While You Are Working, Look Up!

How many of us have sat in front of a computer for hours without looking up? For those with jobs that require long stretches at a desk, our eyes often move from screen to screen while rarely leaving the workstation. I know I've been so focused that I didn't even notice someone—sometimes even my boss—standing there waiting for me. Once, I even worked straight through a small earthquake without realizing it! That kind of tunnel vision left me with no awareness of my surroundings.

As Christians, I wonder how often we do the same thing spiritually. We become so immersed in our work or daily responsibilities that we forget what truly matters. This reminds me of the account of Jesus, Mary, and Martha in Luke 10:38–42.

Mary sat at the Lord's feet, listening intently to Him, while Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. Frustrated, Martha even complained to Jesus about her sister. But Jesus answered, "Martha, Martha, you are worried and troubled about many things. But one thing is needed, and Mary has chosen that good part, which will not be taken away from her."

Imagine if Martha had just looked up for a moment—lifting her eyes from the work to consider who was in her home. This wasn't just another guest. This was Jesus, the Son of God. In her tunnel vision, she missed the greater blessing of being with Him.

Sometimes, we need that same reminder: look up from the work.

1. Look up to God and heaven to remember who deserves our focus and where our true destination lies.
2. Look up to avoid obstacles that can pull us off course spiritually.
3. Look up to notice others—their needs, their burdens, and how we might help.
4. Look up so you don't miss out on the moments that truly matter in life.

Work and responsibilities will always be with us. But when we pause to look up, we realign our hearts with God, see the needs around us, and remember what truly lasts. Don't let tunnel vision rob you of the joy that comes from lifting your eyes.
