#### What is a Proxy and why is it necessary?

In order to conduct official club business such as the nomination & election of officers, the club needs a quorum to conduct such business. A completed proxy enables you to participate in voting on club business without being present at the meeting, but still be included towards the required quorum by authorizing another member in good standing to vote your position. This member could be your spouse, another member, a Director at Large or other officer who is willing to cast your vote as instructed on your behalf as though you were present via a completed proxy in their physical possession. This will ensure that there is a proper representation of the membership deciding club business at the meeting.

### **View From The Cab**



Closing out 2021 for the club has been an adventure for those helping to setup and run trains at both Old Bethpage Village and at the Cradle of Aviation at approximately the same time. The only difference was that the Cradle display was daytime running and Old Bethpage was evenings. We ran two fantastic nights at old Bethpage and then were closed down because some employees tested positive. Turnout was great for the very short run. I was working the raffle table. Attendees were waiting in line to buy tickets. In those two days we did great.

At the Cradle we usually start our setup at 9:00am; but no, we could not get in this year until 12:00 noon. We were originally to run until January 2<sup>nd</sup> but we had to close early. We had to be out by the 30<sup>th</sup> of Dec. This was because the

Cradle had another event, more influential than us running trains.

So we planned on take down at 9:00am on the 30<sup>th</sup>. Well the county decided to give out free test kits for the virus at 9:00am across from the Cradle. The backup of cars was unreal. Take down crew members were calling each other from their cars trying to find a way in. Whatever entrance you

Our trailer pulled out of the parking lot by 1:40 pm. Some club members couldn't get in for a number of reasons, so other club members helped take their buildings, equipment etc. home for them.

Member turn out at the Cradle was good. The New Lift Bridge showed a lot of interest. There are a few bugs that still have to be engineered out. But that is to be expected with any engineering project of this magnitude.

January 4<sup>th</sup>, our Old Bethpage crew went back to break down and retrieve their trains. We had to leave our trains there because Old Bethpage Village had been closed.

I would like to thank all members that came out to help setup and take down both Old Bethpage Village and the Cradle of Aviation. Your time and effort are much appreciated. Also a big thanks to all members that came to run trains and interact with attendees at these two shows.

that they made it blow. I told them and their mom sorry I didn't have my trains today. All were disappointed. Next, now the third day the boys were back. This time I had my trains and again let them blow the whistle. By the way, they have season passes to the Cradle. They weren't going to be there on the fourth day, they were going to N.J.

What I am trying to get at is this. We

need to make our modules and possibly our ground display interactive with kids if we have any chance of enticing them to love trains. We have to show them that there are other buttons to push that can be fun besides their phones.

I am working on a module and planning to make it interactive. Hoping it will work. Only time will tell.





# Solution to What the Heck Puzzle

Number 13 was the ultimate expression of the North Eastern Railway's electric traction developments in the early twentieth century (see also the <u>Class ES1</u> shunter and <u>EB1</u> freight locomotive). Number 13 was an express passenger locomotive designed to haul trains between York and Newcastle. When built it was one of the most modern and powerful electric locomotives in Europe and the first British high-speed electric locomotive built to haul passenger trains on trunk routes.

His remarks about the winning photo taken by Elizabeth Bossert in 2012 says, "The composition is outstanding. The inclusion of foreground middle ground and background is terrific. 
