The Rocky Mountain High Intensity Drug Trafficking Area (RMHIDTA) program was established by the White House Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) in 1996. As of 2020, the program has 30 HIDTA designated counties in 4 states (Colorado, Montana, Utah, and Wyoming).

The Rocky Mountain HIDTA's mission is to facilitate cooperation and coordination among federal, state, local and tribal law enforcement with efforts to reduce availability by disrupting or dismantling violent drug trafficking organizations.

The mission is accomplished through intelligence-driven investigative and interdiction operations conducted by multi-agency task forces. Rocky Mountain HIDTA has three core programs that include enforcement initiatives, investigative support center and training division. The aim of RMHIDTA is to:

- Reduce drug availability by eliminating or disrupting drug trafficking organizations.
- Improve the efficiency and effectiveness of law enforcement organizations in their efforts within HIDTA.

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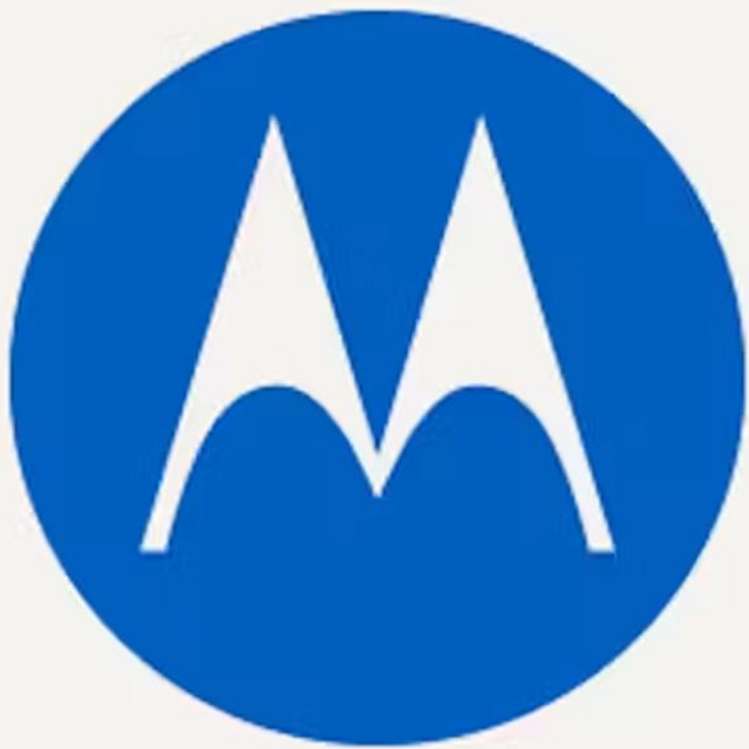

The Post Critical Incident Seminar (PCIS) is designed to help law enforcement officers transform vulnerability into strength through education, shared experience, and peer support. This experiential workshop is intended for officers who have personally experienced critical incidents. While immediate post-incident support is essential, the psychological and emotional effects of such events may persist over time. Experiencing a critical incident can fundamentally alter an officer's perspective, requiring meaningful processing and recovery. The PCIS provides evidence-informed education on trauma, common patterns of resolution, and proven coping strategies to support healing, resilience, and long-term well-being.

The PCIS model originated with the FBI in 1983 and has been successfully implemented in multiple states since 2000. This seminar is free to attend, and participation is limited to approximately 20 officers to ensure an effective and supportive learning environment. The seminar is facilitated by a multi-disciplinary team consisting of trained law enforcement peers, mental health professionals, and law enforcement chaplains.

Participants will benefit from:

- The opportunity to share experiences with peers who have faced similar challenges.
- The ability to give and receive meaningful peer support in a confidential setting.
- Instruction and guidance from law enforcement-informed mental health professionals utilizing proven trauma recovery approaches.
- Practical coping strategies to promote recovery from past incidents and strengthen resilience for future challenges.

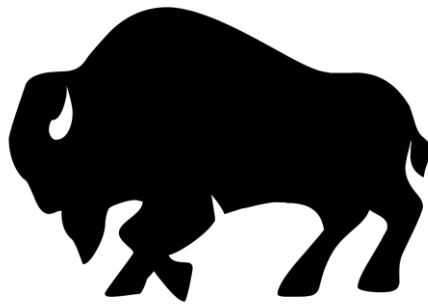

The “MAGNUS Strategies for Leadership Fatigue and Drift” keynote presentation will directly address these challenges by introducing practical tools to effectively manage the mental noise and fog that often clouds thinking. This framework empowers leaders to control drift, restore clarity, broaden their perspective, and make decisions with both awareness and confidence.

