

Mrs. Robert W. Taylor, program chairman, introduced Sherrill. His subject was "North Carolina Wildflowers and Edibles."


With lively conversation and slides of superior clarity, he opened the eyes and ears of all present. Each plant was identified with its edibility or poisonous nature revealed.




