HELLO there, Rose Farmer here, the Gardner's friend. Spring has arrived and now all your hard work last fall is beginning to show, one way or another. Are you pleased? Don't be discouraged if you aren't, for we can always begin again.

In APRIL, continue to dust or spray your roses regularly to prevent that ugly BlackSpot. Pebud your hybrid tea roses to one bud to each stem. This will produce one beautiful rose that could be a blue-ribbon winner. Prune early-blooming shrubs as soon as they are through blooming to encourage new shoots that will provide next year's bloom.

In MAY, you will find crab grass growing rapidly in your lawn. Use selective weed killer on hand pick it! Hand picking might be better for your waist-line, although not as fast. It is less expensive and you achieve double results.

In JUNE, I hope you have planned to give more time to your garden for it is mulch and fertilize, weed and water, spray and dust time. SOW until next time-



Hi There Gardeners!

Say your yard is looking tired? Army worms have found your grass? Petunias & garaniums have been attacked by bugs? The ground is hard-no rain, it's been too hot? Say the ragweed is blooming? You sneeze & cough? You went outdoors that other cool morning to pull weeds and was bit by a wasp? You are feeling let-down now that the children are back in school???? Well, take a deep breath, square your shoulders, hold your head up high. Get out your garden gloves, hoe and rake! FACE right up to it, for it's FALL.

Sept., Oct. and Nov. are busy, busy months for gardeners. Lawns of seed mixtures containing Ky. Blue Grass, Fescues & Rye can be planted in Sept. or Oct. Get your bulbs now, plant until late Oct. Chrysanthemums require regular applications of fertilizer until the flower buds begin to show color. Keep soil comfortably moist. WATER, WATER, WATER all azaleas-other evergreens during Oct. Perennials that are through blooming should be cleaned. Cut back stems, tops & if diseased, burn them. Good sanitation in the gardenis important. Nov. is best time to order trees, shrubs, fruit trees & Roses. Plant late Nov. Perennials of all kinds can be set out & can be divided & transplanted in Nov. NOW don't you feel better? NO? Here is a paraphrase of a nursery rhyme that MIGHT help get you in the mood.

Oh, Rose Farmer, is a friend of the gardeners. And a friend of the gardens is She. She calls for her hoe, She calls for her rake. And She calls for a Fall Planting Jubilee.