The seminar addresses the lasting psychological and emotional impacts of critical incidents—such as line-of-duty shootings, serious injuries, traumatic pursuits, high-profile events, or personal losses—by providing evidence-informed education on trauma, recovery patterns, and proven coping strategies. Participants benefit from a confidential, supportive environment where they can share experiences with peers, receive guidance from law enforcement-informed mental health professionals and chaplains, and build resilience for future challenges.

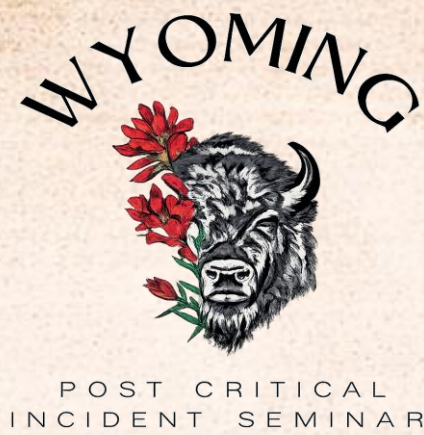


Sara Nelson

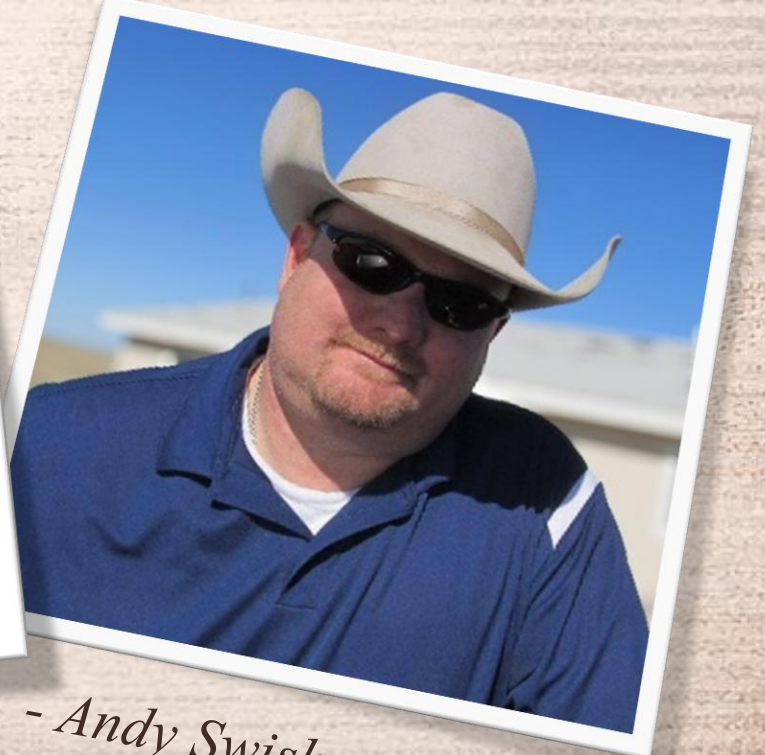


Caroline Swisher-Mooren

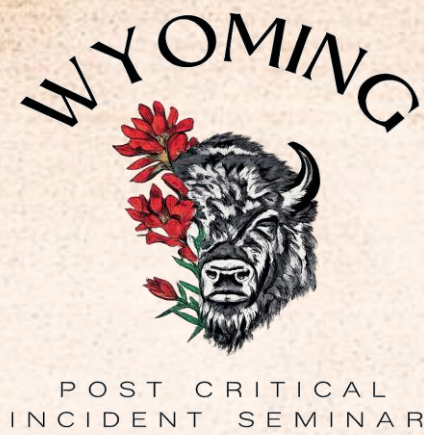

She is known for creating a safe, relatable, and culturally competent environment that allows clients to build trust, process experiences, and achieve meaningful growth.

Stephanie is passionate about educating others on the science of trauma, mental resilience, and performance, and she is committed to helping people develop the tools they need to thrive both personally and professionally.



