

ROSE CARE

Planting: Plant in full sun or where garden receives at least six hours of sun. Dig holes 18" deep and wide. Make a cone in center of hole by piling dirt up. Mix dirt with peat and add sand to encourage good drainage. Place bare-rooted plant over cone, spreading roots downward. Backfill hole with dirt to within 2" of soil level. Water well. Then fill in remainder of hole with dirt and pile dirt half way up the bush making an inverted cone-like mound. If planting in early spring, the spring rains will wash again the coned up dirt. If not, when bush starts putting out leaves, remove mulch gradually.

Watering: Roses need two inches of water per week. If rain does not show that much by a rain gage, then water by hand. It is best to use no nozzle and wet the soil around the drip line of each bush, trying to avoid wetting leaves.

Mulch: It is important to cover beds with mulch. Pine needles are good, as they tend to make the soil acidic. Mulching keeps the soil moist and also keeps weeds in check.

Pruning: Keep all dead wood cut out, any time of year. At Thanksgiving, prune bushes about hip level. This not only looks neater, but also keeps tall bushes from breaking in an ice storm or with a heavy snow, and from blowing in the winter wind and loosening the root structure. After danger of frost, usually early March, prune established bushes to 12", or more, until pith is completely white, with no dark centers. You can go all the way to the bud union if necessary. Keep 3 or 4 good strong canes. Apply Elmer's Glue to the cut stems. Just squeeze the glue on the cut. This helps keep bugs from penetrating.

Spring clean-up: Rake out all mulch from previous year, as disease can winter over. Make a small trench around each bush at the drip line and scatter in each:

Osmocote 18-6-12: 1/2 cup per bush. This is a slow-release fertilizer and one application in spring in all you need. (Sometimes I give a handful of 10-10-10 after each blooming cycle, but usually only in mid-summer.)

Uramite: Leup per bush. This is a nitrogen supplement. The granular is better than the powdered from, as the wind blows the powder as you are applying it.

Epsom Salts: 1/4 cup per bush. After applying these three, recover the trench. Cover bed with new mulch and water everything into the soil.


Spraying: You must spray weekly. A mixture of Orthene, an insecticide, and Funginex, a fungicide, is what we use. This is available already mixed together and known as Orthenex, but it is more expensive to buy it that way. For spider mites, which are microscopic and live under the leaves, use AVID-1 nosedropper per gallon of mixed spray. This is very expensive (\$226 per quart at last purchase), but you can share with another rosarian. Spider mites, if not controlled, can defoliate your bushes. For blackspot, you can use Rubigan, another expensive product. We just bear with the Japanese beetles, knowing that they do not stay very long. We are not badly affected with infestation.

Cutting: As you cut blooms, make your cut at a 45[^] angle slanting upward and outward, just above a 5 leaf-leaflet, and this encourages more blooms. Try to tea-cup your bush as you cut, opening up the middle of the bush for better air circulation and more sunlight penetration. Cut early in the morning or after sundown when sugar content is highest in the stem.
