The four-date Concerts in the Park series went ahead almost without a hitch. I say "almost," because the penultimate event on July 17 had to be cancelled due to thunderstorms. However, as the photos below attest, the remaining concerts went ahead under ideal skies, and attracted between 150 and 300 attendees each.

In June, John and Paul Woodsworth (grandson and great-grandson respectively of J.S. Woodsworth) visited from Ottawa and had lunch with their Applewood friends. Stories were exchanged and John filled in details of JSW's life and times.

Our second visit from the extended Shaver family came a few weeks ago when John and Carole Bolton brought in a rocking chair and some china that had been in the Applewood homestead in the 1800's. These artifacts were passed down through the Shaver family to Rosemary Bolton (nee Shaver) who is John's mother, and the great-granddaughter of Peter and Esther Shaver (builders of the house). Rosemary recalls that the china was Esther's and the chair was in the homestead when it was later owned by George's (Peter's brother) side of the family. Rosemary felt that these items should return to Applewood, as she was in the process of downsizing.

'Living History' Theatre at Applewood

October 5 at Applewood was an historic day. The Etobicoke Historical Society (EHS) launched their first annual history play, basing it on the life and times of James Shaver Woodsworth. Naturally, they picked Applewood as the venue for the play.

The audience watched the play by going through the house in groups from room to room (on the first floor). The play stepped through events in JSW's life as seen through the eyes of his relatives on the Shaver side of the family who lived in the Applewood homestead during those years. The audience could tell each time period by the "year" posted on a card in each room, and by the age of Isabel (Shaver-) Bishop (the last resident of Applewood) as she grew up.

EHS member Jennifer Bazar wrote the script for the play, building the drama through the clever device of having letters and telegrams from JSW being received by his cousins back at Applewood. Neil Park, the actor playing JSW, would appear writing the letters from England or Vancouver, or by eventually visiting Applewood in person on his travels.

One of the most ingenious elements of the play was the way Jennifer worked in social issues that concerned Woodsworth in his day, and the way many of those same issues are still important now. Coincidently, Canada's 2019 election campaign was in full swing while this very political