Privately Made Firearms & Common Machinegun Conversion Devices

Wednesday, June 17th at 8:00 AM

This course provides an overview of legal definitions under the Gun Control Act of 1968, the National Firearms Act of 1934, and 27 C.F.R. It examines the history of Privately Made Firearms (PMFs) and Machinegun Conversion Devices (MCDs), along with the factors contributing to their increased prevalence.

The session also addresses the various types of 3D-printed firearms and MCD's, the risks they present, and how MCDs function, to include the relative ease of their manufacture and installation.

Key subject areas for this course include firearm definitions; privately made firearms; 80% pistols and 80% rifles; 3D-printed firearms; machinegun conversion devices; silencers; and 3D printers.

Cody Toy

Cody Toy has been a Firearms Enforcement Officer with ATF for over 10 years and has previously served as the Branch Chief of the Firearms Technology Criminal Branch, overseeing all technical

reports on firearms and ammunition for the entire United States. He has drafted approximately 1,000 technical criminal reports involving thousands of firearms and has testified as an expert witness in federal criminal cases across the United States. Additionally, he is a certified armorer in over 70 different firearms from around the world. Prior to his employment with ATF, Cody served 4 years in the United States Marine Corps infantry.



Hire Character, Train Skill:

The People Behind the Badge - Strategies to Recruit, Develop, and Retain the Next Generation of Police Officers.

Wednesday, June 17th at 10:20 AM

This course emphasizes a simple but critical idea: **Hire for Character, Train for Skill**. It helps law enforcement leaders strengthen recruitment and retention by clarifying their agency's identity, focusing on human connection, and aligning internal culture before seeking new hires. Participants define their agency's purpose, identify their ideal candidate, and address internal barriers like leadership, pay, or culture.

Key focus areas:

- Define the ideal candidate based on traits like integrity, service, teamwork, and mindset
- Prioritize emotional intelligence (self-awareness, social awareness, relationship skills)
- Seek candidates aligned with mission and leadership potential
- Evaluate and adapt your agencies hiring standards to reflect your community and agency expectations
- Use social media to attract interest, but rely on personal connection to secure hires
- Evaluate recruiting practices (Start–Stop–Continue)
- Listen to candidate motivations (career growth, pay, family needs, etc.)
- Adapt Generational expectations (wellness, flexibility, career pathways)
- Ensure strong internal culture, leadership, and training systems

Hiring and Retention Strategies:

- Streamline hiring while maintaining fairness
- Keep consistent communication with candidates
- Train interview panels to assess core traits over experience
- Provide feedback and mentorship, even to unsuccessful applicants
- Provide feedback and mentorship, even to unsuccessful applicants
- Evaluate candidates holistically in background investigations
- Treat every step of hiring as part of the recruitment experience

Professional Staff Hiring:

- Develop strong Field Training Officers who model agency values
- Wellness and mental health support
- Peer support and fitness initiatives
- Career development and specialization opportunities



Participants will leave this course with an understanding that effective recruitment and retention demand effort, adaptability, and a genuine investment in people throughout their careers. They will gain practical tools to evaluate their agency's current retention strategies and identify opportunities for meaningful, continuous improvement.



Mike Boward

Mike Boward brings more than 32 years of law enforcement experience, including over 27 years with Fort Collins Police Services in Colorado. He began his law enforcement career in Michigan and later served in Ohio before relocating to Colorado.

Boward currently serves as a Sergeant and served as the Supervisor in the Personnel and Training Unit, where he oversaw training, recruiting, hiring, and background investigations leading key recruitment and professional development initiatives. He also served as the Fort Collins Police Academy Supervisor and as a Field Training Supervisor, helping guide the development of new officers and training programs.

Throughout his career, Boward has also served as a Patrol Sergeant and as a Training Officer within the Personnel and Training Unit. His experience also includes more than six years as a Criminal Investigations Detective and service as a Field Training Officer.

As an experienced instructor and speaker, Boward has delivered presentations at numerous national training conferences across the country, covering topics such as recruitment and retention, organizational leadership, training, and officer mental health and wellness. He has frequently served as Master of Ceremonies and Program Facilitator for these events and has contributed to webinars and professional programs with organizations including Police1, the University of Virginia, and Michigan State University.

Boward holds a Bachelor of Science degree in Communications from Andrews University and has completed extensive professional training and leadership development programs throughout his career.



