
Answers To Some Frequently Asked Questions

- All guests must provide an ID for the head of the household.
- New pantry shoppers should bring an ID for the head of the household and a document showing residence (example: utility bill).
- Please call 2-1-1 if you are having a food emergency. Watch local news or call 2-1-1 for updates to this information.
- We will do our best to provide a similar quantity of food to families that we have in the past. Of course, this is based on availability.
- At this time, guests will not be able to make specific food choices. Boxes and bags will be pre-packaged and available for curbside pick up.
- At this time, we are pausing donation of food and ask that you consider a monetary donation if able. These can be made directly on our website. Please check at www.oregonareafoodpantry.com for more updates as they are made available.

Guidance On Using Hand-Sewn Cloth Face Masks

According to CDC Guidelines, here are the key takeaways regarding hand-sewn cloth face masks:

- The CDC does not consider handmade cloth face masks to be PPE.
- The FDA, which certifies disposable surgical masks, and NIOSH, which certifies N95 respirators, have not certified or tested the efficacy of hand-sewn cloth face masks.
- Individuals should confirm that institutions are accepting donations before creating or dropping off homemade face masks.
- The CDC acknowledges that "improvised cloth face masks" may need to be used as a last-resort, but they cannot make claims as to whether they protect the wearer or others from COVID-19.
