<u>Orlando VA Healthcare System Offering COVID-19 Vaccines for All Veterans who receive care at VA</u> <u>regardless of Age</u>. The Orlando VA Healthcare Center is offering COVID-19 vaccines for all Veterans who receive care at VA regardless of age. The vaccine is being offered at four sites of care through a combination of appointments and walk-ins until supply is exhausted. Location specific information:

Viera and Daytona Beach VA Clinics: Appointments only for 65+, frontline essential workers, and veterans with underlying medical conditions, as determined by the CDC.

New diseases added to the list of presumptive associated with herbicides Bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and Parkinsonism, or Parkinson-like symptoms have been added to the list of diseases associated exposure to herbicides in the Republic of Vietnam. Please contact our office to file a claim.

VA's Complicated Vaccine Priority System Causes Disparities, Confusion The Department of Veterans Affairs may be out ahead of many states and federal entities in vaccine administration, but the complexity of deciding who is eligible for the vaccine and when has still left many confused and frustrated. <u>Read more</u>

COVID-19 Death Rate at VA Nursing Homes Is 13 Times Lower Than National Average If you're in a nursing home operated by the Department of Veterans Affairs, data shows you're about half as likely to contract COVID-19 as you are in a non-VA senior living facility, and 13 times less likely to die from the disease. In the past year, 1,679 residents of VA nursing homes, which it calls community living centers or CLCs, contracted COVID-19, and 143 died "within 30 days after a positive test," according to the department. <u>Read more</u>

Fort Hood Restricts Base Access After Shooting Incident Army officials at Fort Hood, Texas tightened the base's gate security to restrict access after an on-base shooting early Saturday morning. No one was injured in the shooting, but Fort Hood has suspended its Trusted Traveler Program that allowed military personnel with valid military identification to "escort or vouch for adult passengers ... in their vehicle," according to a Fort Hood news release. <u>Read more</u>
- 17. **TRICARE Waives Referrals for Prime Enrollees Seeking COVID-19 Vaccine -** The Defense Department has waived a requirement that Tricare Prime patients have a referral from their primary care doctors to get the

COVID-19 vaccine outside the military health system. The waiver, to be published in the Federal Register Tuesday, allows Prime enrollees to receive the vaccine at any non-military facility, including non-network pharmacies or providers, without incurring any fees. <u>Read more</u>

Dependents of Some Disabled Veterans Can Now Fly Space-A A recent regulations change allows dependent family members of permanently and totally disabled veterans to fly on space-available, or Space-A, flights. On Oct. 23, 2020, a change to DoDI 4515.13 updated the eligibility requirements for Space-A travel, adding dependents of permanently and totally disabled veterans. <u>Read More</u>

TRICARE Emergency Refill Procedures in Place After Texas Winter Storm Emergency prescription refills will be available to all TRICARE beneficiaries in Texas through March 1 as the state recovers from a deadly winter storm. The move allows TRICARE beneficiaries to take their empty prescription bottle to any innetwork pharmacy to secure a refill. - 20. Air Force's First Overseas F-35 Fighter Squadron Gets Crowdsourced New Name The U.S. Air Force will call its first U.K.-based F-35 Lightning II fighter squadron the Valkyries. The 495th Fighter Squadron, part of the 48th Fighter Wing at RAF Lakenheath, will take on the title, according to a release. The service announced the nickname for its first overseas Joint Strike Fighter squadron Monday; the name beat other crowdsourced choices, including Archangels, Sabres, Sentinels and Swordsmen. <u>Read more</u>

VA Secretary: 'Urgent' Review Planned for Agent Orange Benefit Expansion For tens of thousands of Vietnam veterans entitled to long-sought benefits connected to toxic exposure, recent statements from VA Secretary Denis McDonough hold promise, but offer few specifics. As reported by Military Times and Military.com, McDonough on Feb. 23 pledged an "urgent" review of the process that will extend benefits to tens of thousands of veterans suffering from bladder cancer, hypothyroidism, and Parkinsonism conditions added to the list of those connected to Agent Orange exposure as part of the FY 2021 National Defense Authorization Act (NDAA). A presumptive condition means that if a claimant's exposure to Agent Orange is validated, then the disease is presumed to be service-connected.