Wyoming Homeland Security Taskforce

Wednesday, June 17th at TBD

The Homeland Security Task Force is a 2025 federal initiative co-led by the FBI and HSI to combat violent crime, transnational criminal organizations, and human trafficking. Established by Executive Order 14159, these multi-agency teams partner with local law enforcement to dismantle cartels and gangs through intelligence-driven investigations.

Transnational criminal organizations present an increased and varied threat typically engaging in multiple forms of organized criminal activity including drug trafficking, violence, terrorism, corruption, human smuggling, human trafficking, weapons trafficking, money laundering, complex financial crimes, extortion, kidnapping, and other TCO-related violations where there is or may be a federal investigative interest.



Seth Griswold

Seth Griswold is an Assistant United States Attorney for the District of Wyoming. He currently serves as the office's Drug Crimes Coordinator and Lead Homeland Security Task Force Attorney, a whole-of-government partnership dedicated to eliminating

criminal cartels, foreign gangs, transnational criminal organizations, and human smuggling and trafficking rings operating in the United States and abroad. As part of his duties, AUSA Griswold also prosecutes federal violent crime offenses, which include child sexual exploitation and abuse crimes.

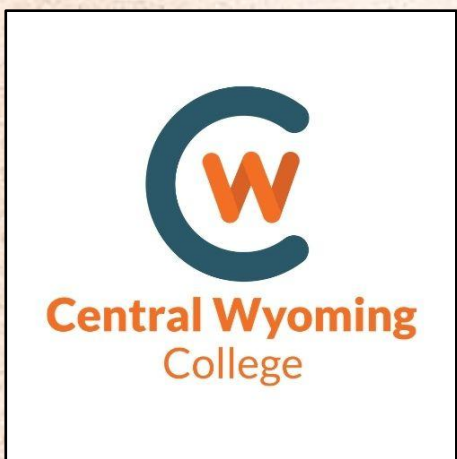
Before joining the U.S. Attorney's Office, AUSA Griswold served as a Deputy County Attorney in Fremont County, Wyoming for six years.



The Police Academy at Central Wyoming College

This session provides an overview of the Central Wyoming College's proposed Police Academy and regional law enforcement training hub designed to strengthen officer recruitment, retention, and professional development across Wyoming. The presentation will explore how the initiative combines academic instruction, practical skills training, and community partnerships to create accessible pathways into law enforcement careers.



Kathleen Tilton

From the heart of the Midwest to the heart of the Mountain West, Kathleen Tilton has pursued a career that embraces the complexities of the law and legal systems.

After graduating from the University of Colorado School of Law, Kathleen's journey took her from the busy courtrooms of the Colorado Front Range, where she attended law school at the University of Colorado School of Law and served as a prosecuting attorney, to the Colorado Western Slope, where she established a private practice serving local government, school districts, and as a guardian ad litem. In 2003, she found her permanent home in Lander, Wyoming. Her legal career in Fremont County has been defined by its breadth of public service working with the Fremont County Attorney's Office as a prosecutor, civil attorney, juvenile prosecuting attorney, a brief time with the public defender's office, and an attorney in the child protection system.

Today, Kathleen translates her decades-long expertise in the justice system into the classroom as a Professor of Criminal Justice and Pre-Legal Studies at Central Wyoming College. When she isn't mentoring the next generation of criminal justice professionals, she is likely tending to her small menagerie of animals or enjoying time with her family.



FBI's Cellular Analysis & Multimedia Exploitation Operations (CAMEO) Team

Wednesday, June 17th at 2:50 PM

This presentation is focused on familiarizing you with the resources and capabilities available through the FBI Denver Division Cellular Analysis and Multimedia Exploitation Operations (CAMEO) and the FBI Cellular Analysis Survey Team (CAST) and provide an overview of the investigative assistance that the FBI DN CAMEO team can offer law enforcement partners. Additionally, the presentation will briefly explain the records and tools available, as well as provide case examples that aid investigations; the location of missing people, victims, and fugitives; as well as bolstering successful prosecutions.

