President's Message

It has been a year since life changed at home, at work, and in public. Masks, distancing, isolation; and for some, severe illness. I hope that you and your loved ones are well in these challenging and unprecedented times. Economic, social, and human adversity will gradually recede as Canada is able to distribute the vaccines developed to protect us from COVID.

The remainder of this Almanac issue will let you know about some of the ways Applewood has been impacted and implemented changes to handle this "new normal."

Starting almost exactly one year ago, as our last Almanac issue explained, Applewood had to close to all visitors, including marriage couples. As our current street sign shows, we were able to have a limited re-opening for very small weddings mid-summer last year, and provincial

regulations have permitted this restricted use until now. As the weather warms, outdoor ceremonies become possible.

The economic impact on our tenants has also been significant. Two of our valued renters decided to give up their offices (Athena Executive Education and Associated Senior Executives). We have been fortunate to welcome two new tenants (Ontario



Association for Family Mediation, and Ruth Smith, psychotherapist).

Applewood's own activities have also been reduced in that no house tours or rentals for meetings can be held while provincial restrictions are in force. During COVID, all staff, tenants and wedding couples who enter the building are greeted by a the now-ubiquitous "signage and sanitizer" combination, as the photos on the next page attest. Face masks inside are *de rigeur*, as

they are everywhere these days. Air filters, ventilation, plastic barriers, and disinfection of hightouch surfaces are all employed to further reduce the risk of transmission, and the number of people allowed inside is limited.

Heartfelt congratulations go out to our staff and officiants who are managing the changes that have had to take place for us to hold wedding ceremonies. Many venues in the city that would hold weddings in the past are still closed. Our office is open three days a week (Mon, Wed, and Fri) by appointment only, and we can accommodate small weddings when requested.

Many changes in our wedding accommodations will revert to normal as the majority of Canadians are vaccinated and we can have more than few attendees permitted by the changing provincial regulations. However, some changes at Applewood are improvements that will stay with us from now on.

One of the most significant improvements that Applewood has made is in our banking and payment systems. We can now accept and receive electronic payments and transfers, and this includes your annual membership (still only \$25), or any donations (see following article).

The slow-down in activities triggered by the pandemic is also being used as a time for undertaking renovations and repairs that "our old house" is needing. Something to rejuvenate the front and side porches is needed to address the aging paint job and the occasional rainwater seepage into the basement. Window cleaning and repair is on our "to-do" list, along with some professional attention to the gardens around the homestead.

Our dedicated staff and volunteers are also lending a hand to general file-sorting and clean-up that have produced dozens of boxes of old bills, receipts, and general correspondence going back 40 years. We've kept the past decade in our records room, and shredded the rest to keep the shelves from overflowing.



Our Improved Web Site

As part of the modernization of our business systems undertaken in part because of the burden of handling paper and money during the current pandemic situation, we have made our web site into a hub where you can see the latest news about Applewood, and where you can easily renew your membership at the click of a button.



You simply go to the site www.applewoodshaverhouse.ca

and click the "Membership and Donations" tab to get to the new page shown on the left. From there you can click "Renew or Join." You'll then be taken to a secure screen where you can enter your personal information for your tax receipt, enter your credit card number, and complete your renewal (and any donation). You will immediately receive a tax

receipt by email from our partner "CanadaHelps" showing the Applewood Shaver Receipt Confirmation that you can submit with next year's taxes. This modern transaction approach is the way to go if you have a computer and are comfortable with internet platforms. If you are not a fan of doing things this way, you can always use the enclosed form (or just download and print it from the bottom of the Memberships web page). You can renew your membership term by mailing the form and a cheque to us the old way. We'll send back your receipt by mail too.

I would be remiss not to point out that our new page also has a "Donate Now" button that you can use anytime – no need to wait until renewal season! Seriously, though, we are grateful for your membership in our organization and any support you choose.
