conduct Medal. Upon leaving the military, he immediately went to work for the Children Law Services in New York utilizing his bilingual skills as he conducted needs assessments of children who were the subject of

6. Military Pay Raise at Risk in Budget Impasse, Key Lawmaker Says Military.com, October 28, 2019, the 3.1% pay raise promised for the military could be at risk in the ongoing impasse over the defense budget and the political turmoil surrounding the impeachment inquiry, a top House Republican said Oct. 23. Rep. Mac Thornberry, R-Texas, the ranking Republican on the House Armed Services Committee, said various military specialty pays also must be approved in the now-stalled National Defense Authorization Act legislation and by several appropriations committees. The pay raise and other vital defense programs will remain at fiscal 2019 funding levels unless Congress can pass a fiscal 2020 NDAA by a Nov. 21 deadline, Read more.

7. Millions More Vets and Caregivers Are About to Get Commissary, Exchange Access Military.com, Week of September 23, 2019, The Departments of Defense and Veterans Affairs are gearing up for what will be the largest expansion of patrons to the military commissary system and exchanges in 65 years, making sure that shoppers will be able to get on base and find the shelves fully stocked. Starting Jan. 1, Purple Heart recipients, former prisoners of war and all service-connected disabled veterans, regardless of rating, as well as caregivers enrolled in the VA's Comprehensive Assistance for Family Caregivers program, will be able to shop at Defense Commissary Agency stores and military exchanges. Open Enrollment: How to Choose a Dental Plan Military.com October 3, 2019, This year's open enrollment season for choosing a dental plan runs from Nov. 11, 2019, through midnight EST Dec. 9, 2019, for coverage effective Jan. 1, 2020. Retirees who are currently enrolled in a Federal Employees Dental and Vision Insurance Program (FEDVIP) plan will automatically continue enrollment into 2020. If you want to cancel or change your dental plan in any way, you must contact BENEFEDS during open enrollment. Read more. 9. Army's Future Battle Plan May Include Restructuring Guard Forces Military.com, 24 Sep 2019, The deputy commander of Army Futures Command said Tuesday that the service may need more of the <u>National Guard</u>'s capabilities in the early days of a fight on future battlefields. Force posture is very important to multi-domain operations -- the concept the <u>Army</u> is developing to fight on land, sea and air, as well as in space and cyberspace -- and "the Guard will have to be available to be part of rotational forces, as they have for years now," Read more.

10. Tricare Drug Costs to Increase More Than 40% in 2020 Military.com, Week of October 07, 2019, Prescription drug costs for Tricare users are set to rise Jan. 1, some by as much as 42%. Effective Jan. 1, 2020, the price of all generic drugs, brand-name drugs and non-formulary drugs purchased through the mail-order pharmacy and through in-network retail pharmacies will increase. Costs at out-of-network pharmacies will also increase. Drugs received through on-base pharmacies will continue to be free. Read more.

# 15. VA misses deadline, delays expansion of caregiver

**benefits** Stars and Stripes, September 25, 2019, - Caregivers for veterans of conflicts before the 9/11 terrorist attacks won't receive congressionally mandated benefits until summer 2020 at the earliest, the Department of Veterans Affairs announced Wednesday. The VA will miss its Oct. 1 deadline to establish the information technology needed to extend caregiver benefits to families of pre-9/11 veterans - a task that was to be completed last year. The missed deadline pushes back other target dates, delaying enrollment into the program until at least next summer. Read more.

16. VA Facilities Smoke-Free Starting Oct. 1 Military.com, Week of September 30, 2019, All <u>Department of Veterans Affairs</u> health care facilities will be completely smoke-free starting Oct. 1, with all forms of tobacco use, including e-cigarettes and vaping, banned from facility grounds. The policy change, first published by the Veterans Health Administration in early March, ends the use of designated smoking areas or shelters at VA hospitals. The change applies to everyone at VA facilities, including patients, visitors, volunteers, contractors, vendors and staff. Read more.

17. Veteran's benefits will see a cost-of-living bump this year, but how much? Military Times, September 30, 2019, Veterans will

see a cost-of-living increase in their benefits payouts later this year, but it likely won't be as big as the last one they received. A Million Veterans Have Looked Into Private Care Since Mission Act Rollout Militaary.com, Week of September 30, 2019, More than a million veterans have consulted with the <u>Department</u> of Veterans Affairs about going to a private doctor since the Mission Act rolled out three months ago, but there has been no immediate rush away from the VA health care system, officials said Sept. 25. "The bottom line is that the Mission Act is a success," said Dr. Richard Stone, head of the Veterans Health Administration. He added that the number of veterans enrolling in VA health care, or choosing to stay in the system, has actually increased since the Mission Act went into effect June 6. The new enrollments include veterans over the age of 65, when they become eligible for Medicare, he said at a hearing of the House Veterans Affairs Subcommittee on Health. Read more.

announced its <u>recommendations for eligibility changes</u> at Arlington National Cemetery - changes which would reduce those eligible for below-ground burials but still offer above-ground inurnment of cremated remains for many veterans. In addition to preserving 1,000 gravesites for current and future Medal of Honor recipients, the proposed revised criteria for those who honorably serve the nation are as follows: Read more.

Fake website with Iranian ties targets US veterans, report says, Fox News, September 27, 2019, Researchers have unmasked a website masquerading as a job site for U.S. veterans that may have ties to Iran, according to media reports. Researchers from security firm Cisco Talos reported this week that the website, Hire Military Heroes, was distributing malware that allows hackers to gain control of the victim's computer, as reported by Bleeping Computer. 32. Troops, Vets Increasingly Targeted by Russian 'Troll Factories,' Report Finds Military.com, Week of September 30, 2019, The same Russian "troll factories" that sought to influence the 2016 elections have continued to target service members, veterans and their families online with "hateful and divisive messages," according to a two-year investigative report by Vietnam Veterans of America. "They're incredibly good at branding" and are seeking to "pit us against each other" in the military and veterans community, said Kristofer Goldsmith, VVA chief investigator and author of the 191-page report. Vets in Congress Renew Medal of Honor Plea for Army 'Legend' Alwyn Cashe 17 Oct 2019 | Military.com, Fourteen years ago today, Army Sgt. 1st Class Alwyn Cashe likely could've walked away relatively unscathed after his Bradley Fighting Vehicle hit an improvised explosive device in Iraq. Instead, the soldier chose to head back into the burning vehicle to save his comrades. He did so even though they were still facing enemy gunfire and his uniform was soaked with fuel. Cashe risked his life and went beyond the call of duty, which is why he deserves the Medal of Honor, three members of Congress wrote in a letter to Defense Secretary Mark Esper and Army Secretary Ryan McCarthy on the 14th anniversary of the soldier's actions. Cashe has become "something of a legend in military circles," Reps. Dan Crenshaw, Michael Waltz and Stephanie Murphy wrote. The Silver Star he received for his 2005 actions in Iraq, they added, should be upgraded to the Medal of Honor. Read more.

The executive order, PREVENTS, which stands for the President's Roadmap to Empower Veterans and End a National Tragedy of Suicide, will serve as a national call to action aimed at improving veterans' quality of life and lowering the veteran suicide rate.