Maureen Gibson

Special Agent Maureen Gibson is a member of the FBI Cellular Analysis Survey Team (CAST) serving as a field asset. As a field asset, CAST is a collateral duty within the bureau. She has analyzed records from all the major providers and has over 300 hours of training from the cellular providers and RF engineers in the field of cellular analysis and cellular technology. She has served as an expert witness in federal and state trials in Colorado and Wyoming. She regularly assists state, local, and federal law enforcement agencies with kidnappings, bank robberies, fugitives, homicides, and drug trafficking investigations. SA Gibson has worked in the Denver Division throughout her career in the FBI and is currently serving as the team leader for the Denver Division's newly formed Cellular Analysis and Multimedia Exploitations Operations team. Prior to that assignment, SA Gibson was assigned to the Public Corruption and Civil Rights squad, and the OCDETF Strike Force, investigating narcotics violations and Mexican-based cartels.

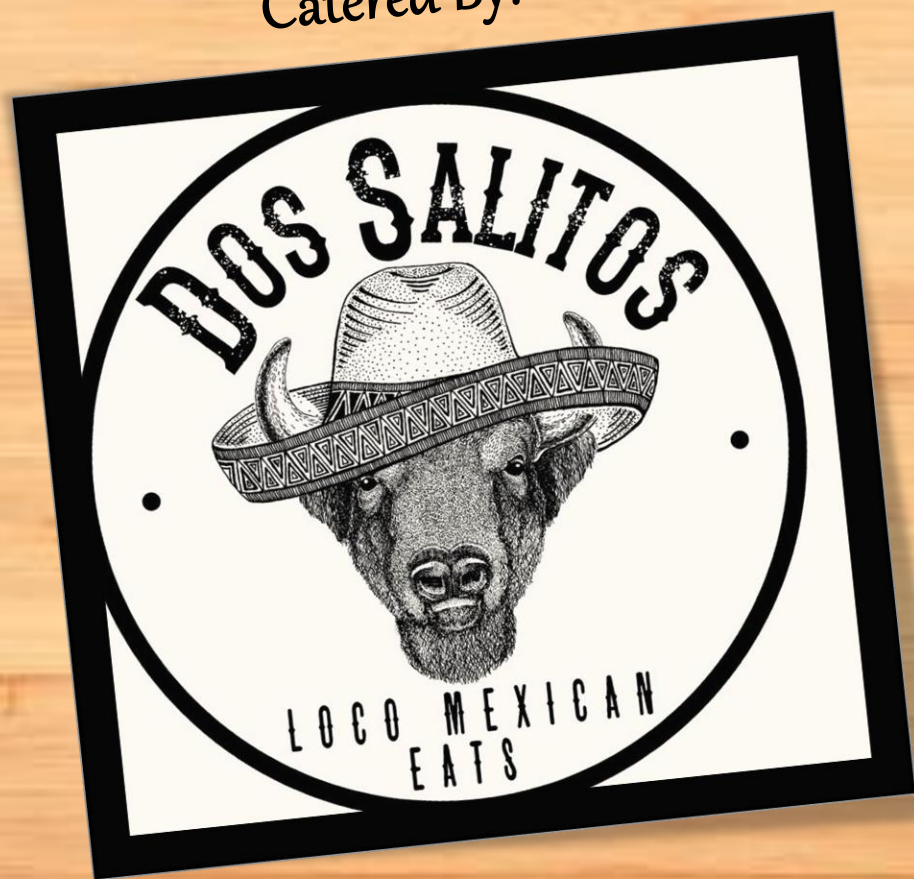

OUR MISSION



To foster effective communication and cooperation among federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies in Wyoming. We aim to identify and address current and emerging crime trends to enhance

public safety and are committed to providing leadership, guidance, and resources to support established training objectives for Wyoming's law enforcement community.

OUR HISTORY

In 1981, the U.S. Attorney General's Task Force on Violent Crime, a bipartisan group of distinguished national criminal justice experts tasked with examining federal, state, and local law enforcement needs, recommended the Attorney General



establish a forum to enhance communication at all levels of law enforcement. The recommendation came as a direct result of the group's finding that local law enforcement cooperation was crucial. The Attorney General acted on the recommendation and formed the Law Enforcement Coordinating Committee (LECC) for the purpose of improving coordination and cooperation among law enforcement agencies to enhance the effectiveness of the criminal justice system within each federal judicial district. In July of 1981, the Attorney General issued an order instructing each United States Attorney to establish an LECC. Today, each committee has a United States Attorney's Office staff member as its coordinator and the LECC program has become a cornerstone of joint federal, state, and local law enforcement efforts.
