Mrs. Hodges then explains: "It can happen, if all the citizens of Belmont will do their part."


The Civic Beautification Committee will sponsor a variety show on April 20, 21 and 22 with all proceeds to be used to beautify the city.



Small town effort makes a big sparkle

BELMONT — The actors, actresses, singers and dancers of "Like Diamond Rings," their feet tired and their bodies weary, have braved the mass confusion that goes along with an amateur production of a musical play.

And the worst is not over. Today the cast will rehearse 1-5 p.m. and from 7 p.m. on. After this grueling feat, they face the dress rehearsal before presenting the play Thursday, Friday, and Saturday nights at 8 o'clock in the South Point High School auditorium.

But "Like Diamond Rings" is for a cause — it will make Belmont more beautiful. The community-spirited participants, adults and young people alike, give the impression that civic beautification is worth every tired foot, aching back, and headache.

"The whole thing is for Belmont," said Leah Levin of Mt. Gilead, who wrote the play and its lyrics. Mrs. Levin is donating her services as director, traveling between Mt. Gilead and Belmont for each rehearsal.

Benjy Haywood of Mt. Gilead, composer of the musical score, is also donating his services. Others giving time and talents are Bob Greene, producer; Alan Stout, set designer; Delores Poovey, choral director; and Ann Lineberger, costume planning. Rick Salinas of Charlotte, choregrapher, is being paid for his professional services.

If all this free service is remarkable, so is the history of the play.

Mrs. Levin wrote the play 10 years ago to assist the Mt. Gilead Lions Club in raising funds to build a swimming pool. The first night people were turned away from the 1,000-seat auditorium, and the next morning people from all over North Carolina were calling for tickets. The play, a sell-out again four months later, received mention in The New York Times and in the 1963 World Book Encyclopedia Yearbook.

Then the play, having served its purpose, was put to bed. However, a series of events that began last fall

brought it out of the mothballs.

"The mayor and city council, after local garden clubs had done a lot of harping, appointed a Civic Beautification Committee," said Mrs. George Hodges, coordinating chairman of the benefit play. "The committee met after the council agreed to hire Carlton Hamrick of Charlotte on a part-time basis to clean up the cemetery and existing beauty spots."

When Mrs. Hodges lamented at the meeting that they had Hamrick's talent and no money, Mayor Calvin Ballard mentioned that 20 years ago a variety show had raised \$1,500. The committee went to Bob Greene, director of the Belmont Playmakers, who agreed to polish

"When we could find only a few worth while acts, Bob recalled that he once helped with 'Like Diamond Rings' that raised \$10,000 in Mt. Gilead," Mrs. Hodges said.

Mrs. Levin remembered Green's help and agreed to

update the play to suit Belmont's purposes.

up the acts if the talent was obtained.

"Like Diamond Rings," at first a story of industry hunting, now tells of a small town between two large cities seeking an identity of it own and a sense of community. In the play, Belmont cleans itself up in an attempt to win a national award and put the town on the map. Thrown in are a love story and a bit of Women's Lib.

"The music is as good as any found in Broadway musical, and the choregraphy is fantastic," said Mrs. Hodges.

Male and female leads in the play are Mrs. Thomas M. (Gail) Hunter of Belmont and Mike Riley of Charlotte. Joe Messer, local postman with a big voice, portrays Belmont's mayor. Mrs. Leona Smith and Mr. and Mrs. Lanier Williams of Gastonia have key roles also.

Mayor and Mrs. Calvin Ballard and City Councilman and Mrs. Tom. Berry are members of the chorus. Other residents in the cast include Larkin Reeves, David Hall Jr., George Howe Jr., Walt Tomlinson, Clayton Lineberger, Mr. and Mrs. George Hodges, Johnnie Falls, and Linda Greene, wife of the producer.

Mrs. Hodges has special praised for the Belmont Playmakers, who forfeited one of their annual presentations to help with the play. "The young people are doing a terrific job," she said.


"Everyone connected with the play has put in untold hours of work."

Mrs. Hodges said.


The play sponsors hope to prove that the best things come in small packages, "Like Diamond Rings" and like small towns.
