

## GARDEN HINTS

Established roses should be given a liberal application of commercial fertilizer.

Tulip tops should not be removed until well ripened. If space is needed, lift without removing tops and reset elsewhere.

Grape hyacinths, if permitted to go to see d, will self sow over a large area.

#### GARDEN HINTS

Spring blooming shrubs such as forsythia and spirea should be pruned now.

Grass clippings left on the lawn are the best and cheapest way to return organic matter to the soil.

Iris can be dug, divided and reset anytime after blooming up to October.

After tulips are through blooming, cut off bloom stalks to prevent spread of disease.

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## GARDEN HINTS

A stimulant of commercial plant food will be appreciated by all plants just before they are ready to bloom.

This is the month to order peonies.

Give asaleas an application of cotton
seed meal. Pinching out tips of new tw igs
on Azaleas between now and August 15 will give
increased bloom next winter.

## GARDEN HINTS

Fertilize chrysanthemums with liquid manure when buds begin to show color.

Fertilize roses each week for at least five weeks, using I tablespoon of complete fertilizer per bush.

Watch azaleas for black spots on leaves. Pick off affected ones and spray plants with bordeaux mixture for prevention.

Spray generally with nicotine sulfate for spiders .

Cut tops of Japanese and Siberian iris down to 10 inches.

Cut bearded iris quite short.

Still time to plant hardy annuals.

Plant sweet-peas.

## GARDEN HINTS

Mulch a zaleas with 7 inch layer of oak leaves or pine needles.

Iris, coreopsis, shasta daisies, pinks, delphinium and numerous others suffer from too much kindness. A light scattering of leaves is far better than a heavy soggy blanket of leaves or manure.

Prune dormant shrubs and trees.

Rose planting should be finished this month.
Azaleas which have frost injured wood should be pruned hard at once.
