# Chic Chat Corner – A blast from the past

A while ago a member told me that he would like to see some old "Organic Gardening" columns reprinted in the newsletter. They were written by a long time member Bob Weschler who has since passed away. I thought that this one was particularly appropriate as it was published in January. Enjoy!

#### **HAPPY NEW YEAR EVERYONE!**

May this coming year prove to be the best one ever. Now as you enjoy reading Smoke n' Cinders, thanks to our new editor, Louise Sewall, it is time to reflect back on the successes & the failures regarding the total garden picture around your home &, of course, especially the garden railway. Needless to say, a hearty thank you to our former editor, Trish Iannacone. Taking over from Bob Gibney, our editor for it seems like forever, was not an easy task, but she did it. During the winter months when there is no snow on the ground, it is actually a good time of the year to check on whether or not some plants will require trans-

planting in the early spring. Despite proper pruning, some trees and shrubs may have become too large for their present locations. Also there may be a need for a change in texture or in color in some areas. Perhaps too many of one variety would attract more interest if the textures were varied, i.e. switch some broadleaf evergreens to conifers or the other way around. With so many different shades of green. blue, yellow, & gray, & many combinations available, there is no reason to have a monotonous garden. How about a garden bed composed of various only red flowering varieties and/ or the same for blue? A mass planting of flowers as described above can be very impressive in the garden beds around the home. It is also a marvelous way to attract birds.

If you have room in the railway garden, plant a small, irregular shaped area of the same variety of miniature trees to create a forest like effect. What makes it even more effective is when the train passes behind the forest & is hidden from view

for a few moments.

Take note of some of the perennials that may have spread over their original boundaries & are now invading other plant's territories. By simply dividing them, you have solved the problem & at the same time you now have some plants to give to others. Hey, that's what our club is all about, i.e. sharing plants & knowledge.

At many homes, after a while, the front foundation plantings have grown much too large, sometimes covering up the windows, etc. It may be time for their complete removal & to start over again, this time with dwarf varieties.

Do you have the space & the time required to create a water feature in your existing garden, i.e. a waterfall, stream, & a pond with fish and water plants? If you had a vegetable garden with many varieties or if you just had planted a few tomato plants in the ground or in large containers, you probably were aware of the fact that this was a VERY poor year for tomatoes. *(continued on page 9)*

President Mike Kmeth asked that the meeting be opened @ 10:10 AM. A motion was made by Frank Clemente and seconded by Lou Cortese

President Mike Kmeth asked for a motion to forgo the reading and approve the minutes of the August 28, 2021 BOD. Lou Cortese made a motion to accept as is, seconded by George Stamataides. BOD approved.

<u>President</u> – Mike Kmeth\_said thank you to Tom Rizzo for his 14 years and Steve Gahrerty for all their time and efforts that they have put into this Board of Directors for our club. Mike then introduced and welcomed our new Vice President George Stamataides and Membership Director Anthony Bliss for taking on these two vital positions to our club.

Mike then asked about the job cross training. Bob and Ed Assaf have started with the financial end.

**Treasurer's Report** – Bob Sewall gave a synopsis of the report: The 1st Quarter 10/11/2021 thru 12/31/2021 Starting \$9,968.81 Ending \$8,287.42 The 2<sup>nd</sup> Quarter 1/1/2022 thru 3/31/2022 Starting \$8,287.42 Ending \$9,292.42 Year to Date 2021- 2022 as of 1/6/2022 Starting \$9,968.81 Ending \$9,2992.42

Bob noted that as of December 31 2021 we had a paid membership of 5 lifetime, 15 individual and 22 Family. This gives us 42 members which then as per our By-Laws translates to a meeting Quorum of 11 members needed to hold an official meeting for the year 2022

Bob brought to the attention of the BOD that there was a problem in the Finance Policy Account Balances in maintaining the Business Checking Account balance be-

tween \$2,000 and \$3,000 when he sometimes has to write a check (example Christmas Party)for over \$1,000 Bob recommends we change the limits to \$2,000 and \$4,000. George Stamataides made a motion to make the change as recommended, seconded by Lou Cortese. BOD approved.

Bob submitted the annual Report of Directors' report. This was discussed and accepted by the Board.



# Tom's "Did You Know?"

"The longest stretch of completely straight track in the world is in Australia. It's part of the Trans-Australian Railway, and crosses the Nullarbor Plain for 478 km (297 miles), not deviating even slightly. It can even be seen from space, according to former astronaut Andy Thomas: "It's a very fine line, it's like someone has drawn a very fine pencil line across the desert."

Originally built as part of an incentive program to encourage citizens of far-flung Perth (and Western Australia as a whole) to join the newly formed Commonwealth of Australia, the Trans-Australian Railway is part of the Indian-Pacific line, a service that runs between Sydney and Perth. A one-way trip takes between 65 and 70 hours, depending on scheduling, and it's widely accepted as one of the great railway journeys of the world.

# Chic Chat Corner continued

If you were able to harvest even a few good tomatoes, consider yourself among the few lucky ones. Some gardeners experienced a season without any tomatoes!!! Although my tomato plants were not as productive as in most previous years, I did have enough tomatoes for daily salads, etc. & enough to make many quarts of sauce. Was it due to the compost? As the years pass by, it is amazing to see how a given season can be a productive one for some vegetables, etc. & not for others. Then in another season, it can be completely reversed. Nature has a habit of acting in unexpected & in mysterious ways. The poor productive year for tomatoes was caused in part by Late Blight, a fungus disease that thrives under cool, humid weather conditions. It causes dark, watery spots on the fruit. Also Blossom End Rot is caused by uneven water ab-

sorption by the plants which makes black sunken spots on the fruit. To prevent this from happening, make sure the soil has good drainage, sufficient calcium & contains plenty of composted organic matter. Blossom Drop is caused by temperatures below 55 deg. f. & over 90 deg. f. for several hours at blossom time that usually results in no fruit set or a poor set, or is the cause of fruit deformities, i.e. large scars. Extended rainy periods are also a factor. So as you can see, when we grow vegetables, we are at the mercy of the weather.

# GARDENING CHORES FOR JANUARY & FEBRUARY

Check out the seed, bulb & plant catalogues. Enjoy, but try not to over order, admittedly not easy to do. They are beautiful to look at, uplifting, & inspiring, a

kind of preview to spring. Turn the indoor plant pots

¼ turn every couple of days. By doing that, you avoid the plants getting that reach-for-the-light-look.

Water ONLY when the surface of the soil appears dry to the touch, NOT because it is Friday. Over watering is the number one killer of indoor plants. Do not fertilize indoor plants until the end of February or early March




#### From the North

Or take Northern State Parkway to the Round Swamp Rd exit south.








#### From the South
