

## View From The Cab



Food for thought. A few weeks ago at the end of January or the beginning of February, we had some crazy cold weather. One day, I believe it reached 4 degrees F with a wind chill factor of - 17. Now that may have been a warm day for the men building the White Pass & Yukon RR in Alaska and the Yukon Territory, Canada but I wonder how those men did it. I have never found a pair of gloves that keeps me warm if I'm outside clearing snow. I know wool keeps one warm, and wool was the prevalent material back then but still, it's amazing. Remember, that rail road was built in the mountains, blasting road bed right on the edge of cliffs for the 1<sup>st</sup> 30 miles or so out if its 125 mile route.

Getting back to my garden railroad. In Nov. 2018 we had a new fence put up around our property and the fence posts were cemented in place. The soil that was removed for the posts and cement was going to be removed from our property, but I had Garden RR plans for that soil. I told the guys working on fence to leave it and I'd take care of any excess fill. Of course they were happy. So was I. I have to rebuild a few areas where existing soil on my layout had settled or washed out and I had wondered in the past where I could get this fill without buying it. This was my answer. It is mid-February and I've only removed two wheel barrows full of soil. I figure I still have 3-4 more wheels' worth of soil to move.

One of the reasons it's taking so long is this on/off freezing weather we are having. When the nights get down to the 20s and day time rises just above freezing that soil I want is still frozen. I'm not about to take the pick axe out, so I wait for those days when previous nights and days are above freezing. However, on those days that it did/does warm up it rains. So the wheel barrow just sits, waiting to be filled. I knew that when I start repairing my RR this spring I was going to need fill and now I have the fill I need. Can't wait to get back outside and work on my RR this spring.

This past Saturday was our yearly auction. A great many items were to be had, actually 26

more than last year. When I saw the auction tables so full of train items, I said to myself, "We'll never sell all of these items." I was proven wrong again. They did sell. The last person left the NPYC at 4:30pm. I heard through the grape vine that a member or two bought over \$1,000.00 worth of items. It was however a buyer's market this year. That morning, as I left home, I was told by my better half, as I believe a few other members were told by their better half, not to buy more train items. But did I listen? No! How can one resist.

I have a question to propose to **all members**, those in attendance at the February auction meeting heard my presentation. This concerns the use of double trestle bents on our outdoor displays. How do you feel about using them? Do you like them? Should we use them and do they add some dimension to our outdoor displays? Kindly give me feedback, pro or con. After the auction on this past Saturday, three members did get back to me with their input. I would like to hear from more of our members. I will report back to you all, either in the April or May Smoke n' Cinders.

In March we have a few activities, two public displays and a monthly meeting. Please check the calendar in this issue of Smoke n' Cinders for dates and times.






## Monthly Meeting March 24th


